BLAIR IN QUEENS.

He Talks Lightly of His Youthful Indiscretion in 1878.

Eulogises the Members of the Government and Their Mighty Deeds.

The Wicked Tories Denounced—Flowery Eloquence by Budding Grit Statesmen from St. John.

The liberal meeting in Cody's hall, parish of Johnston, Queens county, Thursday night, was largely attended.

In addition to the people living at Cody's station, there were electors present from Chipman and other places. The St. John contingent who went up with the minister of railways and canals helped to swell the crowd.

It was 8 o'clock when Thos. Hetherington, ex-M. P. P., called the gathering to order. He expressed great pleasure at seeing such a good turnout of the people.

W. H. Trueman, the first speaker, said an election seemed to be near at hand. The liberal party should, therefore, lay down their platform both in local and Dominion politics.

The speaker then spoke in defence of the government with reference to the charges made against them by the opposition. He claimed that they had kept their promise to reduce the tariff, stating that the same had been cut from 23-1/2 to 18 per cent.

Mr. Blair then took up the Crow's Nest Pass railway matter. The building of the railway was admitted by both parties to be desirable.
