tiations without knowledge of Germany's proposals. This was the decision announced in the House of Commons this afternoon by Premier Lloyd George.

'Britain has endorsed every word of Russia's and France's answer," the Premier declared, amid cheers.

Not since the tense days when England was preparing to wage war back in 1914, has there been such a crowd in parliament as there was today. The Premier's announcement was awaited with intense interest.

Epoch-making Address.

"Opening his epoch-making address the British Prime Minister alluded to the terrible responsibility which he felt as the chief adviser to the Crown in the most gigantic war in the history of the world. He spoke carefully in measured terms and was accorded the mest intense interest by his vast audience.

Without reparation, peace is impossible," Lloyd George declared. All the outrages on land and sea cannot be liquidated by a few pious phrases about 'humanity,' he continued.

The Premier compared Germany's peace proposals to a noose, wherein England and the Allies were asked to put their heads, while Germany held the loose end of the rope.

The British Premier announced that a formal note responding in this way to the German peace proposals would in a few days be completed and given to the American embassy for transmission to Berlin.

Will Recognize Venizelos.

Premier Lloyd George announced it had been decided to give recognition to the agents of former Premier Venizelos of Greece.

Speaking of the western front, Mr. Lloyd George referred to the growth of the British armies there, and continued:

"I am convinced ultimate victory is sure if the nation shows the same spirit of endurance and readiness to learn as the mud-stained armies at the front."

Turning to the more purely political side of the domestic problems before the new ministry, Mr. Lloyd George said:

We are anxious to avoid all controversial questions. The functions of the Premier and leader of the House of Commons have been separated because it was believed e double tasks were too much for one man.

Suffered Disaster.

"We will wait until we hear what its. terms and guarantees there are other than those, better than those, surer than those which Germany so lightly lab broke. Meanwhile we shall put trust aster after disaster from tardiness of decision.

"Premier Lloyd George said the time had come when the Dominions should be consulted more formally as to the war. An imperial conference would be summoned at an early date to discuss vital questions.

"The speech of Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg before the German Reichstag was characterized by Mr. Lloyd George as constituting in substance a denial of the only terms upon which peace was possible.

"Anyone who wants only to prolong this conflict has a crime on his soul which oceans of tears could not cleanse," the premier declared, "but anyone who abandons the struggle without attaining the objective would be even more guilty. Are we likely to attain our object by accepting the German proposals? To accept the proposals would be to put our heads into a noose.

Lacks Guarantees.

"Without reparation peace is impossible. Moreover, what guarantee is there that subterfuge will not be used in future to overthrow any treaties of peace whereinto we might now enter?

"We must keep a steafast eye on the purpose for which we entered the war. We entered it to defend Europe from aggressions of the Prussian military caste. We must insist that there be the most complete guarantees sagainst this caste ever disturbing again the peace of Europe.

"Prussia has been a bad neighbor. Fighting for Life.

"The nation is fighting for life," said Mr. Lloyd George, and is entitled to be best services of all citizens. 

BISMARK AND THE WARD THE WARD

Nothing supplies clearer evidence of the essential littleness of Kaiser Wilhelm II. than his behavor to tht man who had made his grandfather German Emperor. When Bismarck died his sons contrived to give the Kaiser a pointed snub. They declined his suggestion of a state funeral, and his reception when he went to Friedrichsruh was something more than cold. An unpleasant surprise awaited the War Lord on his arrival, of which I was an eye-witness; for Bismarck's sons, as well as his son-in-law, Count Rantzau, received the Emperor in black evening dress, whereas the etiquetete of clothes—for which there has never been a more metisulous stickler than his Imperial Majesty—would have required that they should appear in their respective uniforms.

But a crowning rebuff was in store for the All-Highest monarch, who had evidently expected that he would be allowed to take a last look at the man to whom he owed the dazzling position of himself and his family in the world. But no, this was denied him. The coffin was already closed.

Mr. Whitman was &cr many years on the staff of the New York "Herald," and in this capacity he became vacquainted with a host of notable men and women. His memory is good and his stories are excellent. He knew Herzl, the Viennese journalist, who founded the Zionist movement—a strikingly handsome man dowered with both dignity and courage. It is interesting to learn that Herzl's only son was educated in England and is

with both dignity and courage. It is interesting to learn that Herzl's only son was educated in England and is now serving in the British Army.

Mr. Whitman was in Saloniki in 1897, and perhaps the strangest discovery he made in that strange city was "an English public house, kept by a widow, which only opened its doors when an English squadron put into the bay, did a roaring trade during its stay and then sank back at once to its silent, shuttered condition."

In Russia Mr. Whitman has been particularly struck, as have so many other foreigners, by the essential democracy that can exist in an autocracy. Naturally Mr. Whitman's most interesting chapters are those that deal with Germany and the Germans. It is to me a new and most interesting fact that many of the most violent of the Pan-German leaders come from the Baltic Provinces, and that some of them, including the notorious Professor Schiemann, were born Russian subjects. Mr. Whitman tells us: In Russia Mr. Whitman has been The Baltic amalgam is only too apt to accentuate the cunning, the astute-ness of the Slav, added to the less de-sirable qualities of the low-grade Teu.

Mr. Whitman has been on friendly terms with Professor Delbruck, "a man incapabel of falsehood, servility, or deceit." And he grieves to find his friend backing a crazy imperialism. He recalls the fact that Delbruck "repeatedly warned his countrymen that if Germany were to attempt to play the part of Napoleon I. she would inevitably rouse united Europe against her and share his fate."
"Things I Remember" is a fascinating book. Mr. Whitman writes as one having authority.
