The Dissolution of Parliament.

The Opposition papers are represented as being opposed to a dissolution of the House.

The statement is a slender one on all but one or two. They argue, with much force, that the constitutional course for the Government to pursue is to meet Parliament, declare their policy on the fiscal matters, the purification of elections, the extension of the suffrage, etc., pass an election law if they will, and then dissolve the House and give the people an opportunity to approve or disapprove of the policy they have outlined.

The Grand Duchess of Russia, the bride elect of the Duke of Edinburgh, is to receive an elegant present from certain British naval and marine officers who have subscribed \$5,000 for its purchase.

The money paid in Hungary continues to be a subject of discussion in the House. The first meeting of the Hungarian Parliament is said to have been about as cheerful as a funeral, and the administration is making strenuous exertions to secure a loan from the Rothschilds.

Holman Hunt's new picture, "The Shadow of Death," now on exhibition in London, is pronounced by the critics to be the work of a master, and in all its aspects the finest example which has yet come from his hand.

Mr. J. R. Walsh's "Manual of Domestic Economy" is reprinted in London, and it may be noted as a sign of the times that the lowest price contemplated in it has been raised from £100 to £150 a year, while the highest is now £1,500, instead of £1,000.

The Saturday Review says of Mr. Beecher Hooker's "Womanhood" that it is "chargeable with no worse offence than utter ignorance and blind credulity." It is, moreover, "a protest by a lady of the highest social position and striking sisterhood."

The British exploring ship Challenger recently touched at the Island of Tristan d'Acun, in the South Atlantic, and found two Germans living there, who were heartily tired of playing Robinson Crusoe, and gladly availed themselves of the opportunity of leaving.

These things happen sometimes outside of novels. Miss Helmsmoller hung herself the other day at Covington, Va., because her stern father refused to let her marry the man who she loved.

An Indian prince, the Rajah of Peshawar, has been reported to have been killed by cholera, and died about six weeks ago in India of small pox. The funeral procession was attended by 20,000 persons, and in accordance with Hindu custom the body was burned.

From a return just issued it appears that during the last twelve years England has expended a sum equal to \$2,546,369 on her coast fortifications, distributed for the most part at Portsmouth, Plymouth, Portland, Pembroke, Sheerness, Dover, and other points.

The latest medical discovery has been made at Bloomington, Ill. It is that the air of a coal mine is a cure and preventive of whooping cough. When the miners' children contract that annoying ailment they are taken down into the shaft and kept there until they stop whooping.

The destruction of trees in England is attracting some discussion. A gentleman member of the Cheshire Board of Agriculture, at a recent meeting, expressed the opinion that if the practice of destroying trees and hedges was not stopped there would be no shade left, and "the cows would have to carry parasols."

Even newspaper enterprises may overleap itself. The Herald man who was to witness the surrender of the Virginian must needs go enquiring about the Cuban rebels in his own neighborhood, and he was stopped by the guns of Fort Marillo and did not see the ceremony at all. Thus ended his career as a war correspondent.

When a man kills himself for love, it is our opinion that he should do it in a general and appropriate way. Lyman Cooley of Southwick, Mass., victim of an unrequited passion, took a great quantity of arsenic, and died in a few hours.

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For several months a lad in Portland, Me., has been carrying a two-cent piece in his pocket. When the deposit was first made, a doctor was called, who declared that there was no specie balance in the throat at all. In consequence of continued pressure, a conviction of doctors was held, and a persuasive instrument being introduced, the cash has been recovered, and the boy is recovering.

A day which will be remembered in Beil, Wis., is one of a recent date. On this to be remembered occasion, the air in the vicinity of that place resounded with the cries of three boys who lost a paper each, three more who were nearly drowned, a boy and a man who lost a leg each, and a man who had his shoulder dislocated by a stick in the hands of an infuriated woman, supposed to have been recovered, and the boy is recovering.

Paris recently witnessed a remarkable sale of unclaimed goods left about the public highways, of clothing found on bodies taken to the Morgue, of a great variety of spool left in their cases by the French prisoners who died in Germany and elsewhere during the war. There were thousands of umbrellas, of course; almost as many walking sticks, portmanteaus, baskets, rings, bracelets,

and watches. The sale of the whole collection realized 60,000 francs.

"The Life and Correspondence of Archibald Constable," by his son, is out in three volumes. Mr. Constable was the Edinburgh publisher who was ruined by Walter Scott after the great success of the "Waverley Novels" had turned the author's head and led him to those disastrous and expensive building operations which broke him down, both body and mind. This is hardly an author of fifty years back whose letters are not found in these Constable memoirs.

A daily paper in Iowa is mentioned in a Council Bluffs newspaper. This unhappy man, supported at the public expense, has been in the habit of sending every day to a brewery for a gallon of beer, and on Sundays he plausibly allowed himself two gallons. Wonderful to relate, the brewer at last refused to sell the poor old man another drop, and advised him to lay out his money to better advantage.

A six-year-old law suit, for an accident, a policy of \$5,000, has just been decided in favor of the plaintiff, against a Hartford insurance company. The case was that of Wm. Blair, who fell off a train into the Ouzeg River, in Missouri, and whose remains were never recovered. The insurance company carried the case through three courts, and in each met a defeat.
