The only real fight in the contest was in Ward I, where four candidates offered, and two new men were elected with H. J. Currie leading the poll. After the Town Clerk announced the results and declared the successful candidates he called upon His Worship Mayor Murray who thanked the ratepayers for the handsome majority given him. He also spoke briefly of needed Hydro Electric development and other matters.

He was followed by Mr. W. H. Wallace and the successful candidates for Ward I Councillors who expressed thanks for the support given them in the contest.

To the Electors and friends in the Town who supported me in the contest for the Mayorality on Tuesday last, I wish to tender my sincere thanks.

While I did not receive enough votes to elect me, this may have been largely due to the first place to the idea of a representative council being new to the people, or that the voters did not clearly understand what was meant by my use of the term "Representative Council."

Secondly the strong stand I took in regard to the advisability of having a Town Manager.

Thirdly: Many classes exist in this Town and the people are not united as they might be in seeking the best interests of the Town as a whole.

I may say in this word of thanks to those who supported me that motives may have been imputed to me that I did not intend. Very early in the contest many Councillors were allowed to secure their seats by acclamation. These were nearly all railway employees. Hence I was disappointed in this respect and it very naturally resulted in my not feeling very anxious to win out, as I above all else wished every interest to be represented at the Council Board, if I became Mayor. After the showing on nomination day I ceased making a canvass excepting for about the space of about two hours in Wards One and Two.

On election day I had no representative in any booth in the Town, nor had I any authorized canvassers outside on my behalf. I need not point out in this election that I had the railway influence against me, also the very able efforts of "The Tribune" newspaper, which directed many personal, unjust, and I think uncalled for attacks against me, and the Editor even went so far as to refuse to sell me space in his columns. I have no regrets or apologies to offer for anything I have said or did in this election, and I only hope and trust that the contest just closed may bear fruit in forwarding the best interests of this Town in which we are all greatly interested, or ought to be.

I may add that it is a matter of pride to me, the support given in my own Ward which polled a larger vote than ever in its history and gave me a handsome majority, nearly a third more than my opponent. The splendid support and many kindly acts received from the returned heroes will ever be remembered. With best wishes and kindly feelings to all, I remain,

The cases were up for trial last week.

The first trial was Mr. S. Rosenhek for having a moose hide illegally in his possession. Of this he was honorably acquitted as the game warden of Bonaventure identified the hide as one he had certified to.

It is said that the other skins are also duly stamped, but owing to circumstances were hard to identify. Several other cases have gone in favor of the defendants and others are being heard to-day.

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Mr. Cyrille Landry, an employee of the Dalhousie Lumber Company, met with a serious accident yesterday. He was working on the burner stack of the companies mill at Dalhousie, when he fell to the bottom of the stack, a distance of about fifty feet. CRITICIZES C.N.R. MANAGEMENT

Mr. Turgeon Opposes Proposal to Raise Freight Rates.

Ottawa, April 21.—In opposition to any proposal for increased rates on the Canadian National Railways, Mr. O. Turgeon (Glasgow, N. B.), in the House of Commons last night, strongly criticized the administration of the Canadian Government Railways by the board of management. He contrasted the record of the C.P.R. with that of the government railways as administered by the board. The former concluded its year with all fixed charges paid and a profit of some millions. The latter, with no fixed charges, paid for, turned in a deficit of \$47,000,000, he said.

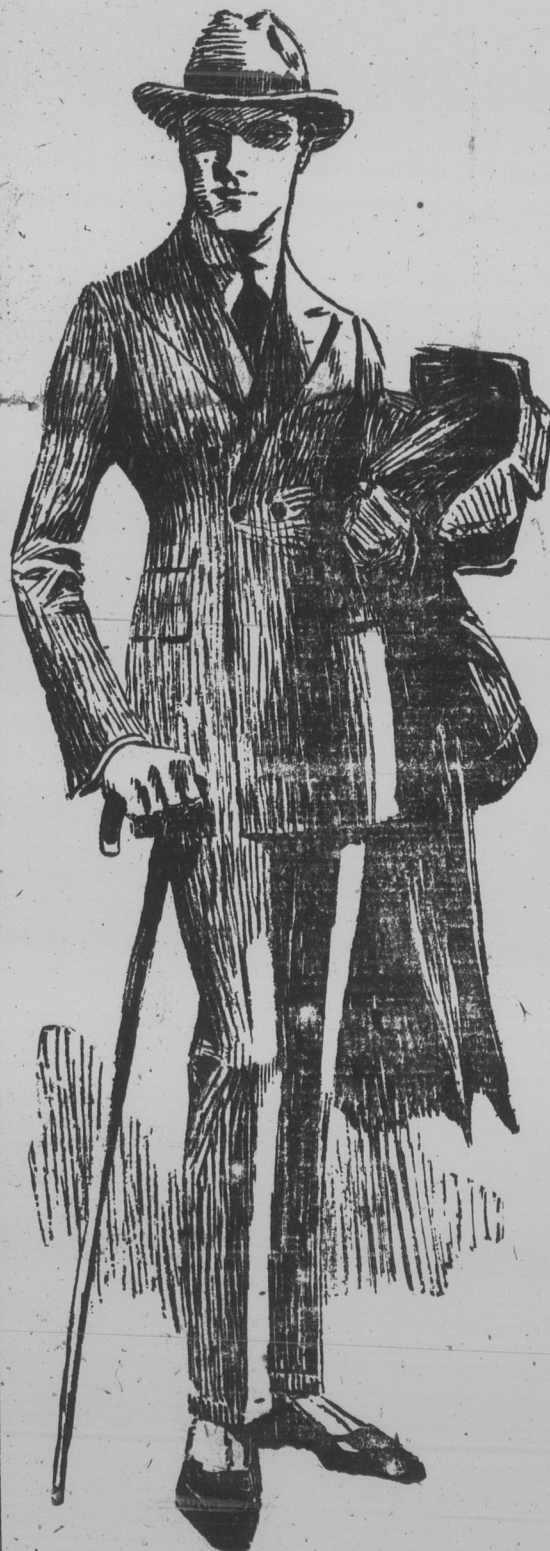

CHATHAM COUNCIL FOR MANAGER

Mayor and Number of Aldermen
Speak in Favor of Change in Town Management.

At a meeting of the Chatham Town Council held Monday evening the Mayor and a number of the Aldermen spoke strongly in favor of the Town Manager plan for their town.

The plan of management is becoming more popular throughout U. S. and Canada every week. There are now over one hundred and sixty cities and towns under town management plan in the United States and many throughout Canada. Bathurst, Newcastle, and Chatham are now discussing this up-to-date system.

The discussion at Chatham as reported in the Chatham Commercial was as follows:— Mayor Gagnon said he favored a smaller council. Some Aldermen should be paid, so that proper attention would be given to town affairs or a business manager might be engaged. He would run on the merits of such a course.

Ald. Sadler favored Mayor Gagnon's view. Business men nowadays had not the time to give to town affairs. Ald. Tweedie favored the Town Manager plan. Aldermen had not the time to give to town matters. A change in the system was necessary.

Ald. O'Brien said anyone could see that the present system was a failure by a look at the town books. If the right kind of town manager was secured the town could be put on a good financial basis.

Ald. Mercereau said municipal as well as civic systems had outlined their usefulness. He was firmly convinced that the time had come for a change.

FORMER RESIDENT A NONAGENARIAN

Celebrates 92nd Anniversary of Birth at Fall River, Mass.

(Fall River Globe)

A very important event occurred recently, in one of the best known French families of Fall River, when Mrs. Marie Florence Michaud, nee Olscamp, widow of the late Joseph Michaud, who died five years ago, at the age of 82, celebrated the 92nd anniversary of her birth. Mrs. Michaud lives with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Edmund H. Dupres, 40 Mystic Street. Although she is a very old person Mrs. Michaud is in possession of all her faculties.

Her eye sight is very good and she uses glasses but very little. Mrs. Michaud received many friends during the day and she said, she had a very good time during the day.

Mrs. Michaud was born in Batican, P. Q. and at the age of ten years, she went to live at Cross Point near Campbellton, N. B., with an uncle, the late Rev. Fr. Jean Baptiste Olscamp, at that time a missionary among the Indians in that part of Canada. From Cross Point she went to Carleton, P. Q., with her uncle and being older she helped him a good deal in his work. She learned to speak the Indian tongue and she gave an example of it when she addressed a few words to those with her, including a Daily Globe representative.

Miss Olscamp met Mr. Michaud, her future husband, when she was living in Carleton. Mr. Michaud was a merchant in the village and among her principal treasures, that the venerable lady keeps with her is her fiancé's proposal letter which was written in 1852.

In 1882, Mr. and Mrs. Michaud decided to come to United States and they settled in Lawrence, where, they remained for 10 years. They returned to Canada and Mr. Michaud was appointed general agent of the Passumpsic railroad in the city of Quebec.

Mr. and Mrs. Michaud returned to United States, lived in Lowell for some time. In 1901, the couple came to Fall River, to make their home with Mr. and Mrs. Dupres.

Four children were born from that marriage and they are still living. They are Mrs. Ed. H. Dupres of Wall River; Mrs. Emma Spivey, of New York secretary of the Cooper Union for the last 18 years; James Michaud, a purser on a vessel which travels between New York and the West Indies; and Joseph Michaud living in California.

Mrs. Michaud has six grand-children and two great-grand-children. The reporter for the Globe called on Mrs. Michaud and among other things said "Your long life must have been very interesting."

To this question, Mrs. Michaud answered: "Yes my life has been a very long one. I remember many things since I was a little girl and principally when I lived among the Indians near Campbellton. They were good people and I used to speak to them in their native tongue and they were very kind to my uncle and me." Mrs. Michaud said a few words in Indian to show that she still remembered their tongue. The venerable lady added that she has always lived a most frugal life and going to bed early and getting up with the sun. She has always partaken of simple food and she still believes in this "Eating will not hurt you, she said as long as you know what to eat."

The victory is indeed a sweeping one and its tone cannot be doubted. The entire Montgomery ticket was shoved under. This was not altogether due to the men who composed that ticket as there were good citizens represented upon it, but was an expression against W. S. Montgomery and his ring, who, despite the efforts of the better class of citizens, carried things to suit his and his friends' own ends.

The town of Dalhousie and its new citizens have a difficult task before them to straighten out the many tangles which years of mismanagement have made, but with patience and hard work the pretty little town will come into its own.

W. S. Montgomery is politically buried, and it behooves the people to see to it that he remains decently buried. The results of the Dalhousie election were given out at the Opera House Tuesday evening and the announcement that Andrew Barbier and his entire ticket had been elected was greeted with hearty applause. The new mayor is well known here and Campbellton citizens generally extend congratulations to him and to Dalhousie.

"Dalhousie, April 21.—After one of the most exciting town elections ever witnessed in the shiretown, the electors of Dalhousie, by an overwhelming majority elected practically a brand new town council. The feeling of the people so strongly expressed at the polling booth, was not so much a vote against the men who formed the Montgomery ticket, as it was the desire of the citizens of the place to see their quiet little town placed on the map of progress.

The new mayor of Dalhousie, Andrew Barbier, is well known. He is a son of the late John Barbier, who for many years was the registrar for the County of Restigouche. The new mayor's grandfathers, the late Andrew Barbier, was one of the first members to represent Restigouche County in the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, having been elected in 1843 with the late Peter Stewart. Dear Sir,—
In your issue of April 15th, 1920, I see a lot of saying reports are exaggerated concerning the Quebec Oriental Railway signed by Ex-Road Master, saying it is easy to find fault with railway management by people who know nothing of railway operations, and that he had forty-three years experience in railroading and that he had retired from the service, which would give one to understand that he had worked forty-three years on the Q. O. R. But if ex-road master was a native of the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé and had the interest of this beautiful peninsula at heart, and that his bread was not buttered on the side of the management, being a railway buyer for the manager, he would not put such a letter in your valuable paper, also the Quebec Telegraph for, from a farmer's point of view, this railway and its management is a draw back to agriculture, lumbering, and tourists, the farmers cannot get fences and are constantly getting their cattle killed and have to take what Mr. ex-road master or more men of his stamp would allow or get nothing, such as happened to the railway in the fall of 1918.

I told correspondence which had the manager concerning the railroad fence along my property, my crops destroyed, which space will not allow me here to put in, but a copy of which I will give to the publisher or any one for the interest of the said counties.
On the eve of the Railroad Commissioner's meeting at New Carlisle, the manager sent the railway engineer and the present road master, together with a number of men, to put up little hedges in their promises. Take it from the business man's point of view, I will leave it to them to put in their protest against ex-road master's letter, take the travelling public's view they do not know what they are travelling on, for if they did know the danger they would shun the road. The rails, bolts and fish plates are complete. I have seen the rails, the fish plates, there are only two bolts holding them together and you can find lots of pieces of rails from 2 to 5 feet held together by such bolts and fish plates which are just in comparison with the forces along the Q. O. R. I have no interest in the railway, but I have in the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé. I was born in Bonaventure County, I have been on the C.P.R., other roads that ex-road master speaks of, and they are not in comparison with the Q. O. R. for the people would not put up with such railway system, then ex-road master leads the public to understand that their railway facilities were perfect.

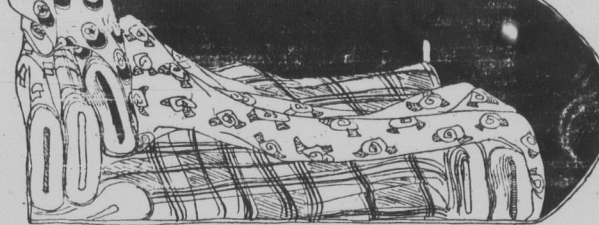

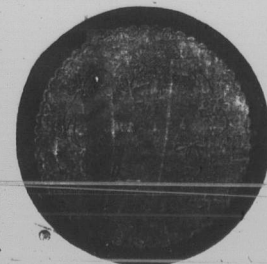

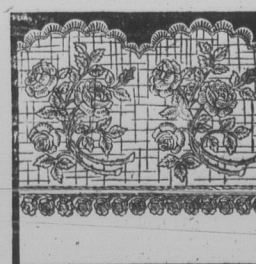

WATSON WAS HOMELY, BUT A WINNER.

Los Angeles, April 13.—"Walter Andrew Watson," who has been known to the police and sheriff's office here as Richard Hurt, is slowly recovering to-day at the County Hospital from self-inflicted wounds in his neck and wrists, made in two attempts at suicide.

Hurt is guarded by two deputy sheriffs and a hospital interne. It is hoped he will be sufficiently recovered

soon to be questioned about the letters, memoranda and articles found in his effects, which indicates, the officers say, that he has married twenty-seven women, of whom five are missing.

Deputy sheriffs are engaged in sorting the documents, which task, they said, will occupy several days. Scores of receipts, wills, marriage licenses and business instruments were found, in all of which feminine names appeared. No formal charge has yet

been placed against the man. It is said one will be filed to-day or tomorrow.

An automobile and a camping outfit owned by "Watson" were found yesterday at Santa Monica. The officers believe the man has a room somewhere in Los Angeles, where they will find further documents and personal property. They are now searching for such a place.

A dozen wedding rings and numerous articles of feminine jewelry were

found in Watson's effect. His description, as officially shown by the sheriff's records, states: "Age 42; five feet seven inches; weight 185 pounds; blue eyes; brown hair, shallow complexion, smooth shaven, stoop shoulders, small scar on left cheek; walks on heels, left eye out of line, homely, English descent; wears one and one-half carat diamond ring on left hand; carries watch in outside upper coat pocket."

LEGISLATORS WANT MORE INDEMNITY

Demand For \$800 or \$1,000 Made In Committee on Supply.

Members of the Provincial Legislature want their sessional indemnity increased and Friday night two of their supporters called upon the Government to advance the amount of indemnity from \$600 to \$1,000 while one Opposition member, waited it \$800. Last year the Contingencies Committee voted the members a bonus of \$100 each and it was said at the time there was an understanding that the indemnity would be made \$500 this year. No provision was made in the estimates for increased indemnity but Premier Foster said he would place the matter before the Government within a few days. The suggestion was also made that the salaries of the Minister be increased from \$2,100 to \$3,500 and another suggestion was reducing the number of Ministers to three, there being nine members of the Government now, two of them being without portfolio while the Premier does not administer a department.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that many people in the province would agree with him when he said that the indemnity and ministers' salaries were wholly inadequate. He did not know when the indemnity was last increased, but since that time there had been a tremendous increase borne by each member. The suggestion to amalgamate departments was splendid in theory, but difficult to put into practice. Although the population of the province had not increased as rapidly as desired, public business had grown enormously. It was the old story of demands for money in every direction, and it was difficult to comply with such requests. He had every sympathy with the desire of hon. members that the sessional indemnity should be increased, and had given the matter consideration.

Can You Blame Him? (Calgary Herald.)

A normal school graduate in Calgary lately wrote to a country school board asking the salary they were willing to pay for his services, and received a reply stating that \$1,000 a year was the out-side figure. He wrote saying that he understood that the farmers in district paid their men to feed hogs \$75 a month and board, and as the teacher's stipend only figured out at about \$80 a month, without board, he therefore recommended them to quit raising children and concentrate on hogs. Can you blame him?

C. N. R. Management Not to Give Daily Service on L.N.R. As Intended.

A meeting of the Council of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held recently to hear a draft of the annual report of the C. N. R. to the Government, a reference to the L.N.R. and after discussion was approved.

It was also suggested that the management of the C. N. R. had decided to run an express and stopping three days a week only commencing May 1st.

The Council was strongly opposed to this and appointed Messrs. D. A. Stewart, P. M. Shannon, W. S. Richards, and Geo. G. McKenzie a committee to look after this matter.

It is felt that the large amount of traffic over this road warrants a daily service and this should be provided.

Irrigation Best Kind of Farming

Col. J. S. Dennis tells of introduction.

Just why the farmers of the southern territory of the prairie provinces are clamoring for further extensions of the existing irrigation schemes was made clear recently, when Col. J. S. Dennis, of the C. P. R. Department of Colonization and Development, addressed the professors and students of MacDonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, on irrigation in the west. The large attendance listened intently to the lecture, which was admirably illustrated with a series of lantern slides depicting the progress of the C. P. R. irrigation system and the fruits of this method of farming.

The speaker divided his discourse under three heads, dealing with the introduction of irrigation in Alberta, by the C. P. R., and the motives which had induced him to recommend and urge this, the success as proved by the company but the temporary failure of some settlers due to lack of experience in the application of water and cycle of wet years; the reversal of opinion after practical tests, and the consequent overwhelming demand for further irrigation projects on the prairie.

"For a long time," said Col. Dennis, "there were many who claimed that irrigation was unnecessary in Western Canada. Because conditions of climate do not regularly occur, they argued, there was not the same urgency as in the east, where the soil is generally situated in a valley, and the rainfall is usually sufficient to grow crops. THE SEA MUSSEL INDUSTRY

A novel industry which promises
rapid expansion and great popularity
is no less than the development of a
submarine for the abundant but
somewhat costly oyster.

This is the sea mussel, found in vast
quantities along the low coast of the
Atlantic coast, chiefly in New Brun-
swick. The Dominion Government,
in co-operation with scientists, has
conducted experiments to this end
in Western University labora-
tories and it is now about to be
produced commercially at 15 cents
per quart, as compared with the 25.00
per quart around which oyster prices
hover.

The mussel is by no means a new
article of diet to the people of Can-
ada, and besides being used exten-
sively in coast towns has found its
way to the tables of inland cities in
Central Canada. Its delicacy of
flavor and high food value have been
much advertised since the establish-
ment of government, investigation
and experiment, and desirous to be
much better known. There is yet
much to be done in the line of re-
search to ascertain conditions under
which production would be most
rapid and profitable, and to this
end the Council of Industrial and
Scientific Research is devoting its ef-
forts.

A survey of the mussel beds of the
St. Croix River, which constitutes
the boundary between New Brun-
swick and Maine, has occupied the at-
tention of a scientist of the council
for three years now, and it is ex-
pected that this summer will see the
satisfactory conclusion of the re-
search. It is believed that the beds
of mussels are practically unlimited,
and the work occupying those ex-
posed is merely the best conditions
of development. It has also been
determined that there are possibilities,
however, for the development of
fresh-water mussels with the same
advantages over the mussel beds to
the south of the Dominion. These

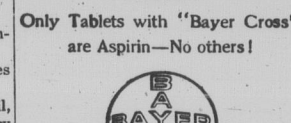

IN BRIEF**

(By C.P.A. Telegram)

Ottawa, Ont.—The Soldiers' Settle-
ment Board announces that action is
being taken to dispose of 75,000
acres of Hudson's Bay reserve land
in Saskatchewan and Alberta, which
have been cancelled by the Crown,
and 10,400 acres of Doukhobor re-
serve lands near Kamark, Saskat-
chewan. Another 30,000 acres of
grazing land will also be opened up.
The whole 115,000 acres will be
available for soldier settlement after
April 30th.

Ottawa, Ont.—A return brought
down in Parliament of the total
enlistments in Canada for the Cana-
dian Expeditionary Force at 580,572.
By provinces the number was as fol-
lows: Ontario, 243,677; Quebec, 82,
793; New Brunswick, 25,844; Nova
Scotia and Prince Edward Island,
33,342; Manitoba, 66,219; Saskatche-
wan, 37,565; Alberta, 45,146; British
Columbia, 3,438; Yukon, 2,227.

Ottawa, Ont.—The applications of
over 100 Imperial veterans who de-
sire to take advantage of the Soldier
Land Settlement scheme, have been
approved. These veterans will be
required to spend at least one year
on farms in Canada to become fami-
liar with Canadian methods. The
others will be absorbed into the
Board's training establishments and
will be required to spend at least two
years farming in Canada before be-
coming eligible for the loan benefits
of the Act.

Quebec, P.Q.—During the last 15
years the Province of Quebec has
spent \$2,000,000 on highways. In
1920 the ordinary annual provincial
grants for education are \$2,000,000.
The capital invested in pulp and
paper plants within the province is
\$84,000,000 and the number of mill
employees about 10,000.

Sherbrooke, P.Q.—The Campbell-
Howard Machine Company, formerly
the Sherbrooke Iron Works Ltd.,
have sold their business to G. L.
Bourne and F. A. Schaaf, of New
York. These gentlemen are respec-
tively president and vice-president of
the Locomotive Superheater Co., of
New York, railway supply people,
and it is the intention to manufac-
ture railway supplies for Canada,
also to carry on a general foundry
and machine business.

Montreal, P.Q.—According to an
announcement made by J. Lyndall,
vice-president of the Trans-Canada
Theatres, Ltd., this company will
shortly start the construction of a
new theatre to be erected, close to
the C. P. R. Vancouver Hotel, which
will have a seating capacity of about
2,000 and cost \$400,000; construction
of which will start shortly.
