Hair Dve. FOR THE SATURDAY EVENING POST. Take gallic acid 10 grains. Acetic acid ounce. Tincture of sesqui chloride of

Dissolve the gallic acid in the tincture sesqui chloride of iron, and then add the ascetic acid. Before using this preparation the hair should be thoroughly washed, with soap and water. A great desideratum in this receipt is, it can be so applied, as to color the hair either black, or the lighter shade of brown. If black is desired, the preparation should be applied while the hair is moist. and for the brown, it should not be used till the hair is perfectly dry. The way to apfine tooth comb into it until the interstices are filled with the fluid, then gently draw the comb through the hair, commencing at and brush as usual.

Chase of an English Steamer by the Tuscarora. Our readers may remember that, towards the close of November last, the steamer Thistle, bound from Liverpool to Nassau, was boarded soon after leaving the Funchal Roads, where she had put in to coal, by the Federal cruiser Tuscarora. A passenger on board the Thistle sends the following account of the affair to the Scotsman:—With surrise on Saturday morning, the Thistle got up her steam and her anchor, and, passing between the two war ships (the Tuscarora and H. M. S. Leopard,) dipped her ensign as she passed each. The American took no notice of the compliment; the Englishman did, and dipped his in return. 
