Appalling Catastrophe!

Burning of the Hotel Royal, New York.

A Hundred and Fifty People in the Ill-Fated Building.

Five Corpres Taken From the Ruins and a Hundred Missing-Scenes of Terror and Marvelous Escapes.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 .- An appalling catastrophe paralleling in horror and per haps exceeding in loss of life the Park Place disaster of last summer, occurred in this city at an early hour this morning. The Hotel Royal, at Sixth Avenue and Fortieth street, opposite Bryant Park, was completely burned, and many persons were suffocated and crushed in the ruins. Five burned, crushed and disfigured bodies, within a short time after the breaking out of the flames, were removed to the morgue, and it is feared that scores of other perand it is feared that scores of other per-sons are buried in the ruins. Fire broke out shortly after 3 o'clock this morning and spread with fearful rapidity, cutting off all means of escape for the guests rooming in the upper stories of the build-ing. The fire started in the basement near the clevator shaft, which was located in the middle of the building. in the middle of the building.

THE FLANES DISCOVERED.

The flames were first seen pouring out of the cupola by an engineer on a Sixth avenue elevated railroad train, who stopped his engine directly in front of the hotel and blew the locomotive's whistle loud and continuously. This unusal sound awoke many of the sleeping people in the hotel and brought policemen to the scene, who at once summoned the fire brigade. Meanwhile the employes of the hotel on night duty sought to arouse the guests by their crics of "Fire!" The fire chief in charge on arriving rung three more alarms in quick succession. Meanwhile the most HEARTHENDING AND SICKENING SCENES were being enacted. The horror-stricken crowd that had quickly gathered in the streets about the doomed building saw men and women clad only in their night clothes. THE FLAMES DISCOVERED. and women clad only in their night clothe

and women clad only in their night clothes jump from the upper stories and fall upon the stone flagging of the sidewalks crushed to death or scriously injured. Eyewitnesses tell of the appearance at the upper windows of terror-stricken men and women, who, unable to find escape, fell back overcome by the smoke and flames.

EVERY WINDOW FILLED WITH HUMAN BEINGS.

Every window of the building seemed filled with men, women and children crying out piteously for those below to save them. Some of these were certainly burned to death. The first hook and ladder company reached the scene about seven minutes reached the scene about seven minutes after the flames were discovered, and the fremen lost no time in running up their ladders to windows for the work of rescue, while firemen, policemen and citizens mounted ladders and carried down women mounted ladders and carried down women and children to places of safety. The staircases and elevator shafts within the building were now completely enveloped in flames. The fire escapes in rear of the building afforded a means of escape to some, while the fire ropes provided in all rooms were utilized by many male guests in reaching the street.

WHEN THE WALLS FELL people were seen at several windows on the top floor crying for help, but they fell back and were soon buried in the ruins. The flames of the burning building illuminated the sky for miles around, and drew to the scene an immense crowd of records.

One of the most thrilling escapes of this night of terrors was that of a young man named J. Noonan, of Jersey City, who had been recently married. He came to this city yesterday to celebrate the event with his friends. Noonan was awakened by the shouts of fire and the cries for help of men and women in the building. For a moment he was dazed, but in an instant he collected his scattered senses. He looked out of the window and no ladder was near him, so, with the confidence of an athlete, he swung himself from the window sill to the window below, and from one window to the other he descended until he reached the ground. THRILLING ESCAPE.

THE BURNED HOTEL.
The Hotel Royal was built more than 25 The Hotel Royal was built more than 25 years ago. It was formerly kept by Messrs, Peris & Eutler, but Mr. Mears leased it thirteen years ago. In 1882 the building was remodeled and an addition was made on the south side. It had 124 rooms. The house was the home of many persons in the theatrical profession, and was patronized chiefly by transients for a night. Many families made it, however, their permanent place of residence. The elaborate restaurant was liberally patronized by the class of people who kept late hours in the upper part of Tender Loin District.

AFTER THE FIRE.

After the fire had sufficiently cooled to permit a partial examination of the ruins a search was made for the dead. The searchers were at once rewarded by the finding of a charred body, thought to be Henry J. Levy.

The loss on hotel and furniture is estimated at \$250,000. The building is owned by Hyman Israel, furniture dealer on the Bowery.

THE REGISTER.



The Magistrates Find the Prisoners Guilty and Fine Them \$50 and Costs Each or One Month-Notice of Appeal Given-Mr. Hutchinson's Remarks.

in the dehorning case, in which Edward
Yorke, William Yorke and W. A. Elliott
were the defendants. It was as follows:
First—We find the horns referred to in
the information were cut off by W. A.

owner.

Second—Said horns were cut off close to the head, thus cruelly torturing the cows of William Yorke, and no precautions were taken to lessen the pain of the oper-

were taken to lessen the pain of the operation, for to protect the cows afterwards from the consequences of said cruelty.

Third—It does not appear to us from the evidence that there was any necessity to cut off the horns of these cows.

Fourth—Neither does it appear that doing so was an advantage to them, but the whole evidence leads to the conclusion that it was a decided disadvantage to each individual cow to have the horns cut off.

Fifth—There being no advantage to the cows to compensate for the suffering and torture endured by them, there should be adequate advantage to the public generally, and here in our opinion the defense has signally failed to make it appear that such

ignally failed to make it appear that such

ly, and here in our opinion the defense has signally failed to make it appear that such is the ease.

Sixth—But on the contrary, cutting off the horns of milch cows and other cattle, instead of being an advantage, may be the means whereby freud may be perpetrated upon the general public. It is shown in the evidence that after a cow is about 5 years old the horn is the surest means of telling its age, consequently a fraudulent dealer may easily deceive and palm off upon the purchaser an old animal with its horns off, also in judging their breed and milking qualities.

The decision of the bench is that each defendant be fined the sum of \$50, and costs forthwith, and in default of payment, one month in the county jail. (Signed) John B. Smyth, J.P.; R. F. Lacey, J.P.



Smoking in Church.

At one period smoking was so common that it was actually practiced in church. Previous to the visit of James I. to the University of Cambridge, in 1615, the vice-chancellor issued a notice to the students which enjoined that "Noe graduate, scholar, or student of this universitie presume to take tobacco in Saint Marie's Church was primacy final expelling the

sume to take tobacco in Saint Marie's Church, upon painne of final expellinge the universitie."

The Rev. Dr. Parr, when perpetual curate of Hatton, Warwickshire, which living he held from 1783 to 1790, regularly smoked in the vestry while the congregation were singing long hymns, chosen for the purpose, immediately before the sermon. The doctor was wont to exclain, "My people like long hymns, but I prefer a "My people like long hymns, but I prefer a

long pipe."
"The Rev. Robert Hall, of Leicester, the well-known Baptist minister, regularly in-dulged in smoking during the intervals of

melancholy looking. His face is pale, and, though it is distinguished by refinement and quiet dignity, it has none of the force of his martial ancestors, nothing commanding or imperial, but it is altogether mild, delicate, sad, and kind. He is essentially Manchu in features. His skin is strangely pallid in hue, which is, no doubt, accounted for by the confinement of his life inside those forbidding walls and the absence of the ordinary pleasures and pursuits of youth, with the constant discharge of onerous, complicated, and difficult duties of state, which, it must be remembered, are, according to imperial Chinese etiquette, mostly transacted between the hours of two and six in the morning. His face is oval-shaped, with a very long, narrow chin, and a sensitive mouth, with thin nervous lips; his nose is well shaped and straight, divine worship.

Sir Walter Scott, in his "Heart of Midlothian," refers to one Duncan of Knockdunder, an important personage who smoked during the whole of the sermon, from an old iron pipe, tobacco borrowed from other worshipers. We are told that "at the end of the discourse he knocked the ashes out of his pipe, replaced it in his sporran, returned the tobacco pouch to its owner, and joined in the prayer with decency and attention."

The Puritan fathers were greatly addicted to smoking; indeed, the practice became so common that even these straightlaced observers of times and seesons actually smoked in church. This custom soon caused very considerable annoyance, as the religious exercises were greatly disturbed by the clinking of fiints and steels to light their pipes and by the clouds of smoke in church. Hence, in the year 1669, the colony passed this law.

"It is enacted that any person or persons that shall be found smoking of tobacco on the Lord's Day, going to or from the meetings, within two miles of meeting-house, shall pay twelvepence for every such default." Under this law several persons were actually fined, but the punishment failed to secure the carrying out of the arbitrary second portion of the enactment.



THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Ont., Fob. 7.—11 p.m.—An important low pressure area, which since yesterday has traveled with rapidity from the Southwest States, is to-night central over the Lake region. Strong winds and gales have prevailed to-day throughout the Lake region, accompanied by snow and rain, as well as by thunder storms in many places. Snow or rain has also occurred in the St. Lawrence Valley.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 10°—18°; Qu'Appelle, 10° below—8°; Winnipeg, 16° below—2re; Totonto, 16°—35°; Montreal, 8°—14°; Quebec, 2° below—18°; Halifax, 6°—28°.
