

In the latter state the total production up to date has been somewhat over \$500,000. The diamonds found locally are used mostly for glass cutting. While South African diamonds are mostly used in the jewelry trade. Pearls found in pearl shell fishing along the northern coast of Australia are usually small, but their aggregate value is probably considerable.
