SERIOUS TALKING OF **UPWARD REVISION OF ALREADY HIGH PRICES**

Steel Market Quotations Were Believed Due For Drop-Haulage Expensive .

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ending September 9, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

Just when the steel market had it all figured out that prices were due for a drop, especially in the premium mills, rumors come into the market that there is serious talk of an upward revision of the already high prices, And coupled with this is the statement that the United States Steel Corporation is considering bringing up some of its schedules, although there is nothing to give weight to this report. It is a fact, though, that the Steel Corporation will have an added bill of some \$50,000,000 per year for haulage of material and semi-finished shipments, and it is estimated that only one-quarter of this ending September 9. Canadian Machinper year for haulage of material and semi-finished shipments, and it is estimated that only one-quarter of this gets passed on to the consumer.

There are warehouses in this district paying around 9 cents for sheets, while at the same time they have a very large tonnage on the books of the corporation at around 2.65 or a little better. Delivery is the big item just now. Buyers, or prospective buyers of machine tools are not coming very rapidly into the market now. One explanation is that they may be staying out as long as possible, in the hope of a reduction being made in the price of the lines they wish to secure. There has been nothing coming from the makers that would confirm this attitude, but a continued refusal on the part of buyers might lead to some unexpected alterations in the policy of selling.



Husbands For 4,000,000 Women Wanted to Insure Rapid Repopulation.

HEAVY DRAIN IN THE WAR

Government Amends Marriage Laws-Plea to Patriotism Only Real Remedy.

PARIS, Sept. 8.-France's greatest social problem is not prohibition, but 4.000,000 women with a view to insuring more rapid repopulation of the war-

stricken areas and the whole future prosperity of the country.

When the question of producing more children was first broached the press took it up humorously, but a study of the government's statistics brought a more serious vein of comment and fears were even expressed that France may be unable to recover from this decadence.

More than a million and a quarter Frenchmen between the ages of 20 and 25 years were killed, and 300,000 were so badly wounded that they cannot ever hope to assume family duties. These with the ordinary million and a half lachelors, provide France with her immediate task unless yiolent repercussion mediate task unless violent repercussion in the social and economic life of the nation, as well as morals, is to result. Woman Forced to Work.

It is a fact that the Frenchmen's lack of tendency to emigrate complicates the situation and it is hardly likely that even a million men would be willing to leave their homes and come to France even to taste the luxuries of La Belle France and to woo har beauties. In discussing the situation a member of the ministry of hygiene said:

"The equilibrium which was maintained heretofore in the regular alternation of births, male and female, has been completely overthrown by the war. For the last three years millions of French girls have been unable to found homes and have been compelied to work for their living. Everywhere they are in competition with male labor and the women are holding their own only through their intelligence and tenacity. even to taste the luxuries of La Belle

"There is no question of children in this problem. Even should legitimate alliances be formed, records prove that less than half of the offsprings would survive the first year. Appeal to Patriotism.

"Moreover, the cost of living now proibits single women either from found ing their own homes or aiding in the upkeep of the family hearths. The war and celibacy among the male population has turned both sexes toward a natural destination—the abhorrence of married life. They will never wed and will never tem of free love which will not benefit the state or society."

Asked what remedy for this would be

possible, he said: "There is none. It is inpossible to bring back the dead or to tinpossible to bring back the dead or to take couples forcibly to the marriage altar. France's salvation depends entirely upon the men and women realizing personally the danger in which their preference for single blessedness places Meanwhile officials are doing every thing in their power to overcome the little difficulties in the routine of mar-riage. The French law has always de-manded the consent of both parents of manded the consent of both parents of
the bride, even in cases where these
parents have been divorced. This was
amended last week and the law now
provides that consent is only necessary
from the parent charged as guardian.

ALSACE TO RETAIN PECULIAR TONGUE

Combination of French and German To Continue as the Language of Province.

Paris. Sept. 7 .- One of the greatest of France's reconstruction problems is to determine just what encouragement is to be given to the use of the peculiar half-French half-German dialect of the Alsatians. After long study of the con-ditions in the restored provinces, and after questioning thousands of pegants after questioning thousands of peasants and townsfolk, a recommendation has been made to the French Government urging that no effort be made to prohibit the teaching of German in the schools of Alsace, but that greater effort be made to teach the people the beauties of the French tongue and literature, at the same time recognizing the dialect of Alsace as the language of a people which has shown heroic fidelity to France.

> The educational problem is exceedingly complex. Few of the Alsatian teachers were able to instruct in French; those who had had any previous training in French schools were only able to teach imperfectly. > In order to bridge this difficulty it has been decided to commence the teaching of French as soon as the pupils enter the schools. German will not appear in the curriculum until the fourth to literature. appear in the curriculum until the fourth

appear in the curriculum until the fourth year, when, thanks to the similarity of the dialect and the German vocabulary, rapid progress may be attained in both the national and provincial tongues.

In short, the French have realized that it is unwise to expect the patriotic citizens of Alsace to give up a speech which meets with all the conditions of life so close to the Rhine, and which, even in the seventeenth century, was more extensively used than either French or German. If after the Prussian victors of 1871 the Germans had not sian victory of 1871 the Germans had not made the use of German compulsory to the exclusion of French, the dialect might gradually have disappeared; but such a solution is now impossible. The dialect of the Alsatian homes formed an easy method of bewildering the German masters of Alsace during forty-five years, and, to use the words of one French educator, "when fifty years hence an Alsatian grandfather is asked to tell the story of France's recovery of her cherished possessions, it will be told in the speech of Alsace, for it is in dialect that the Alsatian heart





ROME, Sept. 8 .- Italy is again suffering from an earthquake disaster, the extent of which has not yet been measured. It is known, however, that hundreds of persons have been killed and thousands injured. Many small towns and villages have been wrecked, and although assistance is being hurried from all parts of the country to

the afflicted area, there is much sultering for want of food, medicines and shelter for the people.

Every earthquake disaster is for Italy like a lost battle," said expremier Luzzatti after the Avezzano catastrophe, and this is now repeated in Tuscany. Hawaii's native race will be extinct in 75 years if the ratio of births and deaths set by the official figures for the fiscal year 1919-20 is maintained. This is indicated by the report of Dr. F. E. Trotter, president of the territorial board of health, which shows that during the year the deaths of pure-blooded Hawaiians totaled 1,009, while there were 676 births.

There are approximately 25,000 pure-blooded Hawaiians living on the Hawaiian islands, according to estimates. Reports for the past years show decreases in their numbers.

In marked contrast with the evidence that the Hawaiians are members of a "dying race," are the vital statistics dealing with those who represent mixtures of Hawaiian with Caucasian and Asiatic blood.





Capt. Streeter has been fighting since 1886 to establish his claim to one of the most valuable sections of Chicago's lake front. In that year, his steamer, the Reutan, stranded on the beach during a storm. Capt. Streeter built a breakwater about the stranded boat, 450 feet off shore, and made it his home. The rapidly shifting sands filled in the space between boat and shore, and added 193 acres to the city's area. To this iand Capt. Streeter laid claim, and in and Capt. Streeter laid claim, and in

ed 155 acres to the city's area. To this iand Capt. Streeter laid claim, and in the next quarter of a century battles by the hundred were fought in an effort to oust him.

On one occasion 500 police besieged Streeterville. "Gen." Niles proclaimerd himself "military governor of the district of Lake Michigan," and with 50 men of his "escort" erected breastworks, surmounted by barbed wire, and stood off the police for several days, before desertions in the ranks so weakened the defending force that a lone policeman finally executed a flank attack and carried the fort.

The courts in 1915 ruled that Streeter had no title to the property, and his brick castle, which had succeeded the steamboat home, was wrecked by deputy sheriffs and then burned.

In 1902 Streeter and two friends were convicted of manslaughter in connection with the death of John's Evita convicted of manslaughter in con-nection with the death of John S. Kirke, killed in one of the frequent assaults on the castle. All were sentenced to life imprisonment, but after a few iffe imprisonment, but after a few months were released.

The site of the "deestrict" is now covered by more than a dozen sky-scraper apartment buildings and hotels. The land is valued at more than \$50,-000,000. Many of the present owners have purchased deeds from Streeter, as well as the state, in order that their occupancy may not be interfered with by the 80-year-old fire-eating veteran.

Streeter's claim is based on the contention that the act creating the state of Illinois fixed the "meander line" of the lake as the boundary, and that therefore his "deestrict" was outside the state and owed allegiance to no one except the United States. The courts held, however, that Illinois extended to the centre of Lake Michigan, that all land created by natural secretions of the lake belonged to the adjoining property owners, and that all land created artificially belonged to the state. The stranding of Streeter's steamship created land artificially, it was held.



WASHINGTON. Sept. 8.—Although a technical state of war still exists between the United States and Germany and Austria, trade with those countries is rapidly increasing. Reports of the department of commerce show that exports to Germany totaled \$202,176,079 during the corresponding twelve months the year before. Imports from Germany jumped \$944,981 in 1919 to \$45,085,975 during the year ending July 1.

Exports to Austria, as distinguished from Austria-Hungary, were valued at \$11,847,127, as compared with nothing the year before. Imports from that country for the same period were valued at \$587,108.

Trade with Russia in Europe also showed a substantial increase in the past year, exports being valued at \$34,639,901, as compared with \$11,000,000 the year before. Imports from that country, however, were valued at only \$2,443,288.

FRENCH BURGLARS **USE CHLORINE GAS**

Kill Watchdogs in Outlying Chateaux.

PARIS, Sept. 8.—Not the least afterresult of the war is the increase in crime in nearly all the beligerent countries, but a group of French burglars have supplied the climax by using army poison gas projectors in order to silence watchdogs at isolated chateaux.

At Massy burglars left an empty chlorine tank and two gas masks after ransacking a farmhouse while the ccupants slept in peaceful confidence. Two gas-strangled hounds completed the picture, but there is little clue to the identity of the daring burglars.

As a result of this the French army has received orders to make an inventory of all gas apparatus on hand and to take strictest measures to prevent the disappearance of any of it.

"It should be borne in mind that European Ryssia has been greatly reduced in size," said Col. Englehard. "Formerly it had over 5,000,000 square kilometres of land and 157,000,000 inhabitants. Poland, Finland, a great part of the Caucasus and several Baltic provinces, with about 50,000,000 inhabitants, and about 1,250,000 square kilometres of land, have detached inhabitants, and about 1,250,000 square kilometres of land, have detached themselves. The greater part of these detached territories ordinarily had a notable surplus of grain and other farm products, which constituted the major part of Russia's exports.

The sugar industry is so disorganized and fuel so scarce he does not believe Soviet Russia will be able to supply its local market for many years. Flax is the one farm product which Col. Englehard believes Soviet Russia will be able to export in large quantities immediately.

Large quantities of oil still are stored and produced in the Baku fields, and it is the product which, all the world is seeking. Relic of Mediaeval Romanticism Is Seen Along the Thames.

London, Sept. 8.—"Swan-upping" has begun on the Tnames. From Southwark Bridge six boats, carrying men garbed in parti-colored jackets, set out to mark the cygnets hatched during the spring. They ere the swan herdsmen of the King, distinguishable by their red jerseys, and also of the Dyers' and Vintners' Companies, the latter wearing striped jackets. There were three men in each boat.
