London, Jan. 31.—The Right Hon.

Washington, Jan. 31.—A called meeting of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association was held here with a view to directing the attention of the American members of the Joint High Commission to the urgent need that a policy be adopted which shall protect the American forests by securing in the treaty now in course of preparation between the United States and Canada a revocation of the present duty on print paper and pulp from Canada. After a brief and informal discussion a statement of the views of the American Publishers' Association was adopted, ordered to be printed and presented to the members of the commission and to Representatives and Senators' in Congress. It says:

"The delegated representatives of a large number of newspapers, in meeting assembled at Washington, Jan. 30, 1899, respectfully submit to the President and to the American commissioners that the honest intentions which originally induced the establishment of protection."

Lots of Claimants Coming Forward in England.

London, Jan. 31,-London is threat london, Jan. 31.—London is threat-ened with an epidemic of peersge claimants. Two besides Viscount Hin-ton have appeared last week. One is a solicitor who, in preparing his own case for the courts says that his fa-ther, a peer who recently died, previ-ously disentailed the estate and made were the whole arroperty to him. The over the whole property to him. The man thought then that this was done merely because of his great friendship with the peer, whose other son by a second wife succeeded to the title. The new peer and the solicitor quarrelled over the old Earl's settlements, and a

woman who afterward died in an asylum.

Another claimant is James Stafford, an elderly builder, of North London, who claims the earldom of Stafford with ten thousand acres and three fine-castles. He says he is the direct male descendent of Hervey de Stafford, created Baron it 1183. The Barony was unjuwfully obtained from Charles I., by William Howard, of whom the present holder claims to be a descendant. Stafford says this is impossible, as the male side was extinct in 1762 and the female line in 1807. He has a room full of documents proving that he is the rightful heir. They include a letter from Lord Redesdaje in 1869, then chairman of the committee on privileges of the House of Lords, declaring that Roger Stafford has surrendered the larony to the King in 1640, but that the surrender was invalid, and did nor offect the claim of any one lawfully entitled to the succession.

BIRDS VERSUS INSECTS.

A constant war is being carried on, mays Mr. Nash, in his very useful pumphlet on birds, between the insect world and the vegetable kingdom. The laws of nature would keep the balance about evenly adjusted. But man requires that it should be inclin-ed in favor of the plants he culti-vates for his own use. To obtain this end it is necessary that we should against our insect enemies, and while they are not the only ones, yet the birds are the most important allies we can have in the struggle. (We cannot very well increase their number or officiency by any artificial means, but we can protect them from such of their natural enemies as occur in our own neighborhood, and we can encourage them to remain and breed about our farms and gardens. If this was done all over the country gen-erally, we should find ourselves amply repaid for the small amount of trouble expended, by the protection they would give our plant life against its destruc-

#### CLEANING CHICKENS.

Rew They Should Be Washed to Fit Them For Eating.

A correspondent of The National Stockman calls attention to the necessity for thoroughly washing chickens to make them fit to eat. She (the correspondent is, of course, a woman) says:
"We all know that chickens dust their feathers wherever and whenever they feathers wherever and whenever they have the opportunity, in the road, in the ash heap, in the barnyard, and, more than that, we indulge them in it, because it keeps off the vermin. Would we expect to get our own bodies clean of ordinary accumulations with a shower of hard water? How then can we

"'I never saw any one clean a chicken as you do,' said my mother when last she visited me. Then I heard her say to my husband a few hours later that she could relish my chicken because she was certain it was clean. This is the method: The chicken is scalded in a clean dishpan with clean well water. (Have actually seen people soald them in the mop pail and swill pail.) Then it is relieved of all pinfeathers, etc., and singed after the usual fashion. The dishpan is rinsed out and the fowl singed after the usual fashion. The dishpan is rinsed out and the fowl washed therein with a tepid suds of clean rainwater and soap powder, the skin being scrubbed thoroughly with a 5 cent vegetable brush. The brush will cleanse without breaking the skin. One who thinks the skin of a fowl does not need much cleaning should contrast one before and after this bath or take a good look at the bath water. Next, the fowl is well rinsed with cold, clean fowl is well rinsed with cold, clean well water, which finishes the cleansing

process before dissecting and plumps and firms the mest as well.

"After the dissecting the pieces are washed through two or three waters or until all traces of blood have disap-peared. This is not as much trouble as the description might cause a reader to think, and anyway we would rather eat one prepared in this way, if it took an extra hour. So will you after you have once tried it. No scum ever rises while cooking, and the meat is white and sweet."

Hens are early risers and want to be fed as soon as they come down from the roost. See that they are well supplied with clean water and a box of ashes or dry earth to dust themselves in. We will start with a hen that lays 120 eggs. Some of her chicks will lay 150 per year. From these we will pick out layers, and so on until 200 or better are the result. #### Fitting Geese For Market.

When young goslings are to be dressed ir market, they are killed by cutting for market, they are killed by cutting them in the roof of the month, severing the artery or by stunning them by hit-ting them a sharp, quick blow on the head. The picker uses a box in front of him about the height of the kneez, holding the bird with the left hand and clasping the feet and wings together. He places the head of the bird against He places the head of the bird against the box and holds it in place with the knee. Pick the feathers from the body of the bird, then dampen the right hand and brush the body to remove the down. Leave about two inches of feathers on the neck, and also leave feathers on the nings at the first joint. Lay the wings against the body of the bird and tie a string around to hold in position. Place the birds, when ploked, in cold water for an hour or so to plump'them. If they are in too long, they are liable to bleach and become water soaked.—Feather.

Their Injurious Effects Upon the Ansemic and the Old.

The Journal of Tropical Medicine has an interesting a tirle on the use of the cold tub in tropical countries, in which it is shown that, health giving as it may be to those who are young and vigorous and nowly arrived, it is by no means a process to be universally advised. In the tropics a daily bath of some sort becomes a uscessity for purposes of cleanliness alone. But the "tub" which is indulged in by Europeans—that is, immersion in cold water, or, at any rate, in water that is distinctly colder than the body, for, say, five minutes—has a distinct physiological action besides the removal of dirk, and the question is whether this is good or bail. It is rejuted out that the shock is relatively greater than in temperate climates; that the abstraction of heat during the process can be but ill afforded, and that the depression of temperature induced is difficult to recover from.

It is also insisted on that neither the circulation nor the respiratory organs respond to the stimulus, and that, especially in the case of those who are "gotting on" in years, the digestive organs may be congested to a dangerous extent. 

To this transaction he adds the sale of what are known as authors' tickets—that is, free tickets granted to authors and others—and thus he holds in his hands the disposition of all tickets sold outside the how offices. To the amounts thus realized are added the obligatory "presents" of the actors, of whom hany pay from 100 to 500 francs a month to have their entries and recalls well "claqued."

Under these conditions a claque chief, if intelligent, becomes very quickly a

er 60,000 francs' worth of tickets, or else they cede to him the "curtain-raiser" for a determined period by an arrangement as follows: The claque chief bays; a one-act play from some poor playwright for a few louis, and has it played for several hundred times consecutively, appropriating to himself the author's rights. NEED NOT FAST.

On account of the prevalence of grip, Archbishop Bruchesi, of Montreal, says:
"I decree for the coming Lenten season the following discipline regarding fasting and abstinence:—The only days of fusting and abstinence during the whole of that period, including Holy Week, will be Wednesdays and Cridays of each week, as well as the Saurday of the quarte temps. On all others days the faithful will be exempt from fasting and will be permitted to set meat at the three meals. This exemption from abstinence at the three meals extends even to persons who fast on the days on which fasting is maintained."
