

Canada's Commercial Metropolis

WHEN Jacques Cartier voyaged up the St. Lawrence River in 1535 in quest of the walled city of Hochelaga he found the Indian village nestled under a majestic height of land which he called Mount Royal and in a slightly corrupted form that is the name of the City of Montreal to-day.

The real history of Montreal begins with the landing of Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve and a party of about three score on the 18th of May, 1642. Mass was celebrated and Father Vimont must have had a prophetic vision as he addressed the little party with these words: "You are a grain of mustard seed that shall rise and grow till its branches overshadow the earth. You are few, but your work is the work of God. His smile is upon you and your children shall fill the land."

It was the fur trade that gave Montreal its start. In spite of the almost ruinous competition among the companies, the trade that they brought to the base of Mount Royal increased the size and importance of the town. Then came a growing lumber industry and wheat exportation, an important factor in the commercial life. Business in these commodities was hindered for a time by ill-advised interference of the King. Bigot and "Frippe" plundered the merchants. But the town rose superior to adversity and after the "Seven Years'

War" a rapidly growing shipbuilding industry soon fixed Montreal as an important maritime port.

John Molson, founder of the brewing business, now carried on under that name, built the second steam vessel in America and the "Accommodation" as she was called, made the run between Montreal and Quebec in 36 hours.


Montreal has risen to the proud position of the first city of the Do-

minion, and one of the first cities of the continent. Broad streets, towering skyscrapers, palatial residences, wonderful churches, and quaint relics of the past vie with each other to interest the visitor to the city founded by Maisonneuve.

The heart of the city, is the Place d'Armes. There stands the wonderful statue of Maisonneuve by Louis Hébert. This bronze monument depicts him in cuirass and the French costume of the seventeenth century bearing aloft the fleur-de-lys banner. The granite pedestal which supports the bronze bears the inscription "Paul de Chomedey de Maisonneuve, Fondateur de Montreal, 1642." There are several bas-reliefs representing Maisonneuve killing the Indian chief, the founding of Ville-Marie, and the deaths of Lambert, Closse and Dollard. Facing the Maisonneuve Statue is the Church, Notre Dame de Montreal, a Gothic pile that is the religious center of a whole race. This majestic temple accommodates fifteen thousand people and vast sums have been expended upon it. The interior is even more interesting than the exterior and the two massive tiers of galleries are very impressive. This church contains many relics of great antiquity. In the west tower is the largest bell in America "Le Gros Bourdon" which is only sounded on the most solemn occasions. It weighs 24,780 pounds.

On the north side of the Square is the Bank of Montreal, noted for its beautiful architecture. The sculpture

on the front is by John Steele, R.S.A.

Another spot of interest is Jacques Cartier Square. Here are the City Hall and the Nelson Column which was erected in 1809 by subscriptions of both the French and the English. The City Hall is a modern structure and already inadequate to the rapidly growing needs of the city.

WORK WON PRAISE

—(Montreal Standard)

Although all sections of the 26th Battalion carried out its work in gallant fashion, perhaps no chapter of exploits is so brilliant as that of the scout section led by Lieut. (now Capt.) E. A. Sturdee, son of Col. F. T. Sturdee, of St. John. An official announcement by Lord Beaverbrook (then Sir Max Aitken), official eye witness with the Canadian Corps in France, on February 3, says:

"On the night of January 29, a patrol consisting of Lieuts. Sturdee and Winter, Sergt. Pierce and Pte. Cossaboom, of the 26th New Brunswick Battalion, cut through the German wire and made useful reconnaissances."

Capt. Sturdee mentioned in this report, is now an officer in the 236th Maclean Kilties of America, and Lieut. Basil Winter, also of St. John, was killed a few weeks ago in the operations around Lens, and had won an additional star several months before his death.

The incident related above was one of six minor operations, all of which were successfully carried out during the week of January 27-February 2. It is well known that it was a matter of difficulty for the scout officers of the unit to choose men for any particularly

dangerous bit of work, owing to the fact that every member of his section was desirous of participating.

Some idea of the splendid work accomplished by Capt. Sturdee and his scout section may be gained from the following letter from the General commanding the division to Lieut.-Col. McAvity as follows:

"The G. O. C. wishes conveyed to your scout officers and his scouts the keen appreciation of the valuable services rendered by them at all times during the past five months in 'No Man's Land' under the most trying conditions; the ascendancy which they have so largely helped to secure has added greatly to the security of our front."

DEFEATED CRACK TEAM

THE Kilties have reason to be proud of their football team for at their first game at Montreal with an outside organization they came through with a victory that is creditable for they were opposed to a strong team. The Kiltie football

team travelled to Beloeil on October 20th, where they met the crack Beloeil team, who have been defeated but once before in three seasons, and who had an unbroken string of victories this year until their encounter with the Kilties.

It was a fast game, though the ground was in bad condition, owing to the rain the night before. The Macleans won by a score of 3 to 2.

In the first half on a breakaway by Beloeil and a slip up by the Macleans Shorrock got possession of the ball and by a pretty play slipped it by Haldane, who had no chance to save. First goal for Beloeil. For the next few minutes the Kilties kept the play around Beloeil's goal, and Skeggs slipped the ball to Rourke, who put it in the net. Rourke was in fine trim, and only for luck and the cross bar he would have repeated.

The second half opened with Beloeil pressing, but the Kiltie defence stood up to all attacks. At this stage of the game, Johnson, Skeggs and Green were playing great ball, breaking up

the home team's forwards' combination and placing the ball nicely. Calvert receiving the ball from Walker, let go, but struck the goal keeper, who could not clear in time. Rourke had the ball in the net. Skeggs hit the goal-keeper on a penalty kick, and shortly after Beloeil scored through Tanswell. It looked as though the Kilties would lose the lead when the referee ordered a penalty kick against Green, but Spooner showed his heel to the opposing backs, and placed the ball in the net for the final goal.

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

WELL, boys, the whistle's blowing; ferry-boat is waiting for us; and we're heading for the briny. We're going somewhere, and everybody, even the bunch in the clink, is tickled with the news. This is probably the last Canadian edition of the "Breath" and that in itself is something to be thankful for.

This is where we cease to be an overland battalion and the "O.S." commences to have a meaning. There is only one damper on the general rejoicing at the prospect of getting across and that is the possibility of a new edition of the "Breath" on the other side. But, cheer up! we may meet a submarine. Speaking of submarines, one of the fellows was getting ready for a dip in the Y.M.C.A. tank the other night and he said "I like going in swimming but this getting undressed is a nuisance." Somebody suggested that he wait a week or so. Anyway, let the submarines do their worst, there isn't a place in the Atlantic that has anything on dear old Valcartier when it comes to being wet.

People have been mighty good to us both in the "States" and at home. We are leaving behind us folks that are doing their "bit" just as courageously and energetically as the men in the trenches—the kind of people that would be in the trenches if they were physically able to be there. We are going to think of those good people when we get across and of their labors of love which helped us to form the "Macleans" and we are going to try to repay them by using up an extra clip of cartridges now and then, when we get the chance.

We are a long way from being an efficient fighting unit yet. We know we have about everything to learn and that our few months at Valcartier did not make soldiers of us, but this is where we take off our coats and have our try at getting out of the recruit class.

Another thing, right here, is where we cease to be New Brunswick recruits, Western recruits, or Boston recruits, from now on we are the "Maclean Kilties" and the Battalion spirit which has been making strides since we got the boys all together under one roof and gave them a chance to get acquainted with each other, is going to be a mighty tangible thing then the ship "Something" noses into the overseas port.

All ashore that's going ashore. A last blast of the whistle. A splash of the hawsers and So Long! Everybody!!

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BREATH O' THE HEATHER

THE Kilties are appreciative of their good fortune in being quartered in warm, comfortable barracks in Montreal instead of being exposed to the weather at Valcartier while they await the day of embarkation for overseas. The Peel Street Barracks provide excellent accommodation for the battalion and after the disagreeable weather of the last few weeks at Valcartier, rank and file consider themselves lucky in being so well housed. The city itself is proving interesting to all, for a large part of the men come from distant parts of the continent and few of them have ever had an opportunity to explore the Canadian metropolis.

* * *

On the night of October 13th, a special train bore 500 Boston Kilties back to their home town on last leave. No one who made the trip will forget the hearty reception they were given everywhere, for everyone they came in contact with impressed upon them the fact that the Kilties are regarded as a unit in whom Boston will always have an interest. There is a custom which has originated in the States since they entered the war of displaying in every church and from every home a flag bearing a star for every man who has gone from that church or home for overseas service. They count the Kilties as a local unit in carrying out the practice and several hundred stars are being displayed for

men in the ranks of The Maclean Kilties of America.

* * *

Twelve hundred men swinging along in the Maclean tartan to the music of the pipes is an inspiring sight and few of us realized the difference in the appearance of the battalion that would be wrought by the arrival of the kilts. As the bands blared forth and the battalion marched out, every man in kilt for the first parade in Highland costume, they presented a splendid appearance. The Kilts represent the investment of a large sum of money which would mean a dead loss if the battalion were to lose its identity; and that should be a potent argument for the wish that is first in the heart of every man in the Macleans—the wish to go to the firing line with pals rather than strangers, with the unit which is the object of a real *esprit de corps*.

* * *

Fletcher's Field, Montreal, was the scene of the first real inspection of the Kilties as a full battalion. The 236th has been inspected two or three times in the past when it numbered only a few hundred but the inspection on Tuesday, October 23rd, by Major-General E. W. Wilson, G.O.C., was the first time in the history of the battalion that it has been able to present its full strength on such an event. Over eleven hundred men in kilt and sporran, marched on to the field to the music of the three Kiltie Bands. After a general salute and the usual inspection by the General and his staff, the battalion marched past the reviewing officer in platoon formation. Then company by company, and platoon by platoon, they executed various drill movements that demonstrated the work they have been doing at Valcartier for the last few months. The Kilties have had very little opportunity to practice movements in Battalion formation as their time during the last summer has been largely taken up in the musketry and bayonet fighting practice. Then again a large number of the men have been away from the battalion with detachments

doing guard and garrison duty but they carried through the movements in a creditable manner. After the company and platoon drills the Kilties marched past again in column of route and after hearty cheers for the King and the inspecting officer the battalion returned to the barracks.

* * *

GAINED PROMOTIONS

Lieutenant William L. Delaney, formerly Company Sergeant-Major of "D" Company, received his promotion as a reward for service to the battalion since he enlisted in August of 1916. The promotion gave pleasure to the entire battalion for Mr. Delaney was as popular as he was efficient. He enlisted at the outbreak of the war and saw service in France with the 14th Battalion until he was wounded at Festubert on May 21st, 1915. He was born at Irishtown, P.E.I., and is 26 years of age.

* * *

The promotion of Company Sergeant-Major Irving Deloss Appleby of "B" Company to the rank of Lieutenant is the second time he has received the distinction. Mr. Appleby was granted his commission in the first Canadian Division, in January of 1916 by the late Brigadier-General Mercer and Lieut.-General Currie. He was carrying on with his unit waiting to be notified to report at the officers training school at St. Omer but became a casualty and several months later was invalided home to Canada. On his recovery he enlisted with the Kilties. He is a native of New Brunswick, twenty-seven years of age, and an original member of the Kilties.

* * *

Sergeant R. Murray Finlayson is the first of the Boston recruits to receive a commission with the Kilties. He was born in Scotland but has been a resident of Boston for the last six years, five of which he spent as assistant buyer of leather goods for the Jordan Marsh Co. He has been the Chief of Clan MacKinlay, Dorchester, for the last two years and was

Treasurer of the Grand Clan of Massachusetts. Lieutenant Finlayson started his military career at the age of 14 years as a trumpeter in the Scottish Rifles 5th Seaforths. Last summer he attended the officers training camp at Plattsburg.

OUR FINAL REVIEW

(*Montreal Star*)

Not since the beginning of the war has a battalion been submitted to a more thorough inspection than that which took place this morning on Fletcher's Field, when Major-Gen. E. W. Wilson, G.O.C., of the 4th Military District reviewed the 236th Battalion Maclean Kilties of America, preparatory to their departing in a few days to continue training elsewhere. Seldom would one find a finer body of men brought together than those who compose this splendid unit. Notwithstanding the fact that a considerable portion of the men have joined only recently, the battalion as a whole stood well the rigid test to which the G.O.C. put them. The review lasted for over an hour and a half, and through all the various battalion and company manoeuvres, the men acquitted themselves in a most commendable manner.

Gen. Wilson, accompanied by Brig.-Gen. H. H. McLean, Lieut.-Col. L. Leduc, A.A.G., Lieut.-Col. Hill, D. S.O., and Major McKergow, arrived at the inspection grounds, precisely at 10.30 o'clock, and as they reached the saluting base, the flag was lowered as a signal for the general salute. Gen. Wilson then proceeded to inspect the battalion by companies, passing up and down each line and observing each man's equipment. The battalion then marched past in close column of platoons, Gen. Wilson and officers taking the salute. The Kilties presented a unique and imposing spectacle in their new tartans, and the crowd of spectators who had gathered to witness the review, cheered the soldiers as they smartly swung down the field, and passed the base. Brig.-Gen. McLean, after whom the Kilties

have been named, was immensely proud of the way in which the men acquitted themselves.

Following the march past the battalion formed en masse, and the work of inspection by companies was carried out, the various companies being in command of Major Ryder, Major Laurie, Capt. Sturdee and Major Mersereau. The company drill lasted nearly an hour, after which the battalion was again drawn up in close formation. The officers were then asked to step forward, and after each had been presented to the inspecting

officer, Gen. Wilson addressed them in congratulatory terms upon the splendid appearance of the men. He said that it was one of the finest regiments he had inspected since the outbreak of the war.

While he regretted that circumstances prevented their remaining here longer, he felt confident that, when they reached the other side, the 236th Battalion would maintain the splendid record achieved by the Canadian troops in the field. He wished Lieut.-Col. Guthrie, his officers and men God speed, and expressed his sincerest wishes for their success. Gen. Wilson then led in giving three cheers for the King, Lieut.-Col. Guthrie followed in giving three cheers for

Gen. Wilson, the men adding a "tiger." The inspection then concluded with a review in parade order, and a march past, when the salute was taken by Gen. Wilson. The Kilties then left the review grounds in column of fours, headed by their pipe, brass and bugle bands. The musical organizations of the battalion are of the very highest order and added greatly to the brightness and success of the exercises.

He was the official photographer of the Grenadier Guards, the 87th Battalion and is one of the best military photographers in the Dominion.
