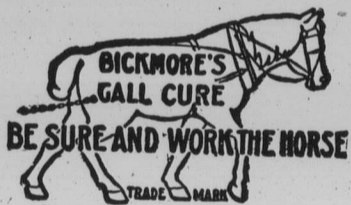

Shooting Seasons.

Open season for grouse and partridge from October 15th to November 15th, inclusive. Hare including cotton tail rabbits from October 1st to December 15th, inclusive. Ducks of all kinds, or any other water fowl, and snipe, rail, plovers or any other birds known as shore birds or waders, from September 15th to December 15th, inclusive. Woodcock from October 1st to November 15th, inclusive. Deer from 1st to 15th, November, inclusive. Black and grey squirrels from November 15th to December 1st, inclusive.

Speculators Make the Profits.

Does it seem to you that it is a good thing for Canada that speculators can make such enormous profits while industries are being numbered daily with the dead? For the past six years the Northwestern lands have been returning 80 per cent, per year to their owners even though not a bushel of wheat was harvested from them. The Boston News Bureau calls this "unearned increment," a term which is becoming better known than it used to be. It means increased values which were not in any sense due to the efforts or activities of the owner who repeats them. All these six years, trains have been puffing, factory wheels turning and men and women have been putting forth effort in office and mill to create articles, to add wealth to the world, to do things. How many of these industries think you made 80 per cent. per annum? Go through the stock exchange list, from the smallest company to the Dominion Steel Corporation itself and you cannot find an industry which is earning over 10 per cent. or 15 per cent. on its capitalization. Of course, this capitalization is frequently water; but allowing for all that, few of them could have a return of 80 per cent. The banker, the grocer and the merchant put forth productive effort for it and they get a return of what? Say 20 per cent., 25 per cent., or even 50 per cent., if they are fortunate. Often they get into the bankruptcy court. Yet here is an opportunity whereby, without lifting a finger, without making a blade of grass to grow, but rather by preventing it from growing without adding an ounce of wealth to the world, but all the time consuming it, a man may put 80 per cent. per annum into his pocket. Remember that that 80 per cent. represents wealth. Now, it is in the very nature of wealth that it cannot come into existence of itself, as it were by magic. It has all to be produced by someone working intelligently some where. And because our system permitted the speculator to appropriate it, the man who produced it had to go without it. So the producer went into the bankruptcy court and the non-producer wore diamonds. This is the problem of the age—and it is easier to prescribe the cure than persuade the patient. How shall we so adjust matters that idleness will not pay and industry shall have its reward? All other problems sink into insignificance by comparison. Yet while the industries and the very life of the country are laboring under the handicap, there are those so lacking in constructiveness that to any effort to remove it they cry "hands off." Assuredly it is an achronism that in view of the general recognition of the importance of industry, it is still possible for the idler and loafer to step up to the cashier and walk away with 400 per cent. as much wealth every year as the men who produce it. Worse than that, I can tell you of dead men—dead, buried and in heaven, mind you—who went on raking in the wealth hand over fist while live men on earth worked all day in office and factory and wondered where they would get the wealth to get the winter's coal. If you don't see anything funny in that your Maker forgot to equip you.—Saturday Night.

The Wise Investor.

I often buy gold bricks by mail; in fact, I'm always sending kale to fakers here and fakers there, and rainbow dealers everywhere. I've blown myself for bogus ore, and orange groves on Greenland's shore, and meerschum mines and moonlight plants, ginseng and rubber elephants. The fakers get me in their snares, and sell me wind and Belgian hares. But when my fellow-townsmen talk, and ask me to invest in stock to help some local enterprise, I am conservative and wise. Protecting The Horse.

Over five thousand blacksmiths doing business in the province of Ontario have organized and will apply at the next session of the Legislature for incorporation as an association. They will ask power to compel all blacksmiths who shoe horses, to pass an examination and in doing this, they are taking one of the most important steps towards efficiency and the prevention of cruelty to animals. It is a well-known fact that in different parts of the province there are many men running "smithies" who know little more about the proper shoeing of a horse than the average citizen. The poor beast that has to bear the burden of traffic throughout the entire day should be well fitted for doing so, and in order to bring about this desirable condition, its feet should be thoroughly protected. The passing of an examination by blacksmiths, will serve not only to raise the status of their trade, but it will also be favorably looked upon by both horses and their owners. The wonder is that the idea has not been put into execution before.

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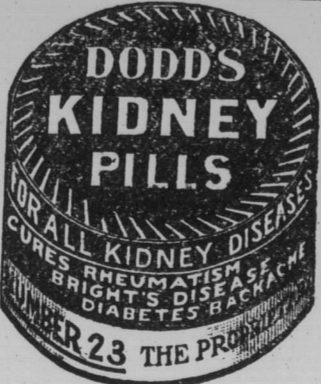

LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

The railways reported 77 carloads, consisting of 1022 cattle, 1169 hogs, 1348 sheep and lambs, 108 calves, and 1 horse.

The bulk of the cattle on sale were common and medium.

The best cattle sold readily at Monday's advance.

Common and medium cattle were slow sale at steady prices.

Milkers and springers were slow sale at \$40 to \$60.

Veal calves were firm at \$7, average price, on a range of \$4 to 8.50 per cwt.

Sheep and lambs sold as follows: Sheep, light ewes, sold at \$3.50 to \$4.25; lambs were lower at \$5.50 to \$2.85, with a few selects at \$6.

Hogs.—Selects fed and watered were quoted at \$7 40 and \$7 10 f.o.b. cars at country points.

Representative Purchases.—Wesley Dun bought 400 lambs at \$5 75 per cwt., 50 sheep at \$3 60 per cwt., 20 calves at \$7 per cwt., all of which are average prices.

George Rowntree bought 253 cattle, 1370 lbs. each, at an average of \$6 30; also 305 butchers' cattle as follows: Good steers and heifers, \$5 40 to \$6; cows, \$3 to \$5 40; bulls, \$3 to \$5 25; canners, \$1 to \$2 25.
