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

Lorne Bridge, erected in 1879, when Mr. Robert Henry wa Mayor, was a splendid structure for the period, but thirty four years have witnesed a vast change in this community and the bridge is now alto gether inadequate. It should either be broadened or better still, be superseded by another structure and its material be used at some other point Zig zag sidewalks properly came in for some attention. It is to be feared that in many cases those who favor them on the outside of the boulevard do so to get a greater depth for their properites, rather than with regard t the beauty and symmetry of the thoroughfare.
