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THOR NESSET'S HARD WOOING

How Husaby Was Bitterly Opposed to Him

Allowed the Young Man to Win Out on His Muscle on Which He Was Long.

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GREATEST OF BICYCLISTS

A. D. Robbins Tells in London of His Achievements.

Not only has the title of "champion" been conferred upon Mr. A. D. Robbins the famous bicycle expert, by admiring and appreciative audiences on both sides of the Atlantic, but even his brother and sister professionals who also make a specialty of trick cycling have accorded him that distinction. And when one witnesses the marvellous feats which Mr. Robbins is capable of performing on a bicycle it will readily be granted that he is well worthy of the title. For Mr. Robbins can make a bicycle do things which to the average person would at first probably appear impossible.

It was at the Alhambra Theatre, London, just before he went on the stage for his turn, that a "Tribute" representative recently had the pleasure of an interview. The trick rider was already attired in the red shirt, blackskin breeches, and sombrero typical of an American cowboy, a dress he has always adopted. Mr. Robbins is a comparatively young man, to be exact, he is twenty-eight years of age, of small stature so far as height is concerned, with a quiet and unassuming manner; and, meeting him under ordinary circumstances, it would be difficult to believe that so unassuming a personage was capable of carrying out the feats which he has astounded thousands of people.

"As you will guess by my Yankee accent," Mr. Robbins said, with a smile, at the commencement of our chat, "I am an American, and I have been living in the States. What made me take to trick cycling for a living? Well, as a matter of fact, I can hardly tell you. I always had a fondness for experimenting with bicycle tricks, but until about five years ago I never had any serious intentions of becoming a professional trick rider. At one time I owned a fairly large cycling academy in New York, and, as the aristocracy patronized it to a great deal, it proved to be a very good source of income to me, and one not worth giving up unless for something exceptionally good.

"However, in 1896, after making myself master of some good sensational bicycle feats, I decided to adopt the profession of trick rider, thinking that there was more money in it, and certainly up to the present I have no reason to regret taking such a step. I was one of the first safety bicyclists to appear in America, and fortunately my 'turn' caught on, and I toured all over the States. But it was not until last year that I made my first appearance in this country. Strange to say, I had the utmost difficulty in getting an engagement in London, managers declaring that they had all the trick cyclists they wanted.

"So I just came over here in a haphazard way, resolving to show them that there was still something new in the trick cycling profession which Londoners had not seen. I gave an exhibition before Mr. Charles Morton, of the Palace Theatre, and he engaged me for two weeks. But I made such a good 'hit' on the first night that the engagement ultimately ran into sixteen weeks. After that I visited Russia, Paris, and Italy, and came back again to London. I am booked for eighteen months ahead, and shall be providing I have no accidents."

"What is your greatest trick, Mr. Robbins?"

"Undoubtedly my pirouette trick, which took me over four years to master, and was invented by myself."

"This trick, it might here be mentioned, was, when Mr. Robbins first proposed to try it, declared to be impossible. It is certainly one of the most astounding feats ever performed. Mr. Robbins cycles backwards round the stage three or four times to gain impetus. He then suddenly lifts the front wheel from the floor and continues the journey on the back wheel alone. Then, swerving the machine to the middle of the stage he will cause it to make seven or eight pirouettes, and, retaining his balance with wonderful skill, will then drop the machine back to its proper position, and ride quietly round the stage in the ordinary manner.

"I often have to attempt this trick five or six times when on the stage," continued Mr. Robbins. "Several other professional riders have tried to imitate me, but the best of them could only make the pirouette once or twice. Another difficult trick which I used to do, but have now given up owing to the great strain on the system, was to jump over three 15 inch hurdles while riding on the back wheel alone. Strange to say, this trick, which was as difficult as the pirouettes, was never appreciated to any great extent by audiences. On the other hand, more simple and easier tricks of mine, such as riding round the stage upside down balanced on the saddle on the frame of the machine, etc., are always loudly applauded.

"It was while performing the head-balancing trick in New York, by-the-by, that I once came very near meeting with a serious accident. Owing to my hair getting so wet with perspiration my head slipped off the saddle and I dropped on to one shoulder, luckily retaining my grip on the handle. I was hoping to get my head back on the saddle again, but
