London, June 22.—The Government was defeated yesterday on the motion of Mr. William St. John Broderick, Conservative member for the Guilford division of Surrey, to reduce the salary of the Secretary of War by £100 on account of an alleged deficiency in the army stores and munitions of war, chiefly cordite. The motion was adopted by a vote of 132 to 125. Progress was immediately reported.

The general belief expressed this evening is that the defeat of the Government means a crisis. The business of the session can be wound ud in short order. The result of the division was so unexpected that when the paper was handed to the Opposition whip, Mr. Akers Douglas, to read the figures he returned it to the Government whip, Mr. Edward T. HANDY WITH HIS FISTS

OHN GULLY, GRANDFATHER OF THE SPEAKER OF THE COMMONS.

Was Once England's Champion Pugi list-A Scientific Fighter-Also a Plunger on Racehorses-He Also Went Into the

Add to 12 years a century of time, and that total taken from the present year of grace brings the reader down to a period in the history of the English nation which might, perhaps, never have been made memorable but for the recent election of William Court Gully to the Speakership of the British House of Commons.

In the town of Bristol, in the year aforesald, was born John Gully, grandfather of the new Speaker. Lithe of limb and strong of arm, young Gully gained renown while still in his 'teens as a good all-round sablete. As a 'foot runner he could outdistance any person in his native place who laid pretence to pedestrian ability, but it was as a puglist that he became famous. Sheer bull strength was the main characteristics of fighting men in those times of ring prowess, but Gully gave boxing special study, and developed science. As he grew he showed the new in these times of ring prowess, but Gully gave boxing special study, and developed solution. As he grew he showed the new possiliarity to great advantage. In his amateur consets he vanquished all his opponents. His first professional fight was, ense. His first professional fight was, strangely enough, with his tutor, Henry Pearce, who was nicknamed "the Chick-en." The "Chicken" reckoned to clip the wings of his ambitious scholar early in the contest, but calculated astray, for young Gully only admitted defeat atter fighting of hard deparate and

ard, desperate rounds. arce was the favorite among profes-Pearce was the favorite among professional bettors and sporting mon generally, who prophesied that the champion would knock his antagonist out in three rounds. Guilly received unbounded credit and admiration. Though defeated, he was looked on as the most daring, enduring and scientific fighter in England. Though the fight brought his defeat, it brought fame and the championship of England, for shortly afterwards, when Pearce, on account of ill-health, retired from the ring, Gully was declared to be the champion by unanimous consent. For a long time not one fighter from the many in England dared to question its truth, or deny Gully's right to the title of champion.

For two years Gully held the champion-



been defeating all opponents, under the old tactics of relying entirely on strength and weight. He clearly had the advantage over Gully in size and in power of musele, but he was inferior in the new science which the latter had introduced into pugilism.

The fight took place on the historic battle ground at Six Mile Bottom, on the Newmarket road, and was even more desperate than the one with Pearce. For round after round the result appeared suspended in the balance, which brute force was struggling to pull one way, while pugilistic science was endeavoring to tip the other. When the thiriteth round was passed Gregson showed signs of weakening. Gully was wearing hien out. In the hirity sixth round the Lancashire man went down and was unable to rise—defeated.

In May, 1898, Gregson met Gully in the ring a second time. It was a most exciting contest, and thousands gathered from far and near to witness it. Nover did two men enter a ring more determined than were Gully and Gregson on that day, and never were friends and backers of pugilists more enthusiastic. Like the modern exponent of fistic art, Gully went into the theatrical business and made a competence, his renown draving crowds to every performance. After retiring from the theatre he bought out a lostelry, raised fast horses, which he raced, and became noted as one of the boldest plungers of his day, perhaps equal to "Jullier" Juggins, or Ameria's representative Riley Grannan.

He died in 1853, at the age of eighty years.

When William Court Gully, the new When William Court Gully, the new Speaker, was Government candidate for the position he was objected to by some of the members because he was a descendant of a prize fighter. When his friends urged his fitness and cited his record as an honored and distinguished member of the English bar, a successful Queen's counsel, to which position he was appointed in 1877, and 10 nted with pride to his parliamentary knowledge as displayed in the House of Commons when he was returned to Parliament in 1898, and again on his re-election in 1892, they were met by the same objection, that his grandfather had been a sporting man, a bookmaker, a raser of horses, and, above all, a pugllist who had once held the prize ring champlonship of England. In spite of this opposition, the Liberal majority by a very narrow margin elected Mr. Gully to the Speakership.

Ever since this town had a post office it has been the custom of certain people who called at the general delivery for mail to pull a gun and shoot through the opening to attract attention. The first two postmasters put up a plank in range to catch the bullets, but the last critter was too lasy and shiftees to care about saving three or four pounds of lead per week and allowed the bullets to go through the opposite wall and out over the sand lots. During his time two of the employes were accidentally shot and many of the mail bags badly damaged. The call at the windows and the firing were so frequent that the office was always blue with smoke and oppressive with the smell of gunpowder. Some of the missions are in charge of white men or women; some are managed by converted, educated natives. The effort is to lay all possible of the burden upon the native shoulders. Other things being anything near equal, they are more effective. They know the people and the language. But the Bishop's hopes for a redeemed Africa are based on another feature of the work. His missionaries take little children under five years of age and adopt them.

"Children are not born heathens, you know," he said, "any more than our children were. They can become heathens if they see nothing but heathen surroundings. They may become very valuable Christians if their environment is right." The plan has been followed many years, and some of the children they adopted at five years of age and under have grown to manhood and womanhood, have married and are giving priceless service to the cause. The parents are very willing to give their children to the Bishop's people as a rule. They seem to know the infant's future can be little better than theirs unless it is placed in better hands. And the adoption is complete and final. More than anything else Bishop Taylor depends on this system.

And as fast as the children grow to sufficient age they are instructed in the farts and industries of Christian nations. Our third sign read, "Any one shooting through this window will be shot at in return." That same old Jim Hewson was the only man in town who wouldn't believe that we meant business. He came in, read the sign, pendered over it for awhile, and then fired a shot through the window. That is why Mr. Hewson is now laid up with a bullet in his leg, and why he won't cavort around town for several weeks to come. He was contending for a custom fifteen years old, and we felt no resorthent. Indeed, we used to shoot through that same window ourselves before we became a part of the United States Postal Department. We do not expect to run this postoffice in the high-toned, gold laced manner which prevalls in Chicago or St. Louis, but we shall aim to have a system and to preserve a certain dignity. aim to have a system and to preserve a certain dignity.

If any one wants to rap on the shelf of the general delivery window with the butt of his gun no one will complain, but there must be no more shooting. When we are engaged in our duties as postmaster, all invitations to drink will be respectfully but firmly declined, and no outsider will be admitted to our private office, except on official business. When we are at "The Kleker" office, we can be called "old man," and when in our mayor's office we shall not resent a good-natured slap on the back. Te's a sort of sliding scale, and the sconer the crowd gets on to it the better it will be all around.





But hogs so developed are very liable to be infested with some dangerous disease and parasites, and those who eat them as food do so with peril to health. The swine should be fed as pure food as other animals, and all their conditions recognize sanitary laws.






