Editorial Chat.

On Monday, on the motion to go into supply, Mr. Foster moved an amendment to ensure the government for its action in keeping the country so long in uncertainty as to its trade policy.

"Notes on the Superficial Geology of Kings Co., N. S." is the title of a pamphlet which has recently reached our table. The treatise consists of notes on lectures delivered by the author before the Nova Scotia School of Science, on January 13th, 1896, and evinces much exhaustive and intelligent investigation.

Mr. Thomas Galloway, of Uxbridge, Ont., is to deliver addresses in the Presbyterian and Baptist churches of this town on Sunday, Oct. 4th. In the morning he will speak on "Praise" in St. Andrew's church, and in the evening on "How to Make Life a Success" in the Baptist church.

We have received a copy of the Twelfth Annual Report of the Educational Society of the Methodist church, Canada, from which we glean the following interesting facts:

The church has under its control in the Dominion of Canada, and in the Island of Newfoundland, 11 colleges. The total number of students in attendance last year was 2012.

The University of Mount Allison College reports a total attendance of 391, made up as follows: In Arts, 160; Theology, 34; Ladies' College, 195; Academy, 77; total, 466; less counted twice, 75; net total 391.

Annual collections and subscriptions are taken in every circuit for the educational work of the church. These collections amounted last year to the generous sum of \$2301.22.

The church is to be congratulated upon the healthy and prosperous condition of its educational work.

The long expected debate on the action of the governor-general in refusing to ratify the appointments of the late government came up for discussion on Monday. Sir Charles Tupper in a stirring speech contended that his excellency had no right in assuming that the Conservative ministry had not the confidence of the people until it had been defeated by a vote in the House, and censured the governor-general for passing over his constitutional appointment and going for advice to another source.

The Wolfville Militia Company.

The Wolfville Militia Company were out for a drill on Wednesday evening last. They formed up at the Skoda building and marched down to the training park, where a number of movements were gone through, several volleys of blank cartridges being fired. On the order "ready," "present," "fire," being given the volleys would ring out in perfect unison.

Gold Mining in Queens County.

Much interest was awakened in the discovery of gold some years ago near Caledonia corner. Considerable quantities of the precious metal was extracted from quartz. This industry gave an impetus to trade, and money became plentiful.

Unfortunately mining operations have ceased in that place and the future prospect for renewal is uncertain. Gold was also discovered at North Brookton on the road to Pleasant River. Works at this mine are still in operation, and for the last year or more have yielded to the owners a brick monthly of about \$7,000 value.

Other leads have been recently discovered, and a marked increase of activity has resulted. The mine is owned by W. L. Libbey, Esq., and others. They are adding new plant, supposed to be the finest in the Dominion. Some three or four hundred men are employed upon the new buildings that are going up. For the foundation of these buildings 2,000 running feet of stone work is required. It is calculated that 3,000 tons of that material will be needed, and 275 barrels of cement.

The bricks to be used are manufactured at Bridgetown, of these some 175,000 will be required. These figures will give some idea of the faith of the owners in respect to the quantity of gold to be produced.

Another mine near by is owned by a Halifax company. They are, we are informed, doing a good business. It is claimed that other discoveries have been made in the neighborhood that will yet be heard from.

These mining operations must prove a great boon to the people of Northern Queens, in giving employment to many men and teams at paying wages. F.

Friday's Battle at Aldershot.

The two weeks' drill at Aldershot ended on Friday last with a sham fight. About ten thousand people of all colors, sizes and shapes were present to witness the festivities. Just before the battle, the young soldiers might be observed bidding their sweethearts, who had come to look upon their faces for perhaps the last time, a tearful good-bye, and shouldering their muskets with a martyr-like expression. The battalions lined up about two o'clock, and after going through some preliminary movements were marched up to the head of the drill ground. Shortly afterward the Hussars appeared in view, marching into the forest to the right. The 72d batt, was then marched off to intercept them. The other two battalions were marched down into the bog on the left. It seemed like walking on India rubber, the men would go down almost out of sight one minute, and be suddenly sprung up into the air the next. After going some little distance the 69th halted and opened fire on anything that was in sight. The 68th kept on farther, and then spread out. There was considerable doubt as to who was the enemy, but the Colonel told us to fire at something, and we let go at No. 1, with such effect that they hadn't enough strength left to return No. 9's cheer on Saturday night. No 9 was a reserve force, and only fired a couple of volleys. After a charge of bayonets on the 68th, the fight was over and the day won, by—we're not exactly sure whom—anyway, there were comparatively few killed. After the battle we retired to our tents to shed a few tears over our approaching departure. But when the morning came, strange to say, we didn't seem to mind leaving at all. An air composed by Adjutant Northup, of Canaan, especially for the occasion, entitled "Good-bye Camp Ground," was sung with considerable fervor by the boys of "Company 9."

Kings Co. Baptist S. S. Convention.

At the afternoon session John C. West gave an address of welcome which was responded to by Rev. A. Coburn. W. C. Ross gave a paper on The Model Sabbath-school. He began by saying that he had never seen a perfect Sabbath-school. It is well to place the ideal before us, and strive to copy the pattern as nearly as we can. He showed what was necessary in model superintendents, model teachers and model pupils. Professor Oaks then proceeded to teach a class composed of the members of the Convention. He did not claim to be a model teacher, but he had been invited to teach "a model class," and he seemed happy in having such an one before him. The lesson was that designated for the 20th of Sept., and was given in a pleasing and effective manner. A downpour of rain prevented the carrying out of the programme for the evening. The next session of the Convention was appointed for Kenville, the first Thursday of September, 1897.

Mr Justice Burdick, in the Exchequer Court, has given a decision in favor of the Nova Scotia Sugar Refining Co. by which the government will lose \$45,000. When the tariff on sugar was altered in 1895 the company had a cargo on its way to Montreal. At the time the vessel reported at Sydney, C. B., there was no increase of duty, but before Montreal was reached the duty rate was fixed. The Dominion held the sugar was dutiable, but the company held otherwise. The judgment sustains the contention of the latter.
