The Government Sanatorium.

Having a little spare time while in Kentville recently we took advantage of the opportunity to pay a visit to the Sanatorium recently established in that town by the Government of Nova Scotia.

The minister of marine is inspecting the harbors of British Columbia for a location of the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Port Simpson, it is thought, will not be chosen on account of its proximity to the United States islands.

Considerable sympathy has been expressed for Russia in the case of her torpedo boat destroyer, Ryehitel, which was captured by the Japanese while lying disarmed in the neutral harbor of Cienfuegos.

Halifax gave a magnificent welcome to Mr R. L. Borden, the popular liberal-conservative leader, on his return from Ottawa Monday night.

Latest reports show that the Wheat Crop of Manitoba and the Northwest is as good, if not better than past seasons, and many thousand laborers will be required to assist in harvesting same.

The Farm Laborers' excursion from the Maritime Provinces will be run on August 21st, from points in Cape Breton and Nova Scotia east of New Glasgow; from all other stations in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick on Thursday, September 1st.

Second class tickets to Winnipeg will be sold from each coupon ticket station, and the rate from Halifax, N. S., will be \$12.00 going, \$8.00 returning; from points on the Intercolonial lines in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, also from D. A. R. stations in Nova Scotia, rate will be \$13.00 going and \$10.00 returning, and from coupon ticket stations in Prince Edward Island rates will be \$13.50 going and \$10.50 returning.

These tickets will be sold to female as well as to male laborers, but half tickets will not be issued to children, and the purchaser of each ticket will be given farm laborer's verification certificate, and extension coupon. On arrival at Winnipeg special trains will be met by farmers and Manitoba Government representatives, and when extension coupon has been signed by the farmer showing that the holder thereof is engaged to work with him in the harvest fields, this coupon will be taken by the ticket agent, and free ticket given to the Canadian Pacific station nearest to the point where the laborer has engaged to work, and on arrival at that station the laborer must deposit the verification certificate with the Canadian Pacific ticket agent. When he has worked for thirty days, and has certificate signed by the farmer, such certificate will be honored for return ticket to starting point at any time prior to Nov. 30th, 1904, on payment of the return rates above quoted.

It is expected special passenger trains will be run on the main lines for the accommodation of laborers, and tickets will not be good on regular passenger trains.

150 lbs. baggage wearing apparel only, will be allowed on each free ticket to Winnipeg, and every piece of baggage checked should bear the laborer's name and permanent address. If however, any has made prior arrangements to work with the same farmer they were employed with in previous years, they may check their baggage through to that point, but not beyond Moosejaw, Yorkton or Estevan, as no price tickets will be furnished to points beyond those stations.

Owing to the great difficulty in handling fifteen or twenty thousand laborers to one station at Winnipeg, baggage delivery may be slow, and as much as possible should be carried in hand grips in the cars with the passengers instead of checking.

World Wide.

The British parliament was prorogued Aug. 14th, after seven fruitless attempts had been made by the opposition to turn out the government.

A dressmakers' trust is the latest business combine in Paris. It has been formed to protect the best Paris models from being sold at reduced rates and to second class houses in Europe and America, as has been customary in the past.

Electrical Storm.

Wolfeville was visited on Monday by another violent electrical storm, which, indeed, passed over the whole valley and did more or less damage in many sections.

The principal damage, however, was done to St Andrew's church, which sustained considerable injury. The bolt struck the weather-vane and passing down entered the belfry, ripping off clap-boards and finish.

The fluid passed down both sides of the roof, breaking out the wall in a number of places. Some damage was also done in the motor room. The fire company was promptly on hand, but their services were not required.

The damage to the building has been placed at \$210, and is covered by insurance. The work of making repairs will be begun at once, and in the mean time the services will be held as usual.

A number of cases are reported of persons being affected by the hail, but fortunately no one was hurt. The storm was not of long duration, but was of a very violent nature while it lasted, and rain fell in torrents.

The residence of John E. Caldwell, Newtonville, was struck by lightning during the storm of Monday, Aug. 15. It happened just after dinner. Mrs. Caldwell was in the kitchen when the crash came. She knew the house had been struck for she saw some of the shingles fall to the ground just in front of the window before she was standing. She escaped unhurt.

Mr. Caldwell was lying on the lounge in the sitting room and received quite a severe shock in his left side, burning it considerably, scorching his sock to a brown crisp and damaging his boot.

After attending to her husband Mrs. Caldwell ran upstairs to discover the extent of the damage. She entered the room directly above the sitting-room and found the lace curtain torn from the window and burning it a heap on the floor.

A picture which had been suspended by a wire was thrown down, the glass was broken to atoms and the wire completely burned off. The plaster was broken in many places.

A lamp was broken and holes resembling anger holes bored through the walls. The other inmates of the house, Mr. Caldwell's mother and his two small children were unhurt but very badly frightened.

As the house is a good one and almost new the damage must be considered as a disaster.

Farmer's Picnic.

The farmers' picnic at Evangeline Beach last Saturday was one of the largest affairs of the kind ever held in this county. In point of attendance it was a grand success, and in arrangement of details the management was rather weak this defect will doubtless be remedied in like gatherings in the years to come.

There is no doubt but that the idea is a good one and the meeting together of so many representatives of this important industry must be of mutual advantage and profit to the county at large.

The day was one of the most delightful of the season, and at an early hour teams large and small thronged the streets leading to the beach. It is estimated that three thousand persons attended the picnic and that in the neighborhood of a thousand teams were required for their transportation. The best of order prevailed and nothing occurred to in any way mar the pleasure of the day.

Boating, bathing, and the other amusements which the beach affords were duly participated in and the day's outing was voted by all as most enjoyable one. A Temperance Lesson.
By Rev. F. Kurtz, Vinnikonda, South India.
At a recent meeting of some Indian Christians at which several Europeans were present, a tableaux was presented. The representation was that of a European drunkard. One of the natives had painted his face white and donned European clothes. Another was sitting at a table covered with bottles, pouring out liquor. The European came reeling in, purchasing liquor and drinking freely. He boasted that he was a graduate of Edinburgh University and had a good position as constructing engineer on the railroad, but had unfortunately lost his position. After spending all his money, he removed his shoes to pay for more drink, and then his coat. The tables ended with the European rolling to the floor where he laid drunk.
The Hindus, Mohammedans and native Christians despise the European for his drunkenness but it is a rare thing thus to see in public such a representation of their contempt and abomination of the white man's liquor traffic among tropical people. It is not all English liquor. America is sending increasing quantities of rum to India. Dr. Jones in his recently published book, 'India's Problems, Krishna or Christ,' says 'The drink curse is rapidly becoming one of the trying problems in India. It was slanderously remarked some years ago that if England then left the country, the only monuments left behind would be broken whiskey bottles. There is indeed ground today for the fear that if England were to abandon the land, it would leave as the saddest monument of the past an immensely increasing army of drinkers, and this evil is further enhanced by the mean ideal which the ordinary Englishman sets before Hindu by his passion for the cup. Half a century ago an Englishman died while on duty in the jungles of South India and his body was buried in the wilderness. The natives soon erected a shrine over his grave and for a long time offered in true sobriety whiskey and cheroots to appease his thirsty and unsatisfied spirit. It is not strange that the natives should recognize a continuity of spirit-taste in the here and hereafter of the sabbath.'
India never had any barrels or bottles until the white man's liquor came. Practically all the barrels and a large share of the bottles in India today are imported filled with liquor. The ordinary native cannot see a barrel or bottle without being reminded of the drunkenness of the white man. Natives not infrequently refer to a drunkard by saying that he was as drunk 'as my Christian,' and by Christian they mean the white man.
It is a sad fact that with all the good the English are doing in India bringing education, civilization and Christianity, they should at the same time make a multitude of drunkards. The Eurasians or half breeds as a class are notoriously intemperate. Only a small minority of the officials are teetotalers, and it is common for the missionaries of the continent and Church of England societies to use liquor, though there is a marked improvement among these of late years, and we believe the use of liquor will not be tolerated very much longer by any missionary society. In the Indian cities where the Christian community comes into closer contact with Eurasians and Europeans the percentage of intemperance is greater than among Hindus and Mohammedans.
It is practically impossible for a European who are not acquainted with him that he is strictly temperate. All white men are classed as habitual users of intoxicating drinks. The English word 'Brandy' is known even in remote districts where English is rarely if ever spoken.
I once undertook to rebuke a native who sat half drunk leaning against a palm tree. He indignantly retorted: 'Why do you, a white man, who drink brandy every day of your life, undertake to rebuke me who drink only today?' (the juice of the palm tree). No amount of argument could convince him that any white man could consistently advocate temperance principles. I cannot remember that I was ever ashamed of belonging to the white race until then. If England and America must have the liquor, then let them keep it at home.—Boston Watchman.
