It is well known that a colt of a poor breed will eat as much and cost as much to keep him as one of the best breed and first value. There-fore I think it will be a great advantage to have a model farm, if a good practical farmer can be got to take charge of it; and I hope that every possible care will be taken to make it a success. The more enterprising farmers are now looking forward to the importation of a tock every year, which is a great risk and very expensive; and the necessity for it might be obviated by the establishment of a good stock farm in the Co-lony.
