EXCHANGE ROOMS. CHARLOTTESTOWN, TUESDAY, 21st FEBRUARY. Steamer Arabia arrived at New York last evening. Lord Elgin has allowed the Chinese two days to consider as to the ultimatum.

Nothing important from India. The Duke of Devonshire is dead. One hundred and fifty persons injured in the attempt to assassinate the Emperor Napoleon.

The French Minister has requested the English Government to expel certain suspicious refugees. The principal topic of the English papers is the approaching nuptials of the Princess Royal.

London money market growing easier. Bullion largely increased. Consols 95 1/2 to 96. Markets.—Sugar 6d to 1s per cwt. better. Coffee advanced 2s to 3s. Fair Congo 1s 0 1/2. Breadstuffs dull. Provisions generally dull.

Press AGAIN.—Two other fires occurred in this city during the past week. The first broke out between 12 and 1 o'clock, on Thursday morning, in the distillery of Mr. James Coles, jun., at the eastern extremity of Kent Street.

The second fire occurred at the western end of the city, at a late hour on Thursday night, in a small unoccupied house, owned by a person named Neill, a rigger, and we understand it was destroyed. It is stated that it was only recently insured, and that there are some circumstances connected with the fire which warrant the suspicion that it was the work of an incendiary.
