**GOOD PUBLIC FINANCING.**

The increased revenue which will come to this city as a result of its investment last year in half a million dollars of Victory Bonds at fifteen years is an amount which some clever students should figure out. At the present time the Provincial Government, with whom this city has been obliged to deposit its monies, raised annually for interest and sinking fund, pays this municipality five per cent. interest on all monies that it so deposits. When the market rate of interest drops no doubt the Government will go back to the four per cent. rate which it paid before the war. By the investment of \$500,000 in Victory Bonds five and a half per cent. is realized on the money for fifteen years, which is half of one per cent. higher than the amount that would be received from the Government and perhaps one per cent. more than it may be paying in a year from now. But even at the half per cent. on half a million dollars for say fifteen years, the earnings coming to the municipality will be large. The Journal would like some one, who has more time than we have just now, to estimate the sum and let us have it—not the money, of course, but the result of the estimate.

More than this, if the Legislature passes the bill which the Mayor, Treasurer, Chairman of Finance and City Solicitor went to Toronto recently and presented before the Private Bills Committee, this municipality will be able three months after the bill passes to deposit its interest and sinking funds here at home and invest them in sound bond issues at a higher interest rate than the Province pays. On another half million dollars, that will have to be raised to meet maturing debentures, this too will be a handsome earning for the tax payers.

The Mayor and Council of last year did a good stroke of business when they decided to invest that \$500,000 in Victory Loan Bonds. The Council

**BEATING FATHER TIME AT HIS OWN GAME**

Those minds given to frivolity and speculative fancies are beginning to reflect on the strange events that may disturb mortality if the Dominion Government does not stiffen its back and adopt a time similar to that of the United States. It is a time commonly known as daylight saving. Some of the city dwellers in this and other centres of population are talking of making a law of their own by which they will get up in the morning and go to bed at night by the same tokens as last year, namely an hour earlier than the clock says in the home of the land filler. They are about to defy the determination of the rural vote controllers and say thus: "Silas, though you scare the Government with your no-daylight-saving club, you will not frighten us. We will shake the down comforter off at the break of day one hour earlier than your smartest rooster gives his foot yell."

**DISHONEST ADVERTISING**

The Dominion Government has been asked to legislate against dishonest advertising. The application of this restriction to newspapers—and that is the only aspect of it which the Whig will at present discuss—may or may not be necessary. Every worth-while reputable newspaper is, and must be, a sponsor for honest advertising. It exercises a censorship as rigid and as watchful as any government legislation could exact. Through years of experience, stimulated by a laudable desire to create and maintain a high standard of journalism in this country, the press of Canada has learned that it pays in dollars and cents—to put it on the lowest basis—to keep its advertising columns free from dishonest and misleading announcements. The task is not an easy one, as every publisher must admit. In the rush and speed necessary some unsatisfactory advertisements are bound to escape the most vigilant eye. Every line in the news and advertising columns cannot possibly be read, but on the whole the utmost care is taken to prevent the publication of fraudulent statements.

dependent newspapers published than in Canada. Here and there a few black sheep are to be found, and that is only human and to be expected. On the whole, however, the newspapers of Canada have been true to the public trust, and have honestly endeavored to serve faithfully and well the community in which they are circulated. They have encouraged all that was good and wholesome in public life and morals, and have resolutely opposed all that was vicious and harmful. Like watch-dogs at the gate, they have stood on guard and protected the public against those who, for selfish purposes, would have exploited the people. The publicity given by the press has stopped the hand of many a wrong-doer and corrected many an abuse due to inefficiency. An exposure in regard to street paving made by the Whig on Thursday last is a case in point. That the public appreciates this service is amply shown by the many expressions of praise this paper has received from all classes of citizens.

The admission of dishonest advertising to its columns will sooner or later—and the sooner the better—bring ruin to any publication. A newspaper, more than any other medium, stands or falls according to the respect and confidence reposed in it by the public. Its good-will is its greatest asset. That respect, confidence and good-will can only be gained and maintained as the paper measures up to the requirements of its readers. Most publishers are imbued with a worthy desire to produce a newspaper that will be a credit to the community and a force for good in the land. They must, therefore, exert a careful and constant supervision over every advertisement inserted. Every paper that has become infrequent has done this. As for the Whig, it edits its advertising columns as carefully as it does its reading columns. But, as we said before, mistakes are bound to be made now and then in the hurry of preparing, editing and distributing a daily newspaper. The worth-while newspaper does not need government legislation to protect it against dishonest advertising; it does its own censoring. The few black sheep may need it—while they last. The press of Canada, of its own accord, has made its advertising columns honest and trustworthy. There would seem to be little, if any need of government regulation.

**THE NEW TARIFF ISSUE**  
 Brantford Exporter:—In response to Western sentiment the Laurier Government reduced the duties on agricultural implements, and for a similar reason the Borden Government took a whack at them. There is a wide difference, however, between low duties in these lines and the entire abolition of duties on one of the most important lines of manufacture in this country. For revenue reasons, for giving employment to Canadian labor and for granting Canadian manufacturers in these lines a little protection, the agricultural implement industry ought not to be thrown to the free trade wolves. What is more, we do not believe the Government will do it.

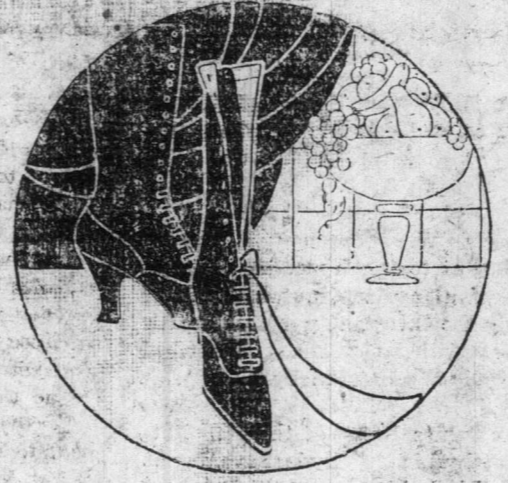

St. John's, Nfld., March 28.—A story from Northern Labrador tells of the widespread suffering and death from influenza, smallpox and measles among the natives on the coast during the winter. The epidemic lasted four months and carried off 200 of the 400

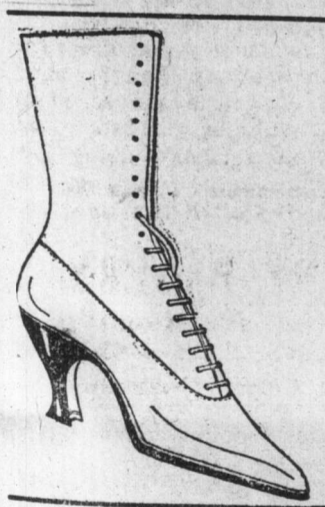

## FOREIGN CREDITS MUST BE PROVIDED FOR CANADA

Sir Thomas White, speaking recently in the House of Commons gave reasons why Canada must provide credits to finance foreign trade. During the debate on the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne he said:

"It is necessary today, and it will be necessary possibly for some time to come, for Canada to provide credits to a large extent in connection with the business we shall obtain overseas. In order that our agricultural and manufactured products may be sold, it will be necessary, owing to the condition of exchange between Canada and the United States that Canada, like the United States, shall provide credits from which our products shall be purchasable."

In these words is to be found one of the strongest arguments for saving money in War Savings and Thrift Stamps. The credits granted by the Dominion Government are made possible by the extent to which the people place money at its disposal, through the purchase of government securities, for which War Savings Stamps are a good example. They help bring business to Canada and pay the investor well.

## THE TAX RATE

That there should have been an increase in the tax rate this year, particularly in view of the advanced revenue from increased assessment, is regretted by The Journal which had steadily hoped that it might be kept down to that of last year or perhaps be reduced two or three mills. When all the circumstances are taken into account, however, a higher rate was inevitable.

Over the expenditures of outside boards, associated with the City Council in administering the affairs of the municipality, the Council has little or no control. It could take an arbitrary position and refuse to pass estimates submitted but the whole machinery of civic business would be jeopardized. This has not been done, because the estimates as submitted by those bodies have not evidently been more than the legitimate requirements of their departments.

As will be seen, however, from an analysis of the budget these boards require a good deal more this year than last. Teachers salaries, for instance, have been low in this city when the present cost of living is taken into consideration. An increase to them will not be begrudged, we feel certain.

Then, too, the police department has been only about half strength for a couple of years and it is proposed to enlarge its number of men to that figure prevailing before the war. It is equally obvious that this class of employees has to pay more out to live and therefore the department consumes more money than it did three or four years ago.

With the fire department, likewise, it was considered that the time has come when the twenty four hour basis of work should be abolished so that those engaged in that department might have a portion of each day at home with their families or for pleasure elsewhere. The change to the two platoon system naturally means a considerable outlay, for more men have to be employed.

The one unfortunate feature in the whole year's estimates for the city is found in the necessity to meet a deficit for the gas plant of one and a half mills. This could have been taken care of in two other ways but the Council decided the best way was to raise the money this year and wipe the loss out, for it would have to be raised anyway out of taxes. This loss practically represents the increase in the rate for this year, or to be accurate the increase is one and three quarter mills and of this amount one and a half mills are required to take care of the shortage on the gas plant.

Under all the circumstances The Journal feels that the Council did reasonably well in keeping the rate as low as it is even though it is higher than we had hoped it would be.

(Special to The Journal) London, March 31.—George Loring, editor of the New Labor newspaper, the Daily Herald, declares that the Allies have received a proposal from Russia for an understanding with the present rulers of Russia and intimates that cessation of that understanding will result in withdrawal of allied troops from Russia and the abandonment of policy interference in Russian affairs. Russia in her part, would be willing not to interfere with the affairs of other nations, allow Finland, Estonia, Lithuania and other Republics, formed from the by-gone Russian Empire, to choose their own forms of government and to pay Russia's international debts.

## HUNGARIAN TROOPS ATTACK FRENCH FORCES

(Special to The Journal) Paris, March 31.—A small force of French troops stationed in a neutral zone between Hungary and Roumania has been attacked by the Hungarians, 350 of the French being taken prisoners, according to an official report.
