Short Exposition of Christian Doctrine

GOD.

That there is a God no man who uses his reason can deny. If any man does deny the existence of God, the wisest sage the world has known has declared that he is a fool.

What is God? He is the Creator of all things, visible and invisible, and all these things declare His existence. In every domain of nature we see the working of certain laws, these laws govern and control the material universe. There is not a thing that is not under the control and government of law. Each follows in its appointed manner the law which governs it, and is not turned aside. The most humble plant, the dust that we grind under our feet, the very air we breathe depend for their being and continuance in it on law.

The seed we plant is nourished by the same soil, rain and sunshine and the law of its being never varies. The turnip never comes up as clover, nor do we plant timothy and expect to gather raspberries.

And the law proclaims also a Law Giver superior to it, because He made it. This is God the Almighty Creator of all things. But He is also the sustainer and preserver of all the things that He has made, for the law by which material things exist, remains only so long as the Law giver determines.

Who is God? This question when answered, brings at once to our notice the qualities of the Deity. We see in the creation facts that bear witness in proclaiming that God is good and kind; that He is a father and we are His children; that He rewards the good and will punish the evil doer.

When we consider the care that He has taken to fit this earth on which we dwell for the abode of rational creatures; that He has planted the ground with the trees and herbs for our use, and taught us to make use of them; that He has stored up in the bowels of the earth in the air and in the water an infinite amount of various things all of which we extract and apply to our wants. When we consider these things, we cannot fail, unless we be the most obtuse of men to confess that God is good, and has a great care and love for every one of His creatures. The material progress of the human race, or a part of it during the past nineteen centuries bears witness to the same in a manner so remarkable, that it would require all of a great volume to declare it all.

Reason then declares God to exist, by its contemplation of His works. In fact it is through reason that God in the first instance speaks to us. Our duties then as reasonable men are to worship God, to love Him, to fear Him, and to keep His laws which are in accord with our reason, by which he has declared them to us.

That we know God in some other way than by reason is also true, and this will be the subject of the next article.

Ingersoll's Definition of Miracles

In a recent lecture Ingersoll gave a definition of miracles, and then proceeded forthwith to say, with his usual dogmatic assurance, that "miracles are not only impossible, but they are unthinkable to any mind capable of thinking." To define a thing is to tell what it is. One cannot tell what a thing is without thinking of that thing. Hence, if the thing be thinkable, it cannot be defined. The orator of laughter and applause defined miracles; he must therefore have thought what they are, and they are therefore thinkable—even to him. If he denies this he confesses that he has talked about a thing that he could not think of. Nothing can be affirmed or denied of that which is unthinkable. To assert the impossibility of miracles one must have an idea of them, and to have an idea of them is to think them. In defining miracles then Mr. Ingersoll talked of things of which he had no idea, since he tells us they are unthinkable. All philosophers, except Mr. Ingersoll, recognize the necessity of thinking of the thing they talk about, when they are in a waking, conscious state, and of not talking of a thing they cannot think of. He seems to think that he can talk of a thing without thinking of it, since he cannot think the unthinkable—such as a miracle—and yet he attempts to define it and tell what he thinks about it. His lecture is largely devoted to telling what he thinks about miracles, and one of his leading thoughts about them is that they are unthinkable. What was he speaking about when he was speaking about them? Certainly not about them, since they are unthinkable. He must have been thinking of something else. These little nuggets of inconsistency and

self-contradiction are as plentiful in Ingersoll's utterances as the yellow nuggets in the Klondyke.—N. Y. Freeman's Journal.

A Minister's Daughter.

(From the Church News, Washington.)

It is not generally known that Dr. McKim, Protestant Episcopal rector of the Church of the Epiphany, this city, has not been able to make his daughter believe the calumnies he has uttered against the Catholic Church. Eleanor Phillips McKim, second daughter of Rev. Randolph McKim, is a by no means Roman Catholic Sister of Charity. She was received into the Catholic Church on April 16, 1894, at Colorado Springs, Colo. Her Protestant sister was present at the ceremony. Her Catholic godmother was Madame de Bonavides, of New York, wife of General de Bonavides, and herself a recent convert. Miss McKim two years later took another important step, and on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1896, she received the religious habit of a Sister of Charity at Mount St. Joseph, Hamilton county, Ohio. Her name in religion is Sister Agnes, and she is supremely happy in her vocation. Last week, in her religious dress, she called upon her father, and although he had his hands full with questions of Episcopalian divorce and was very busy hunting up a new name for the Episcopal Church, which it seems got the wrong "Protestant" tag on by mistake when it was born, he received his daughter very kindly.

What Subscribers Can Do.

(From the Church News.)

Subscribers can do much more than they are doing to hasten the advent of the ideal Catholic newspaper. In the first place, they could pay their subscriptions promptly without causing the publisher to become discouraged, because he has no money to pay the printers, paper bills, etc. When every subscriber to a Catholic newspaper makes the payment of his subscription a matter of conscience and realizes that the success of the journal depends in part upon him, we may hope that the ideal Catholic journal will come. At present nearly every Catholic publisher has on his books bills amounting to thousands of dollars. The bills are generally for small amounts and could easily be paid. Were they paid the publisher would at once improve his paper—probably enlarge it—employ more writers and more correspondents. At present not a few subscribers will allow their subscriptions to remain unpaid, and when asked to pay them will become indignant and at once withdraw their subscriptions and declare the paper is not worth paying for. If it is not worth paying for, because they have not met their obligations with the publisher and thus enabled him to improve his paper.

Topics of the Day.

During the early part of last week, we were shown, by his Honor, Lieutenant Governor Howland, some raspberry vines taken from Government House garden, on which were several raspberries. Some of these berries were quite ripe; some were partially ripe, and others were in various stages of maturity. Certainly, ripe raspberries on the 1st of November, are not usually picked in this Province, and in view of such an occurrence our autumn climate can scarcely be called extremely severe. This item was prepared for last week's issue; but in manipulating the type the printer's devil seems to have been so distracted at the thought of getting at the raspberries that he converted the whole thing into pie.

In his Sorel address Mr. Tarte denounced the Catholics of Manitoba and the Catholics of French schools, "thanks to the goodwill and spirit of justice of their English fellow-countrymen." Mr. Tarte, on the stump says a good many things that do not exactly fit in with the facts. This was one of them. Missions from the anti-Catholic Society of the Martin-Greenway, Sittu school west of Manitoba have been made for the same reason that the law was passed, because the small-minded men of the Liberal party in Manitoba thought thereby advantage could be made thereby. The country has not forgotten Sir Wilfrid Laurier's telegram of congratulation to Mr. Tarte, the author of the Manitoba anti-Catholic school law, nor that in all the years the Liberal Government of Manitoba was raising Conservative efforts to redress the grievances of the Catholics, its members were in correspondence with Sir Wilfrid Laurier,

and that they upheld Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his fight against the legal and full restoration of Catholic privileges in connection with Manitoba schools. Mr. Tarte is becoming over presumptuous, even for Mr. Tarte.—Montreal Gazette.

The innovation of street-preaching by priests in New York will be watched with deep interest. It has long been a conviction of many observant persons that there is no other way of reaching the immense number of stray sheep to be found in all our large cities,—people who never or very rarely go to church, who are unknown and uncared for, who live and very often die without the ministrations of religion. Zealous priests would be glad to go out into the highways and byways in search of those who do not come to them. There is no reason why they should not do so. There will probably be opposition to the experiment: those who are disposed to try it must expect to encounter ridicule and remonstrance from friends as well as enemies; but it is to be hoped that they will not yield to discouragement. There are reasons why a great number of Catholics, especially among poor foreigners, do not attend church; and these reasons ought to be seriously examined. It will be found that there are obstacles, unnoticed by regular parishioners, at the very doors of many of our churches which repel those whose circumstances are widely different. There is weight in the contention of many and indigent families that they cannot afford to attend church. It often happens that they possess only work-a-day clothes, in which they are ashamed to appear among well-dressed people; and when money is insufficient for the bare necessities of life there is none to drop into collection boxes or to give to the renters of seats. A procession of 10,000 men, all members of the Holy Name Society, marching through the streets of Brooklyn in public protest against the sin of profanity, is an object-lesson that suggests many others no less needful. The time has come for public demonstrations of loyalty to God. We like to believe that the sight of priests preaching in the streets will not only exert a salutary influence over those to whom they address themselves, but quicken the faith and inflame the zeal of Catholics in general. Edification of well-dressed Protestants of all classes and creeds will be a certain result of the movement. For this we hope to see extended to every large city in the Union.—Ave Maria.

The Anglican archbishop of Canterbury, in a series of charges to the clergy, said that the consubstantiation instead of the Real Presence may be accepted, though no permission could be given for the use of incense or for the restoration of the Sacrament. He asserted that compulsory confession was illegal, but he sanctioned voluntary confession. Prayers to the Blessed Virgin and to the saints were not allowed, but prayers for departed souls were approved. Poor men, he goes as far as he dares in the direction of the true Church, and, perhaps, is more to be pitied than blamed for his peculiar attitude.—Sacred Heart Review.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

DURING the past summer, over 50,000 pilgrims a month, visited the shrine of La Bonne, Ste. Anne de Beau Port.

A BILL proposing an annual contribution of \$30,000 to the British navy was introduced by Hon. Premier Schofield on the 2nd, in the Cape Colony assembly.

A MAN named William Heffield, at Traveller's Rest, is reported to have been robbed a few nights ago of \$221 which he had looked up in a trunk in his house.

A Nov. 3rd despatch from Wei Hai Wei, China announces that all the British warships there are fully coaled, their woodwork removed and that they are prepared for instant action.

RAY, FERRIS CAMPBELL, M.A., of St. Dunstan's College, presented in the Cathedral at the High Mass on All Saints, His theme was the Communion of Saints, and his discourse was logical and forcible.

On Thursday evening next, a concert and supper in aid of St. Mary's Church, Indian River, under the auspices of St. Mary's Branch, C. M. B. A. Kensington, will be given in Indian River Hall.

THE Grand Trunk warehouse and the steamer Pacific were destroyed by fire at Collingwood, Ontario, on Thursday morning last. The loss is estimated at one hundred thousand dollars.

There is much anxiety in England as to the real object of the extensive war preparations still in progress; notwithstanding Lord Salisbury's favorable announcement regarding Russia.

Two hundred of the Halifax Lancers' regiment are held in readiness to go to Newfoundland and a battery of artillery is in readiness for Esquimaut. Should this move be made Halifax is to be garrisoned by the Fredericton Royal Canadians.

The affairs of the Chicago Bank of Commerce, a state bank, with five hundred thousand dollars capital and one million dollars deposits, are to be wound up by its directors and proceeds paid to stockholder. The Union National Bank will take over the deposits and an equal amount of its bills receivable.

LADY CROMER, wife of Lord Cromer, British Agent in Egypt, died a few days ago. Lady Cromer, as well as her husband was a Catholic. On her death she was attended by Father Brindle, who has won extraordinary distinction in the Egyptian campaign. The deceased lady was a daughter of the late Sir Rowland Stanley Errington.

JOSEPH C. WARRINGTON, of Montreal, the biggest cheese man in the country this season is reported to have failed. The liabilities are over \$100,000, owing most to farmers throughout the country from whom he bought. Warrington's difficulties arose from trying to bear the Canadian market in England.

On Friday last at New Zealand in this Province, during the temporary absence of his mother, the three-year-old son of William Mallard, while playing near the stove met with an accident that caused his death. His clothes caught fire, and he crashed out of doors when the wind fanned the flames so as to completely envelope him. He died in about an hour afterwards.

Both towers of the new Cathedral are now almost completed. The cross on the northern tower was placed in position at ten minutes past ten o'clock on Saturday morning last. Ten loggers covered with slate and copper present a splendid appearance. As already stated the height from grade line to top of cross is about 100 feet. The old bell has been placed in the northern tower.

On Thursday of next week, the 17th inst., a solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass will be celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, on the occasion of placing in the vaults under the Cathedral, the bodies of the late Bishop McDonald, Father Broderick, Father McNeill and other deceased priests, temporarily interred in the cemetery when the old Cathedral was removed. A sermon suitable to the occasion will be preached by Very Rev. Father Quinn, V. G. of Antigonish. A large attendance of diocesan clergy is anticipated.

ADVICE of the 7th, from St. John's, Nfld., state that a serious cabinet crisis is anticipated in the Island colony. Sir Herbert Murray the Governor, demands the resignation of Mr. Francis, Minister of Finance. The ostensible reason is that Mr. Francis is general counsel of Reid, the railway contractor, but the real reason is the continued friction between Governor and contractor. It is feared Mr. Francis will lose his position and possibly prejudice the negotiations regarding the French Shore Treaty, and the conference for settlement of disputes between United States and Canada.

ON All Souls' Day, a Pontifical Requiem Mass was celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, by his Excellency the Bishop McDonald, assisted by Revs. Dr. Morrison, J. F. Johnston and P. D. McLaughlin. Rev. Father Hennebery of Australia, delivered a short, but eloquent address on the doctrine of Purgatory. In conclusion the Rev. gentleman paid a warm tribute to the piety, faith and generosity of the Catholics of this Province, as evidenced by their churches and the presence of pilgrims. The new Cathedral he pronounced a credit to the congregation and the universal church.

The list of vessels belonging to the Gloucester fishing fleet, lost during the last fishing year has been published. The vessels number fourteen and the lives lost number eighty-two. Among those lost were the following: Islanders: Captain Sigworth, Lemuel Cantello and David Campbell, of the schooner Annie and Mary; Captain Andrew McKenzie, Archibald McDonald, Charles Campbell, Michael Gallant, and Daniel Elsworth, of the schooner John E. McKenzie; John A. McDonald and Malcolm Matheson, of the schooner Hunter; Charles Mallett, of the schooner Mounghol. The financial loss of Gloucester vessel owners is over \$100,000.

An Ottawa despatch of the 7th, says the difficulty between the Alliance and the Government in regard to the winter service was chiefly over the day of departure from Liverpool. The steamship companies asked permission to leave port on Saturdays, but the department insisted that the customary day be adhered to. The regular mails for Canada via New York are up for White Star vessels leaving on Saturday; by retaining Tuesdays for direct service, Canada gets three mails per week from Liverpool. If the department accepted the view of the contractor, the latter would be drawing pay for carrying practically only parcels and newspaper packages, as a great majority of the letters would be sent via New York.

A GREAT BOOK.

HISTORY OF THE GERMAN PEOPLE AT THE CLOSE OF THE MIDDLE AGES.

By Johannes Janssen. Translated from the German by M. A. Silliman, with notes by H. B. Swinburn, St. Louis, Mo.

(New York Freeman's Journal.)

Thomas Babington Macaulay, one of the most just of English historians of the earlier and middle part of this century, said of the Catholic Church that "from the time when the barbarian overran the Western Empire to the time of the revival of letters, the influence of the Church of Rome had been generally favorable to science, to civilization and to good government."

But during the last three centuries to start the growth of the human mind has been her chief object. Many students of history, who imagined they were fair minded, thought this statement was a stretch of the imagination of this gifted man of letters, who looked with too much favor on the Church of Rome.

However, a closer study of history will show that the praise given to the Church in the first sentence might have been more generous without being untruthful, and that the censure in the last is entirely undeserved.

Given liberty and order, a people must advance in knowledge and civilization—for civilization is but the application of knowledge to the affairs of men.

Under the Roman Empire there could be no liberty, for more than half the people were slaves, and the order under the pagan emperors was of that kind which suppressed virtue and encouraged vice, and under which there could be no advance of the people.

The religion of Christ (and there can be no religion of Christ worthy the name imagined outside the Church) was necessary to renew the minds as well as to relieve the estate of men, before there could be good government, liberty or order among mankind.

That the influence of the Catholic Church had been favorable to science, to

civilization and to good government, Macaulay bears witness. He looked closer into history he might have found (though he might not have been courageous enough to say what he might have found) that it was through the religious and moral principles taught by the Church that men became freer from sin, and obtained better control of their tempers and their passions, and acquired a love of God and of their neighbor, which made good government, order and liberty possible among men.

Such was the state of civilization among European peoples when the revision of letters began. In the beginning of the fourteenth century the making of paper from linen rags was invented, and sufficient material for writing being thus afforded, manuscripts began to appear in great numbers. When wood and copper engravings were first successfully executed in a matter of some consequence, and in the middle of the fifteenth century books of engravings appeared and soon became common among the people. Of course there must have been processes upon which these were printed, and printing ink must also have been invented, or the engravings could not have been printed.

The number of people who could read had been greatly increased, the increase having been steadily maintained for more than a century. Paper, presses and ink were already in use when Gutenberg first cast his movable type, and there were numbers of people able and anxious to read the books the new invention put upon the market.

The time was fully ripe for the human race to begin that career of progress which has marked the last 400 years. The new world was discovered and an opening made for the adventurous spirits whose minds had been quickened and inspired by the great inventions of the age, to exercise themselves in exploring the continent Columbus had given to Europe. "It is this time which Janssen has described with so much industry and ability. He entered upon his task determined to tell the truth about the people he was writing about, and to suppress no fact bearing upon his subject that came to his knowledge, and he succeeded so well that a professor of history in one of the foremost universities of this country has said that Janssen and Pastor are the only authorities students of history now have on the Middle Ages.

The result has been that Janssen has given to the world one of the greatest works of the age. He presents to his readers a true and correct picture of the times of which he writes. He shows, as it were, in a mirror, the progress of a great people in religion and learning, and the effect these had upon all classes of the people of Germany. He shows us the schools, the universities and the teachers; the laws and the change in the laws that effected both government and people; the growth of manufactures and the thoughts and daily life of those who brought them to such perfection, and the organization of the guilds which did so much for the working people of that time; the mines and mineral production of Germany and the life led by the miners; the revival and growth of commerce and how it together with agriculture, manufactures and mining, affected and promoted the growth and added to the wealth of the nation.

He also portrays the beginning and growth of art in Germany, as shown in architecture, sculpture, painting, engraving, music, poetry, song and literature, and the effect art had upon the people to soften the rudeness of earlier times, reform manners, and create among Germans an interest for other things besides war and military glory.

And greater than all, he tells how religion entered into the daily life of all classes of people; how an increasing love of mankind grew out of that religion; how asceticism and the last remnants of slavery were abolished, to be renewed, unfortunately, after Luther's revolt, when the liberty of the fifteenth century was lost in the despotism of the sixteenth, and the high ideas of honor and character, the outgrowth of religion and of liberty as enjoyed under local self-government, prevailed among all classes of people. Janssen has completely and forever overthrown Macaulay's idea, that the chief object of the Church for 800 years has been "to stant the growth of the human mind."

The world has advanced in many ways since Macaulay wrote, probably most in letters. Men now dare not write falsehood, for they know it will be immediately exposed. In Macaulay's time historians dared not write the truth in regard to Luther's revolt, for they would have been despised and their books unpublished, or, if published, left on the shelves of their publishers unread.

Facts have vindicated the Church of God, and however men have failed; it is now known that the Church has been the greatest and truest friend of the people, of liberty, of good government, of order, of science, and of everything that elevates the human character and leads mankind to a higher life, even in this world.

The English edition of this work is not satisfactory, I may say, wholly on account of the errors and mistakes of the publishers. The press work is well done and the paper good, but the book is too expensive for ordinary families. The same can be said, however, with Catholic books

generally. There are quite a number of serious errors in the work, which seems to have been the fault of the proof reading. But few of the copious notes Janssen printed in the German edition appear in the English. I understand that these notes were furnished by the translators, but, for some unaccountable reason, suppressed by the publishers. Because of the absence of these notes, many readers will regard the English edition as being without value. It seems to me, however, such is the reputation of Janssen, that ordinary readers would not miss the notes. I do not understand German, but, judging by the English text, the translator has faithfully performed her great task, more out of love for the subject than of hope of remuneration. A sentence here and there in the book might be improved, but it might not so correctly express the idea of the German. With all its defects, it is the greatest work which has appeared in English in the last decade. There is no historical work that can be compared with it in interest and value, and there ought to be a sufficient number of Catholic in the United States able and willing to purchase the whole edition.

The World-Over.

A Naples despatch of the 27th Oct. says Vesuvius is again in a state of eruption and great anxiety is expressed at Sorrento, Torre, and Amalfi.

At noon on Friday before last, the three masted schooner Stephens of Cape Vincent, on Lake Ontario, sank with all on board except the Captain.

The Dowager Empress of China has issued an edict ordering the punishment of the Chinese soldiers who attacked the party of English railway engineers at Marcopoli bridge, on the Pekin-Nankow railway.

Mr. John Morley has been chosen by the House of Commons to write the life of the biographer of a good one, and he will probably retire from politics to undertake the task more agreeable to his taste.

The steamer Bagor sailed on the 26th ult. from Vancouver, B. C. for Taku, China, carrying over a million feet of lumber for Russian railway work in Manchuria. It is said the Athenian and Tatar will be constantly employed in the Russian service.

The construction of a telegraph line to Dawson, the first portion of which will be a cable from Vancouver to Staggway is to be commenced at once. The charter was obtained from the Dominion parliament last week by a syndicate of which J. Morris Cotton is head.

An Ottawa despatch of the 29th ult. says Colonel Cole, commanding officer of the 2nd Montreal Regiment Artillery fought in the Bayard rifle, leaders for which were awarded a few weeks ago at 80 cents each and is retailing them at three dollars. He also invested in a large quantity of ammunition.

A report has been received at Ottawa from Mr. Burke, commercial agent for Canada, at Kingston, Jamaica. In which he says the color of the skin of the people is becoming darker and darker, and he recommends direct shipment of Canadian lumber to the island, which, he says, brings a good price there. The color of the skin of the people in Canada is favorably entertained.

A report recently issued by the Commissioner of Railways in New South Wales, where all the lines are operated by the Government, shows a total of 2,890 miles with gross earnings of \$15,128,740, and net earnings of \$1,000,715. The freight traffic aggregate 14,561,943 tons and the average rate is 2.78 cents per ton per mile. The average rate in Canada and the United States is considerably less than one cent per ton per mile. Indeed the through rates on the I. C. R. are less than half a cent.

The London Times' Cape Town correspondent says: Mr. Cecil Rhodes addressing an open air meeting there said: "four years ago he saw Baron de Courcel, French Ambassador at Great Britain, and told him on the authority of Lord Rosebery that Great Britain would fight if necessary to hinder the French reaching the Nile and cutting the connection England intended to make between the North and South. Mr. Rhodes considered this sufficient warning."

On the arrival of Sir Herbert Kitchener at London on Thursday before last he was received with the greatest enthusiasm. So great was the crowds at the Victoria station that the police and the police cordon were carried away together, and the reserved part of the station was soon thronged with the multitude who cheered wildly: "Bravo Herbert!" "God bless our brave boy!" "Cheers for the avenger of Gordon," etc. Sir Herbert appeared greatly pleased with the popular demonstration. He, however, was unable to force a passage through the crowd and was obliged to retire and finally made his escape through a distant part of the building.

The Halifax Herald reports that a very handsome stone is to be erected to the memory of the late Sir John Thompson in Holy Cross cemetery, from a design made by Philippe Hebert, the well-known sculptor. The sarcophagus will be made from a solid block of granite weighing eight tons. The contract was let by tender. Tenders were received from the principle marble cutters in Canada, and the contract was awarded to the firm of Griffin & Keltie, Barrington street. The tomb will be of cruciform shape. It was the intention to have placed at one of the ends a large bronze medallion of the late distinguished statesman, surrounded by maple leaves, but it was found that the green marble from the bronze would deface the polished granite, and that part of the design will not be carried out. The firm hope to have the sarcophagus finished before the end of the year. When finished it will weigh about seven tons. It will be eight feet long, and five feet wide. The entire tomb will be polished with the exception of the base. There will be a massive cross out from the marble, extending from one end of the tomb to the other. The structure will be about four feet high, including base, and will be one of the finest of its kind in Canada. The name will be carved at the foot of the tomb. On the head of the cross will be the word "Credo."
