





Cable News. Are Murderers & Company of the Company **Really Mad?**

Revelations by Dr. Forbes Winslow, the Great Expert in Lunacy

The dividing line between lunacy and crime must be very fine. That is the conclusion one comes to after reading "Recollections of Forty Years," by Dr. Forbes Winslow (Ouseley). And certainly Dr. Winslow's theories and beliefs must be treated with every respect; for it is doubtful if any man has had greater experience in regard to lunacy in this country. From childhood-and he is now sixty-six-he has lived among the insane, for his father in his day enjoy ed the largest practice in lunacy in this country. And it is on account of his unique experience that Dr. Winslow has often been called upon to examine prisoners waiting their trial for murder. In his opinion many of hem have been unjustly tried and excuted, for the reason that the germ

of insanity was in their blood, If has always been Dr. Winslow's contention, for instance, that Mrs. Pearcey, who was executed in 1890. for the murder of Mrs. Hogg, was a woman of low order of intellect. He tells how she suffered from attacks of epilepsy and fits of violence, and his contention was that the murder was committed while the woman was in a state of acute epilepsy. But the Secretary of State refused to interfere, and Mrs. Pearcey met her death on the gallows at Newgate.

The Case of Mrs. Dyer.

In the opinion of Dr. Winslow, Mrs Oyer, who was executed for the ter rible baby-farming murders in 189 also suffered from hallucinations, and was of unsound mind at the time of the murders. There was no doubt about her guilt, but Dr. Windlow con tends that she was a totally irrespon sible woman.

Dr. Winslow examined Mrs. Dyer in Holloway Jail. "I asked her a great many questions, and I considered that she was a person of unsound mind. suffering from melancholia and delusonal insanity. The prisoner made no ttempt to feign madness. I examned her to see whether she was shamming. I came to the conclusion that she was not. She said that very often she got into a depressed condiion, and that voices spoke to her and told her to take her own life, and that she had made several attempts to de that, but had been prevented. I ask ed her if she had any recollection of the crime. She said she had not; she tried to recollect, but became mysti

Dr. Winslow also examined Mar. Ansell, who was tried for the murde of her sister, an inmate of a lunation asylum, in 1899, by sending her some cake which contained phosphorus. Russian Duma Proposes Levying a Rate on Single Persons of Mar-

In proposing to impose a tax on all eople of marriage age who remain single, the Financial Commission of the Russian Duma are only following in England's footsteps. 



Boys Find Robbers.

one Goes for Help While Others are Captured-Boys Are Used as Shields in Running Fight Until a Robber

Grand Junction, Colo., Dec. 19, -After a running battle between three robbers who had looted a general merchandise store at Clifton, six miles west of here, and a posse, one of the robbers was killed and the other two

A clerk, who had been bound and gagged by the robbers, was found yesterday morning, and a posse started in pursuit of the robbers, but lost the trail. Four small boys who were hunting rabbits three miles south of Clifton discovered the robbers in a deserted dug-out. Three of the boys covered the robbers with their small calibre rifles, while the fourth went

Before the officers arrived the robbers succeeded in making the three boys prisoners and forced them to carry a portion of the stolen goods for eight miles. When the posse overtook them each of the robbers seized a boy and used him as a shield from the fire of the pursuers, meanwhile keeping up a running fire from their revolvers.

W. H. Harrison, father of two of the captured boys and a leader of the osse, took up his post at the enrance and shot one of the robbers who was holding Harrison's boy in front of him, through the body, killing him inmantly. The other robbers then surrendered.

Hotel Robbery.

TORONTO, Dec. 20 .- The Jury Sessions to-night found Anthony Mitchell, of Todmorden, guilty of stealing two thousand six hundred pieces of silverware, and five hundred pieces of china from the King Edward Hotel. Mitchell worked for Charles Taylor who had a contract for taking garbage away from the hotel, and the articles in question are believed to have been dumped into the garbage either by accident or design. 


