To Clean Gas Stoves.

1. Lift off all the bars from the top. 2. Wash the top of the stove under the burners with hot soda water. 3. Clean the burners every now and then with an old brush dipped in

paraffin if they are greasy. Do not poke wire into the holes in the burners as this enlarges them and leads to an increased use of gas.

4. Wash bars with hot soda water, and polish them with blacklead, unless the bars are of steel, when they must be cleaned with emery paper. 5. Clean the brass taps and fittings. 6. Scrape and wash the shelves with


