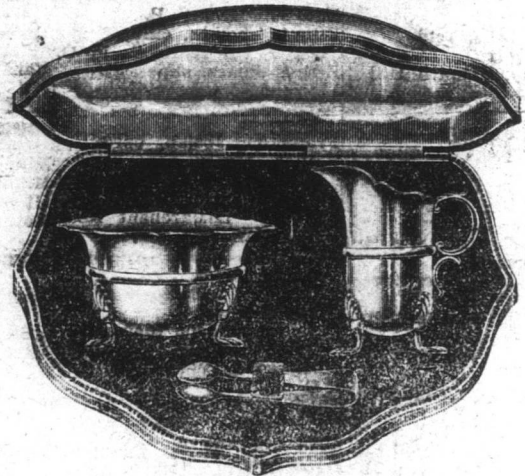

### Household Notes.

Oil of sassafras has been a time-honored remedy for flies.

Some people mix a little cornstarch with the salt to keep it dry.

For keeping the hands soft and white use oatmeal or cornmeal in the water.

A small quantity of rice or rolled oats can be put into the salt shaker to absorb the moisture.

Cake will be softer, lighter and finer grained if, instead of using all butter, part lard is used.

A little chopped parsley tied up in a small muslin bag will greatly improve the flavor of string beans.

Unbutton all clothing before sending it to the laundry and you will find fewer buttons will be lost or broken.

Flour paste may be kept indefinitely by adding to it a little formaldehyde, which may be procured at any drug store.

You can set the color in any article that has red in it by soaking the cloth for fifteen or twenty minutes in salt water.

Use vinegar instead of water and you will find the work of polishing will be much easier and the polish will last longer.

One of the most soothing and healing eye-washes consists of a saturated solution of boracic acid in camphor water.

Strong sunshine will ruin entirely the polish of your piano. Be careful this summer to keep it in the dark or covered.

When your oven does not respond quickly, put a hot stoveid inside the oven under the pudding or dish which is baking.

Peach stains are removed with a weak solution of chloride of lime. Linens require a long soaking to remove any stain.

Stewed tomatoes are improved by adding a little finely chopped meat and meat gravy; also a sliced onion fried in butter until brown.

When making meringue on pies or tablespoonful of granulated sugar to each white of egg is more satisfactory than powdered sugar.

Many of the new hats of linen seen at the exchanges are rounded oblongs, following the shape of the dishes so much used for olives, celery, etc.

A bit of old kid glove or stout canvas sewed under the bands of skirts just where the hooks and eyes are to be placed will prevent the bands tearing away.

When making lace insertion in the skirt flounce or the yoke of a lingerie frock, where the lace must stand some strain, place strips of bobbinet or net under the lace.

When the top of a pie is done, but there is some doubt about the lower crust, remove the pie from the oven and put it on the top of the stove for a few minutes.

For starching muslins, gingham and calicoes, dissolve a piece of alum the size of a hickory nut for every pint of starch. This will keep the colors bright for a long time.

When shaking or cleaning rugs never grasp them at the end, but always at the side. In this way fringe is protected and the ends do not ravel. The original shape of the rug is kept.



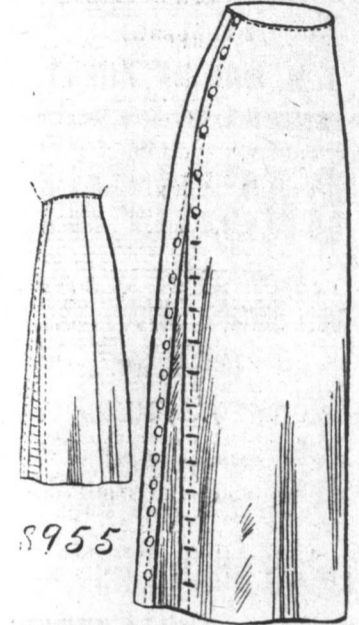

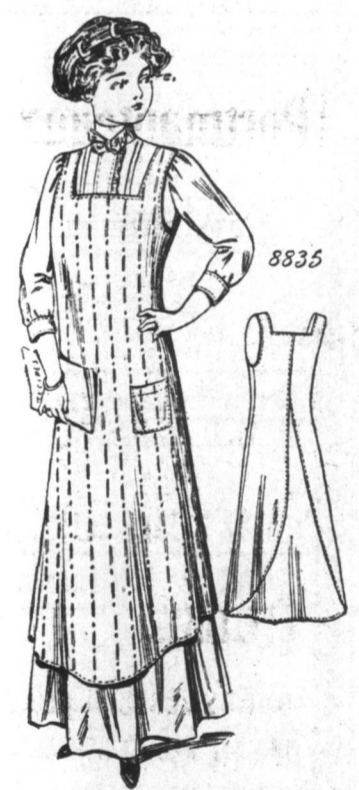

The other day I read a letter in the

still I feel like clapping him on the  
back and saying, "them's my senti-  
ments, too."

When the park in Placentia was  
spoken of some of us laughed at the  
idea as we thought it silly, consider-  
ing that Placentia was a country  
place, a park would be overdoing what  
had already been provided by nature.  
But Mr. Soper's letter has aroused a  
different feeling in me, for while we

have lots of pretty scenery and beau-  
tiful spots in and near the city, still  
what is required is a particular place  
provided with amusements in which  
people could meet and participate  
and make each others life more happy.

We hear of Coney Island and its  
many attractions, of the pleasant time  
it affords the working man and his  
family, and we are told that the cost  
of such amusement is very small in-  
deed. No one will doubt that such a  
place in our country would be of great  
benefit to our people, for after all the  
great bulk of the working classes in  
this community really have no real  
pleasure at all. No doubt trouting af-  
fords a great pleasure to many of the  
male section of the community. They  
can take an occasional run out on the  
line and spend a very pleasant time;  
but while they are out there their  
wives and mothers and daughters are

left behind awaiting the catch to ar-  
rive home and to listen to the whaling  
stories of the follower of Isaac Walton.  
Then we have an odd trip to Topsail  
for Kelligrews when we take our wives  
and sweethearts with us, but what  
does a trip out there amount to?  
An hour's run, sitting up nice and  
straight on the train, a walk through  
the village, then your tea, and then  
a start for the train again. There is  
nothing of real pleasure about it—  
nothing to make you forget that you  
have lots of trouble ahead of you the  
next day; there's a tameness about  
it that makes you feel to change as  
you must act so—look nice and quiet  
lest people would think that you  
were forgetting yourself.

If we had some place near the  
city where good bathing could be  
provided, a couple of shoot-the-shoots,  
some merry-go-rounds, shooting gal-  
leries, &c., where the people could  
go and amuse themselves, it would  
be a great blessing to the commu-  
nity.

We are working overtime trying to  
make our people sober; we are short-  
ening the hours for the sale of liq-  
uor, but we are doing simply nothing  
to provide some real healthy amuse-  
ment for our people to take the place  
of what we are taking from them.  
Men are men, and as such must have  
something more than work and sleep,  
and if the Government took an inter-  
est in finding some such amusement  
for the great bulk of the people as  
that I have mentioned, they would  
do a great amount of good, and we  
would have a more healthy and hap-  
pier community.

One section of this community have  
all the pleasures they desire. It is  
not for them I speak, but for the  
thousands of men and women who  
work on and on and never enjoy a  
day in the year except it is the Day  
of the Races. That's the one and only  
thing that the people get for nothing  
around here, and let us hope that it  
will never die out. Young men and  
young women find life around here  
dull compared with the States and  
America, simply because we haven't  
the places which afford simple amuse-  
ment like they can find in these  
countries.

It only requires a movement to be  
made by some enthusiastic, liberal  
minded gentleman to set the thing  
agoing, and in no way can a greater  
blessing be given the people than by  
affording them an opportunity to en-  
joy some of the sunshine of life  
which should be theirs.

### Cable News.

#### Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 31.  
It is believed that at a conference  
to be held to-day at Berlin, an agree-  
ment respecting the Moroccan ques-  
tion will be concluded between France  
and Germany. It is said France is  
prepared to accept Germany's de-  
mands for compensation in return  
for giving France a free hand in Mo-  
rocco, but the extent of final demands  
is not known. Numerous indications  
to-day that these may be some truth  
in the story published here, that Ger-  
many demanded the dismissal of Lloyd  
George for his Mansion House speech,  
tended to still further embitter An-  
glo-German sentiment. Movement of  
English troops has begun towards  
the east coast of England. A tor-  
pedo flotilla was ordered to sail at 4  
o'clock yesterday under special orders,  
and it was learned the officers were  
not to open them until two hours  
later.

#### Special Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, July 31.  
The return of the Emperor to the  
capital has not affected Moroccan ne-  
gotiations, contrary to the contention  
of Paris papers that the Emperor  
would change the Foreign Minister's  
policy. The Emperor, according to  
an official statement to-day, received  
a report on the negotiations, but no  
details concerning exchanges have  
been given out. Anglo-French re-  
ports regarding Togoland and Kamerun,  
where it had been said concessions  
might be made by Germany in ex-  
change for a strip of French Con-  
go, are unconfirmed. It is learned  
that Germany took diplomatic steps  
regarding the speech of Lloyd George  
and subsequent English newspaper  
comment, which pronouncement was  
construed as Britain's veto to Franco-  
German settlement on basis of conces-  
sion to Germany in French Congo.  
The German Government requested  
and received an explanation to the  
effect that Britain was disinterested  
in the situation outside of Morocco.  
This attitude was later embodied in  
Premier Asquith's statement to the  
Commons. But for this understand-  
ing between Berlin and London, the  
situation might have been critical.

#### Special Evening Telegram.

TEHRAN, Persia, July 31.  
Ex-Shah Mohammed Ali Mirza left  
Astrabad yesterday with an over-  
whelming force, and is now marching  
towards Teheran. There is much ap-  
prehension here that the Ex-Shah's  
attempt to regain the throne will suc-  
ceed. The Government is without  
power to suppress anarchic condi-  
tions which prevail throughout the  
country.

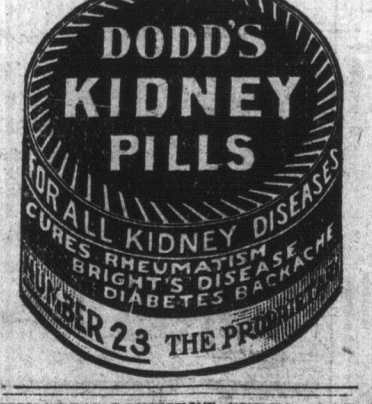
COWES, July 31.

### \$3,000,000 Dry Dock For Montreal.

Ottawa, July 27.—A contract was  
last night signed between the Gov-  
ernment and the Canadian Vickers,  
Limited, of Montreal, for the con-  
struction of a dry dock at Montreal  
and the payment of a subsidy by the  
Government to the company. The  
dock is to be completed and ready  
for operation by December 31, 1912.  
It is to be of the first class and the  
Government undertakes to pay 3 1/2  
per cent. for \$3,000,000.


