



They Must Go.

The Picnic Party are scared these days. They are already in mortal terror of the judgment that is in store for them next year.

They know that the people have made up their minds that the Grabbers shall go, and go the Grabbers must.

The people are outraged at the suggestion that a different standard prevails for a Cabinet in London and a Ministry in St. John's. They do not see why this should be so. They do not agree that it is so, and they insist that it shall not be so.

How does it happen that Minister Morison has not resigned after reading the opinion of Governor Williams that, judged by the standard of the British Cabinet, a member so situated

would feel himself called upon to resign?

The hint of the Governor was apparently not strong enough. Some folks need a sledge hammer to drive an idea into their heads. As Mr. Morison did not see the force of the suggestion that he should resign voluntarily, why did not the Prime Minister enforce it with something strong enough to bring it about.

Mr. Morison is still a member of the Ministry, and Minister of Justice, six months after the Governor expressed an opinion to the Secretary of State for the Colonies to this effect: "I might go even further and say that I can hardly imagine a similar case arising, because the traditions and practice of the House of Commons are opposed to it."

Is it possible to convey in clearer terms a hint that the proper course for the Minister concerned was voluntary resignation, and the proper course for the Prime Minister to insist upon was to drive the suggestion home to the mind of the Minister, should he be dense.

Mr. Morison appears to be content to carry the stigma of the opinions expressed by the Governor and the Secretary of State in London, provided he is not forced to give up his office. He is apparently satisfied to take shelter under the cloak of another

opinion of the Governor, which follows immediately on that last quoted, viz.: "But it is widely different here and it must not be supposed that the difference springs from corruption."

The Governor, in spite of these opinions, and in spite of Mr. Morison declining to resign voluntarily, retains him on his Council and appealed to the Secretary of State to confirm his action. Here is part of what the Governor wrote: "I believe that I shall be doing right in retaining Mr. Morison on my Council and in continuing to extend my confidence to him, and I trust that you will confirm me in this view."

The Governor's appeal for the whitewashing of his chief fell on deaf ears. The Right Hon. L. Harcourt maintained the standard of the British Cabinet. He lived up to the traditions of the House of Commons and declined to confirm the Governor in his view of Mr. Morison, and curtly stated: "I have to inform you that I am not prepared to express any opinion on the controversy which deals with questions which concern primarily the Government and Legislation of the Colony."

The Pilot's Mistake.

QUEBEC, To-day. It now comes out that the carrying of a lantern on the St. Lawrence beach by fishermen led the pilot of the Royal George to mistake it for a light on a mast of a buoy on Beaumont Shoal. He gave orders to port the helm, bringing the vessel nearer the North Shore. When he discovered his mistake he ordered the helm to starboard but before the steamer swung south she struck and remained.



army. Had the Turkish soldier been supplied, with even one biscuit a day, he might have held his ground against the invader. I am convinced he was defeated more by mere starvation than by any other single factor.

Appalling Endurance in Turkish Hanks.

"The Turkish General Staff is incapable of running a country circus. The Generals are honest, but have not grasped even the most elementary principles of modern warfare. Artillery was sent into action with a few hours' supply of shells and with no reserve within fifty miles, with the result that on the second day of the battle, the Turkish soldiers had to be practically unsupported by this arm."

"Whole brigades of ignorant peasants from Anatolia were sent to Constantinople dressed in khaki and handed rifles, some hundreds of rounds of ammunition, and kits which they hardly knew how to fit on their backs. They were counted at the railway station with glee by the authorities, and officially described as 'our invincible infantry.'"

"Thousands of them never had a Mauser rifle in their hands. They had to be shown how to use it. Under the enemy's fire entire battalions, unused to this new arm, would fire all their ammunition in one short hour and hit the ground fifty yards in front of them, inflicting absolutely no damage on the enemy."

"I never saw a single Turkish machine gun. If they exist, I do not know what became of them."

"The Bulgarian artillery played a matchless role. It overwhelmed the Turkish defence and crushed every offensive movement by the rapidity and deadly accuracy of its fire."

"The number of guns which the Bulgarians were able to bring into action astounded the Turks. The way in which they replenished their ammunition supply was a masterpiece of organization. The fire of their machine guns was extremely deadly. This played a very important part in the victory."

"The heroic courage of the Bulgarians excited the admiration of their opponents. A new military Power has arisen in eastern Europe, which even the Great Powers will not be able to disregard, threaten, or coerce."

Hidich, the Serbian novelist, has written the following description of atrocities by Turks on the Serbo Turkish frontier, since the war began. In Novibazar, a number of Turks entered the house of a priest named Philip Kusmanovitch, in the village of Dubrovitz. They dragged him into the road and cut off his nose, ears and lips. This mutilated, the fiends took the priest through the streets to show him to the peasantry. When the man fell down in agony, they gave him a finishing stroke by putting a bullet through his head. Turkish murderers then went to the next village, where they seized another priest, Peter Bacaline. They treated him in a similar fashion, and a revolver. In the village of Grandina Turkish soldiers caught an unfortunate peasant named Vern Taskish and cut him up into morsels.

Describing the terrible scenes he witnessed in the rout of Abdullah Pasha's army, he says:—

"On Thursday not a vestige of order

remained. Whole brigades and divisions were broken up. The strongest speedily got to the front, while the weak and wounded struggled painfully behind. Many, though not wounded, were so weak that they fell by the roadside and made no further effort to save themselves. For three days all these men had been without a morsel of food, many for ven a longer period.

"The further we reached from the battlefield the worse the scene became because many of the wounded could go no further and were crawling off the track to lie down and die by the roadside without a curse or reproach at the author of all their miseries.

"Among these thousands of fugitives, the remnants of three Army Corps, scarcely an officer remained. At the commencement of the campaign, the Turkish army was two thousand short of its proper quota of officers. Its loss in officers in the great battle has been enormous, and in consequence

whole battalions are like sheep without a shepherd.

"On the road they were met by fresh troops coming from Chorju on their way to the front, ignorant of the great disaster. They, too, joined in the flight. There must have been forty or fifty thousand stragglers scattered over the plain.

"I have no time to relate how whole battalions were cut to pieces by the enemy's fire; of men starving in the ranks and dying of exposure; of thousands of Bulgarians slaughtered; of Turkish artillery captured and guns abandoned; of the mistakes of generals; and of the awful confusion and lack of method which prevailed everywhere.

Turkish Authorities Deliberately Deceived.

"The more I reflect on the amazing debacle of the Turkish army in Thrace, the more natural it seems. It has utterly destroyed that army's power of taking the offensive again in the present war.

"It is extremely doubtful if the Turks can hold the far-famed lines of Tchatalja, which are probably as big a bluff as everything else Turkish has proved to be.

"I cannot state accurately the losses of the Turks in the battle of Saktzkoy or at Lala Burgas, but officers of the Staff have placed them between forty thousand and fifty thousand men killed or wounded, apart from prisoners captured.

"After I left the army at Thorlu, most of Turkish guns had fallen into the hands of the enemy. The most serious factor of all was the utter destruction of the morale of the Turkish soldier from privation, want of food, and entire lack of confidence in their leaders.

"From the very moment I arrived I found that the military authorities of Constantinople had deliberately deceived the outside world regarding the true state of the army. They had embarked on a gigantic system of fraud and calculating lying, hoping against hope that the bravery and determination of Turkish soldiers would pull them through at the eleventh hour.

"It is impossible for me to describe with severity enough the chaos of mess, muddle and make-believe which exists throughout all branches of the

Cable News.

LONDON, To-day. The Royal Commission on divorce has reported. The majority report recommends that the two sexes be placed on equality before the law, which shall be a duty, desertion for three years, incurable insanity after five years confinement, habitual drunkenness found to be incurable after three years. Nine commissioners signed the report. The minority report, signed by the Archbishop of York and two other commissioners, opposed the extension of the law to the divorce on the ground that it is destructive of the sanctity of the marriage tie, family life and contrary to the principles of its Christian Faith in relation to marriage.

LONDON, To-day. The war news from Constantinople last night indicates another Turkish defeat. The battle on the Tchokalez lines may be the last battle of the war. Many wounded are arriving at the capital. The Bulgarians however may force an entrance into Constantinople and go into winter quarters and awaiting peace negotiations. There is still talk at Vienna of sending an ultimatum to Serbia, but it is believed Germany is exercising a restraining influence.



Britain Fully Defeated on Snap Division.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 11. As a result of Austria's threats, it is now said here that the Admiralty has been working secretly for months and that England's great Navy is now on a war footing and ready to strike. This will probably do more than any other agency to insure European peace. Animated by purely patriotic motives, and in obedience to instructions by the Government, the British press did not print a line about the strange activities in the dockyards until ten days ago, when Britain called all her sailors to the colours. Even then, once more obeying instructions all the papers published the diplomatic fiction that the mobilization of battleships, cruisers and destroyers in squadrons was only part of a project to give all sections of the service practical sea drills. Britain does not want to fight. She will exhaust every effort of diplomacy to avert a general European war, but everybody here reads between the lines of Asquith's speech of Saturday night the expression of a firm determination to prevent Austria from excluding Serbia from the Adriatic, and her allies from robbing the Balkan States of the fruits of victories, which have cost them thousands of lives on the battlefields.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 11. The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail learns that the threads of the Austro-Serbian crisis are now in the hands of the German Secretary of Foreign Affairs, who is working a formula designed to appease both Austria and Serbia.

Editor Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 11. The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent says that preliminary conversations have been begun with Austria in the name of the Balkan League. The latter has made every possible concession, but maintain that a Serbian outlet to the Adriatic is an absolute essential. The press and public opinion in St. Petersburg, according to a despatch to the Mail from the Russian capital, considers a conflict between Russia and Austria is imminent, if Austria continues to threaten Serbia.

Special Evening Telegram.
VIENNA, Nov. 11. There is much excitement here over the possibility of war between Russia and Austria. Reports say that mobilization is imminent, though this is officially denied. On the contrary it is said that Austria is awaiting the end of the war before opening formal negotiations with Serbia.

Special Evening Telegram.
PARIS, Nov. 11. According to a Sofia despatch to the Journal, the Austrians with the exception of Austria, have presented a joint note to the Bulgarian Government, offering mediation. The Government accepted the note, but as yet has made no reply. It is possible that they will decline the offer. Despatches received on Sunday say that a great battle is being fought around Tchalajia, and the Bulgarian Government will do nothing till that has been decided.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 11. A despatch from Malta to the Morning Post says that a rumour is prevalent that the British cruiser Brahan was met with an accident. One report is that she struck a Turkish mine. A Malta despatch to the Daily Telegraph, however, says the reports are without foundation. Twenty British warships are now in Turkish waters and are calling at Malta in unbroken numbers and the market has been cleared to supply them prices rising rapidly.

Critical Week for Europe.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, 5 this a.m. Europe is facing one of the most critical weeks in her history. It may end in war, in which the whole of Europe will be involved, or be remembered as the week in which diplomatic succeeded in solving problems which appeared insoluble to many. The Bulgarian Army is on the point of entering Constantinople. This will be resented by Russia. At the same time the Turkish capital is threatened with massacres from within. On the other side of the Balkan Peninsula, there is an acute conflict between the aims of Austria-Hungary and Serbia, which, if not arranged, might start a general European outbreak. The most hopeful sign at the present moment is the fact that moderating influences are being brought to bear by Germany, the close ally of Austria-Hungary, and by Bulgaria, the comrade in arms of Serbia. But these nations are now exerting their selves to avert a conflict. The view of Austria-Hungary concerning the future European Turkey are pretty well known and include access to eastern markets, the integrity of Albania including the Adriatic coast of that country, and compensation for Roumania, which always claims when Bulgarian territory is extended her borders should likewise spread. The Austria-Hungarian Minister at Belgrade, just returned to his post informed the Serbian Government of these proposals, and suggested a reasonable settlement would be, the Austria in return for corresponding privileges in Balkan ports, and on always leading to them, should give Serbia running privileges over the line that is built to Port Danazzo, and that the two countries should together use the port as a free port.

MOVES TO HB. GRACE.—A certain manufacturer in the city, who deals in aerated waters, proposes to transfer his plant to Harbor Grace where he intends to reside and conduct business in future.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 11. The British Government was defeated today by a vote of 228 against 206, when in committee on the Home Rule Bill. A motion by Premier Asquith, for consideration of the Bill, was adjourned. There has been considerable opposition by members on the ministerial side, on the financial proposals, and some 70 Liberal members have given voice to their objections to the Irish Parliament being given control of the Customs, as they argue such control would enable the Irish Parliament to introduce protection. The followers of William O'Brien only this morning announced their intention of withdrawing from the House during the proceedings of the committee on the financial clauses. Postmaster-General Samuel, in opposing an amendment by Sir F. G. Balfour, said it would mean that the total sum valuable to Ireland would be limited to \$12,500,000 a year. Revenue from Irish taxation would be \$47,000,000 estimated on the present basis, and the amendment would mean that the sum handed back to Ireland would be \$12,500,000 for services which cost \$29,000,000 a year. When the result was announced the Unionists cheered wildly. Premier Asquith, when he came in, announced that the sitting would be adjourned. Such divisions during meetings of committee of the whole House, are not unusual, although this is the first experience of the kind for the present Government. Former Premier Balfour suffered in this way several times during his last Parliament. The Government is now faced with three alternatives. It can resign or drop the Home Rule Bill, or it can bring forward a motion to recommit it and obtain the opinion of the full House on the vote, which was taken to-day, after it has given due notice of its intention to do so. The general opinion is that the Government will move for the recommitment of the Bill and will not resign, in view of the fact that the division was unexpected and occurred on Monday, when many supporters of the Government had not returned from the week-end vacations.

Won't Resign.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, 5 this a.m. The Cabinet held a Council meeting after the Government's defeat, which lasted two hours, at the end of which a decision not to resign was announced. The official statement issued declares the adoption of the amendment was clearly due to such division on motion, which was not even put on the order paper, and was destructive of a resolution passed November 7th, by a majority of 121. The Government, therefore, in its statement, concludes it does not consider its defeat necessitate any change in its programme which, in respect to Home Rule, has been supported by majorities seldom short of a hundred.




