The British Government was defeated to-day by a vote of 228 against 206, when in committee on the Home Rule Bill. A motion by Premier Asquith, for consideration of the Bill, was adjourned. There has been considerable opposition by members on the ministerial side, on the financial proposals, and some 70 Liberal mem ers have given voice to their object ions to the Irish Parliament being argue such control would enable the Irish Parliament to introduce pro-tection. The followers of William O'Brien only this morning announced their intention of withdrawing from the House during the proceedings of the committee on the financial clauses. Postmaster-General Samuel, in oppos bury, said it would mean that the total sum valuable to Ireland would be limited to \$12,500,000 a year. Revenue from Irish taxation would be \$47,000,000 estimated on the present basis, and the amendment would mean that the sum handed back to Ireland would be \$12,500,000 for which cost \$30,000,000 a year. the result was announced the Unionists cheered wildly. Premier Asquith, when he came in, announced that the sitting would be adjourned. Such divisions during meetings committee of the whole House, not unusual, although this is the first experience of the kind for the present Government. Former Premier Bal-four suffered in this way several times during his last Parliament. The Government is now faced with three alternatives. It can resign or drop the Home Rule Bill, or it can bring forward a metion to recommit it and obtain the opinion of the full House on the vote, which was taken to-day. after it has given due notice of its intentions to do so. The general opinion is that the Government will move for the recommittal of the Bill and will not resign, in view of the act that the division was unexpected and occurred on Monday, when many supporters of the Government had not returned from the week-end vaca-

### Won't Resign.

LONDON, 5 this a.m. The Cabinet held a Council meeting after the Government's defeat, which asted two hours, at the end of which decision not to resign was announce ed. The official statement issued de clares the adoption of the amendment was clearly due to such division on motion, which was not even put on the order paper, and was destructive of a resolution passed November 7th by a majority of 121. The Govern-ment, therefore, in its statement, concludes it does not consideh its defeat necessitate any change in its programme which, in respect to Homo Rule, has been supported by majorities seldom short of a hundred.


