



New Dreadnought For U.S. Navy.

Washington, July 11.-The plans for the sceond super-dreadnought to be built for the United States navy were approved yesterday. This vessel is to be a sister ship to the Pennsylvania, and will for a time be known as battleship No. 29. She was authorized by the last Naval Approipriation Act of March 4, 1913.

She will be 600 feet long on the draft, and a displacement of 31,500 tons, and cost, exclusive of her guns and armor, \$7,425,000. No. 39 and the ships ever planned for the United States Navy. The new ship will be built at the New York navy yard. Thirty-nine will be propelled by turines, and have oil-burning boilers
