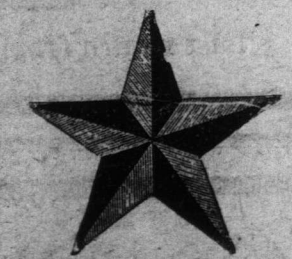

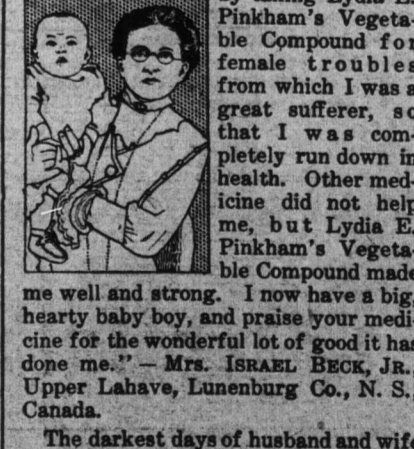

Cable News.

BOSTON, To-day.
When the steamer City of the Bangor Eastern Steamship Company's Kennebec River Line, tied her wharf, flames originating in the boiler room swept through her forward part with startling rapidity. One man was killed to death, and several others injured. The forward end, including staterooms, saloon and pilot house was gutted.

HONOLULU, To-day.
The British battleship New Zealand sailed for Vancouver after a week of entertainment. The last affair was a dinner on board the ship given by Captain Halsey to General and Mrs. Peniston, Admiral Moore, Consul Rentiers and his wife. Yesterday Captain Halsey and his fellow officers reviewed the infantry, cavalry and artillery stationed at Fort Schofield. Large crowd watched the New Zealand get under way while the American band played "God save the King", and the ship's band played the "Star Spangled Banner".

LONDON, To-day.
Except for a report coming the way of Paris that a battle was progressing between the Roumans and Bulgarians at Belogradchik, sixty five miles Northwest of Sofia, which was not mentioned in the direct dispatches received from Bucharest, the general situation in the Balkans remains unchanged. Bulgaria now is seeking through Italy to obtain peace from Roumania, but no progress appears to have been made towards peace negotiations, all three of her enemies are closing in on Bulgaria with apparent determination to create peace when their armies occupy Sofia.

Wesley Church.

The Newfoundland Highlanders are attending the Sunday morning worship. In the evening the Rev. Dr. Powell will preach. Dr. Powell is the son of Joseph Powell, Esq., of Bonavista, with whom he has been spending a vacation. Dr. Powell educationally fitted himself for a professorship and has declined repeated offers, remaining in the pastorate to which he has eminent qualifications. Newfoundland is always glad to welcome her successful sons back to the old land they always hold dear.

The Herald Flapdoodle.

The Evening Herald is getting off the flap-doodle that the Bond victory of 1900 was mainly due to the co-operation of Sir Edward Morris. What had Sir Edward Morris to do with the great agitation against the Reid Deal? What had Sir Edward Morris to do with the propaganda against the Reid Deal which led to that victory? Was not the victory in Fortune Bay and St. John's East won without the help of Sir Edward Morris? And does not a letter sent to Sir Edward Morris in October, 1900, showing that the Liberals of St. John's West were divided as to Sir Edward's candidacy?

Mr. McGrath tries to make capital out of the fact that the Liberals did not contest Burns' election. It was open for a contest and did not agitate for an election for Harbor Grace after Mr. Seymour's death. The Liberals were willing to take up the challenge of a general election asked for in 1912 by thousands of fishermen, but Sir Edward Morris feared to face the public. Sir Edward was afraid to test the feelings of the country and make the Government the stakers of the contest.

As Mr. McGrath makes so much of the bye-elections which Sir Robert Bond did not contest, why does he ignore the bye-elections he contested and won in 1897? Sir Robert Bond won Fortune Bay and St. John's East with Sir Edward Morris out of the Party. Sir Edward had nothing to do with the propaganda in 1898 and 1899 which led to the great revision of feeling which culminated in Sir Robert's victory in 1900. Indeed, the Liberals of the West End were divided as to adopting E. P. Morris as a candidate in 1900 at all, as the letter appended proves. How then can the victory of 1900 be attributed mainly to Morris?

Dear Sir,—As nomination day is approaching, and we have not yet had a declaration as to your position re Railway legislation, we beg to call your attention to this important matter.

We do not wish in any way to divide the Liberal vote, but shall be compelled to actively oppose you if we have not at the earliest possible moment a public declaration that you will not give Reid any further concessions, and that you will in every particular support Mr. Bond's Manifesto.

We are compelled to take this course as it is currently reported that in your public speeches you have not stated what your position is as to the transfer Reid wants, or the taking back of the telegraphs by the Government.

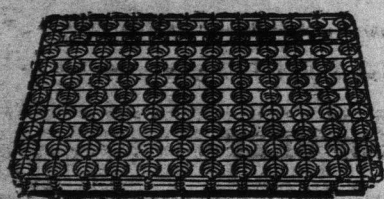

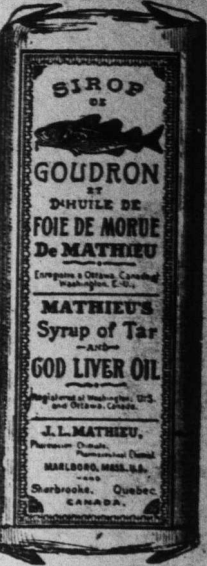

At the weekly meeting of the Regatta Committee, held at Wood's last night, there were present the following members: President Hiscock, Vice-pres. Higgins, Treas. Ellis, Secretary Noonan, P. W. Hayward, P. Hanley, W. J. Martin, N. Andrews, J. L. Slattery, A. E. Wood, E. W. Taylor, R. W. Jeans, L. G. Chafe, J. Day, T. J. Foran, E. Dowden, T. D. Carew. Mr. Phillip Hanley having drawn attention to the fact that the boys of the competing brigades would wish this year to see medals given as none of the cups could be won outright, a lengthy discussion ensued. Mr. Hayward and Mr. Chafe agreed with Mr. Hanley. Messrs. Higgins and Martin thought that as the possible capture of the cups by any brigade would take many years to consummate, medals should be given. Mr. J. L. Slattery dissented from this and after a great deal of discussion pro and con, the matter was deferred to await the action of the Brigade Commanders.

The Truckmen's Union, through Mr. M. O'Neill, the Secretary, contributed \$15 to the funds. President Hiscock autographed the Union and they well deserve it. The collections to date are fair, but to have a successful regatta better must be done. Mr. Syme thanked the Committee for being re-appointed a judge. The King Edward Brigade of St. George's, asked to be given a place on the programme. If they enter a crew composed of lads associated with the Naval Reserve, they will get what they ask for.

On behalf of the Daily News Mr. C. B. Stevenson asked could they row in the Mercantile Race. There was quite a discussion about it and it was hard to determine how such a crew could be eligible. After all it is composite. It is composed generally of printers, pressmen, reporters, so after the discussion went on for a while it was decided that the lads of the Daily News team could not go in the Mercantile Race, as such.

Mr. T. J. Foran, of the News, spoke of the qualifications of pressmen. After all a hard question to decide. So many different professions are in a newspaper office that the difficulty of placing the men in a race could hardly well be solved. Anyhow, the general consensus of the meeting was that the men were entitled to go in the amateur race. The convention adjourned at 10.15.

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Council Board took place yesterday afternoon. Payment of \$80, annual rental for a portion of the Governor's private property, enclosed in Bannerman Park, was asked for by the Colonial Secretary, who also asked the reason why no payment was made for said property since 1904. There is some misunderstanding in the boundaries and the Council will be unable to act until a complete investigation is made.

Hon. H. J. B. Woods, on behalf of Temperance St. residents, objected to the building of a smithy in that locality. Last week an application for its erection was referred to the Engineer. Since then one of the officials granted permission, and the building is now in course of erection. The official who made the mistake will be dealt with at a special meeting.

An application was read from Jas. Baird, Ltd., who asked for the removal of the fountain in Cliff's Cove, as it was a great source of annoyance. Some cross-firing resulted between Councillors Ryan, Myrick and Mullaly, and the matter was referred to the Engineer.

The Horwood Lumber Co. offered \$50 for the alteration of pavement between Water and Bambrick Streets. Work will be gone ahead with as soon as a cheque for the above amount is received.

P. C. Mar's offer to demonstrate the value of Calcium Chloride, which is used for keeping down dust, was accepted with thanks.

A light will be erected on Bannerman Road, as asked for by the Hon. S. D. Blandford.

Permission was given N. Worsley to repair house at corner of Brien and Hamilton Streets.

The removal of a gully at corner of Signal Hill Road, as it is dangerous to the health of the locality, was suggested by Dr. Brehm. Will be attended to.

Councillor Ryan called attention to a dump in the West End. Councillor Mullaly said he referred to this matter two years ago. The dump will be closed in.

The matter of increase of wages for certain officials, was let stand over owing to the absence of the Mayor, who left the meeting early. A communication was read from Parsons and Maunder, representing the Labor Party, who wished to acquaint the Council that they had started their campaign. The meeting then closed.

New Dreadnought For U.S. Navy.

Washington, July 11.—The plans for the second super-dreadnought to be built for the United States navy were approved yesterday. This vessel is to be a sister ship to the Pennsylvania, and will for a time be known as battleship No. 39. She was authorized by the last Naval Appropriation Act of March 4, 1913.

She will be 600 feet long on the water line, 97 feet beam, have 28 feet draft, and a displacement of 31,500 tons, and cost, exclusive of her guns and armor, \$7,425,000. No. 29 and the Pennsylvania are the largest battleships ever planned for the United States Navy. The new ship will be built at the New York navy yard.

Thirty-nine will be propelled by turbines, and have oil-burning boilers of the water tube type.

Her main battery will be twelve 14-inch rifles, mounted in four turrets on the median line of the ship. Her speed will be 21 knots. There are three masts in the list at the Navy Department for the new ship—California, New Mexico, and Arizona. Preference seemed to favor California.

Bad Horror of Being Buried Alive.

To Insure Against it, Widow Orders Her Heart Cut Out.

Berkeley Camp, July 11.—Mrs. Adelaide Sherwood, Soule, widow of Professor Frank Soule, of the University of California, who died here July 3, took measures to insure past all doubt that neither she nor her pet animals should be buried alive. Mrs. Soule's will, which was filed for probate to-day, provides that her heart should be cut out within twenty-four hours of the time she was declared dead, and her body held seven days before burial. The will also provided that all her animal pets should be chloroformed within 24 hours of her death, and their bodies held until chloroformed within 24 hours of the will have been complied with.

The Cause And Cure of Beri-Beri.

Berlin, July 11.—The Medical Association reports that Dr. Max Moszkowski, who has been investigating the causes of beri-beri, shares the contention of Dr. Ellis Fraser, and Professor Fletcher, of the Malay States, that beri-beri is an assimilation disease caused by the use of rice. Dr. Moszkowski experimented on himself. He subsisted on rice for 128 days, after which all the symptoms of the disease manifested themselves. The injection of a serum containing extract of rice resulted in his complete recovery.

A Clipper.

The handsome clipper Blue Bell is undoubtedly the clipper of St. John's. She is a motor boat owned by the Patriarchs Morse Co. Yesterday Mr. F. Ganning, of G. M. Barr's, with a select party took her up the shore to Trepanney on one continuous run. The little boat went the 60 miles in short order and did it at the rate of 12 knots an hour. Militants Attack the King's Carriage

Fight in Liverpool Followed. Liverpool, July 11.—Many people were hurt here to-day in street fighting when men and women who loved an attempt by the militants to attack the carriage which King George and Queen Mary were driving through the city.

The attack followed a wild scene on Lord Street, when Miss Jolly, a party of the Liverpool branch of Women's Social and Political Union made a lone raid, smashing hundreds of dollars' worth of plate-glass windows. The local militant leaders laid plans for the biggest suffrage demonstration Liverpool has ever known because of the presence to-day of King and Queen, who are making a tour of the midlands.

Extraordinary police precautions had been taken to guard Their Majesties from attack, as it was feared the militants, who have been unusually active here of late, would attempt to interfere with the progress of Royal party and perhaps an assault.

Soldiers co-operated with police detectives in policing the streets the protecting the King and Queen from the crowds.

Just before the Royal party turned into Lord Street Miss Jolly appeared, brandishing her poker above her head, she scattered them right and left. Screaming denunciations of the government, she sent her weapon crashing into plate glass windows, hundreds of dollars' worth of damage.

Several policemen overpowered, while she struggled with many others. She was locked up.

This incident alarmed the authorities, for it served as a clue that women had planned an active day. Half an hour later the attacks on the Royal carriage occurred. For a break in the police lines seven women ran into the street. They held quantities of suffragette literature into the carriage, and one seized the door and tried to wrench open. Another ran towards the street's heads to stop them.

An Equeury leaped to the street, grappled with one of the women, in an instant the others were seized. In the meantime, however, supporters of militants swarmed to the aid of their sisters, immediately a free-for-all fight began.

A Saloonless U. S. in Six Years.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 12.—Twenty different meetings were held here to-day by the delegates to the 26th International Christian Endeavor Conference, at the most important of which Rev. Daniel A. Poling, of Columbus, Ohio, National Superintendent of the Temperance and the Christian Citizenship Divisions of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, outlined a programme for the next two years. It is expected that his plan will be adopted on Monday, as the official policy of the organization.

The feature of Dr. Poling's plan was the work to be done in the campaign, which has for its object, "A saloonless United States by 1920." Ultimately he hoped there would be federal constitutional amendments prohibiting the manufacture and sale of liquor.

He declared Christian Endeavor leaders were not satisfied with the prohibition bill introduced in congress by Representative Hobson of Alabama, because of "loop holes" in it. The Hobson measure, he said, "seeks to prohibit the manufacture of intoxicating liquors for use as a beverage, but this does not go far enough. It should provide against the importation or exportation of liquor."

Rev. Chas. Sheldon, of Topeka, Kas., presided at another meeting, where organized civil action, business methods as a part of society, the relation of the church to the state, and Christian forces in municipal life, were discussed.

About the Wheel of Fortune at the Regatta.

In days gone by the "Wheel of Fortune" played a prominent part in fun making at the Regatta. It was a simple, innocent amusement that cost little and afforded pleasant pastime to many who took a ticket in the game of chance, while those who stood around and took in the show smiled as they beheld the joyous face of the lucky winner, or the disappointed expressions that came over the visage of those whose tickets were blank. Tucker regrets that the Wheel of Fortune is a thing of the past at the Races, because by abolishing it we play the part of hypocrites from start to finish. If the Lottery Law aimed at making our people sanctimonious as far as gambling is concerned, it should reach its arms out far enough to grasp the high toned individual who won't take a ticket on a five cent lottery, but will gamble in other games and yet be allowed to go scot free. Tucker says the Wheel of Fortune is enforced in this country is nothing short of a complete humbug, a fizzle and farce. Here we see thousands of dollars being gambled on all sides, and yet we have to leave the Wheel of Fortune silent, and the amusement it gave behind, simply because we want to pretend that we are upholding the Law. Such silliness instead of reaching the object aimed at, only tends to make the Lottery Law appear ridiculous in the eyes of the Common Man who invested in a five cent ticket, and not only that but creates a feeling within him that we have one law for the rich and another for men like Tucker, who enjoyed a little sport on Regatta Day in taking a ticket on the rickety wheel and hauling in his dollar and fifty when his number stopped on the left hand side of the piece of wire hoop at the top of the dial.

Tucker says we're not going to do much good by this kind of a game, and the sooner we get back to the old-time sports at Regatta the more enjoyable they will be, and the more general we will make the fun. To include the simple "Wheel of Fortune" in the games prohibited by the Lottery Law was, in Tucker's opinion, never intended. He may be wrong in this contention as he never read much law, but he believes that when the Lottery Bill was passed some one told the man who used to run the Wheel of Fortune at the Races that it had to be cut out or he'd run the risk of getting six months twice a year, and he being of a nervous disposition refrained from carrying down his wheel, and from that time till now the wheel has been conspicuous by its absence.

On Stealing Charity.

By RUTH CAMERON.
 To accept charity either from the individual or the community, is no disgrace whatever, although there are many people who can never be brought to believe that. On the other hand, to accept charity when you are not in need of it is a kind of poor relation of stealing.
 As you read these words, you probably think of the hypocrites who, by pretending blindness or some other misfortune, wheedle the money out of other people's pockets and pile up bank accounts with it, or of that class which makes a science of living on one charitable organization after another.
 These are indeed miserable creatures, but I wasn't thinking of them. I was thinking of another class which accepts a less obvious but none the less real charity, and which, in that it is usually composed of those who have had a better chance to be decent, is far less excusable in my mind.
 A particular flagrant example of the type called the matter to my attention. A young woman who had worked hard for many years as a house-keeper went to a hospital. She had very little money saved and she had been obliged to help out at home. But knowing that the hospital, although partially supported by philanthropy, needed every cent for its great work, she gladly paid the \$3 a week,
 which was the regular fee. One day a woman came to the cot near her, and the first patient heard the nurse say to the new arrival, "Now don't worry about money. I have told the doctor all you told me about your circumstances, and he says it will be all right. All we ask of you is that you shall pray that the money will come from somewhere to carry on the great work at St. —'s."
 This patient stayed 7 or 8 weeks on this basis. Sometime afterward, authentic information came to the house-keeper that her cot neighbor owned two or three houses and was comfortably well off.
 The matron of a working girls' boarding house, in which, by the aid of philanthropy, room, board and washing are supplied at \$3 a week for girls, earning less than \$5, tells me that again and again girls earning better money lie about their wages in order to take advantage of this help which belongs to the less fortunate, and to have a larger surplus for luxuries.
 Again, in a town where the district nurse is supplied free, or for what one can afford to pay, many people who could well afford to pay well for this convenience accept it free.
 These are a few examples of the type I condemn. You can probably supply more out of your own experience. Can you think of anything smaller and meaner than such stealing of charity? Personally, I cannot.

Bluff & Humbug Must Cease.

have not had anyone with interest enough in the district representing us in Parliament to see that our proportion of public monies was allocated and properly spent for the advancement of our district.
 The most important economic interest in the world is agriculture. Our district is the best agricultural portion of Newfoundland. If properly developed it is quite capable of supplying the Colony's demand for the products of the soil which we now import. Our people have done a great deal in the way of agricultural advancement, even though hampered and retarded by the want of proper transportation facilities and proper means of inter-communication. Transportation in a farming district is of greatest importance. Without it the produce of the soil cannot be cheaply and expeditiously handled and brought to market or point of shipment. Of what value are the thousands of acres of fertile soil which we have if they cannot be brought to the market?
 It is absolutely futile to expect a change for the better if we sit down and content ourselves with lamenting. Unless we take the matter in hand earnestly and decide to take some practical steps to impress on the Government of to-day and the Government of the next four years that we are determined to obtain more equitable treatment in the matter of public expenditure we shall not receive any consideration other than has been accorded us in the past. If we hope for better treatment in the future we must make our demands felt and complete respect for our representations by acting as a united people and presenting our demands as one man. We shall not improve matters by adhering to the methods that have hitherto been adopted. The sooner we realize that fact the better. Petitions and isolated settlements will have no effect. Our grievances are as wide as the district and redress must be demanded by the united voice of the whole people. That is the only way redress can be obtained. The justice of our claims has long been amply demonstrated, and is fully admitted by all who are willing to be influenced by reason and argument. On every hand are evidences of the disastrous consequences of the neglect we have had to suffer in the past. Individual appeals and isolated petitions for small improvements have failed to bring the redress we need, and other methods must now be adopted to compel a due recognition of our just claims.
 Spasmodic attempts at public expenditure on the eve of each election will not satisfy this long neglected district. The men of the West Coast are not fools or selfish. This game of humbug has been going on for far too long. The neglect of years cannot be compensated for by a flare up and a show of liberality a few months before election day. Common sense, self-dedication and make-belief cannot be longer tolerated. A more general equitable distribution of the revenues we contribute to the upkeep of public utilities must be made on the West Coast before the public mind will be satisfied. Every man of common sense sees how shamefully we have been ignored during the past decade of great advancement and expansion in every other district in the country. We have been deluded by promises and our interests sacrificed by representatives who lacked the courage or independence to stand up for what they must have known was our due. Shall we continue to be deluded and provoke the wrath of our neighbors in other districts?
 We believe the people of the West Coast will respond to a man in support of those who demand fair treatment and full rights for this district, not merely on election year, but every

Election-Year Generosity Cannot Compensate for Intervening Years of Neglect.

(Western Star, July 16th.)
 In recent issues we have dwelt at some length on the lack of public facilities in this district and the crying need of better communication and transportation.
 We have pointed out that our progress and proper and full development of our natural resources of forest, field and mine have been seriously retarded because of the absence of these facilities.
 We have shown that we have been shamefully neglected in the matter of public works. That we have not received our due proportion of public expenditure in comparison with other districts of less population and far less need of generous treatment at the hands of Governments in the past. That in the matter of public wharves so badly needed in every settlement from one end of this district to the other we have been almost completely ignored, and what we have are of the most flimsy construction. Right here in Curling we have not a public wharf worthy the name. We have not a public wharf in any part of the district at which a coastal steamer could tie up with convenience and safety.
 Contrast this with the treatment accorded other districts. Go through the district of Harbor Grace and you will see in every settlement, large, well built public wharves, a credit to the members and a convenience to the people. Go through the district of Harbor Main and the same thing is observed. Public wharves in every cove and harbor. In some settlements there are as many as three important public wharves, and so in all the other districts. Contrast this with public wharf accommodation in this district. We have not one to their ten. Why? Is it that our proportions of the revenues have been used up in other public works? It is not. It is because we have not been fairly and squarely treated in the matter of public expenditure. It is because we

year and every month in the year. Up to the present the people have not had any guidance in public matters. The representatives who hide themselves away after their election, and concern themselves in the affairs of the people who elected them as little as possible, are not leaders of their people nor the kind of men to whom the people look for guidance. As long as we continue to elect such men to represent us so long will the public monies of Bay St. George be diverted to other channels while our industries languish, our best efforts for development of our great resources be neutralized, and the laudable aspirations of our people for material and social advancement practically brought to naught.
 If we cannot get our due let us not permit any man or any Government to hoodwink us into believing that we are getting it, or allow representatives and Government to flatter themselves with the idea that election year generosity can compensate for the intervening years of absolute indifference and neglect.
 At all events it is time that this game of bluff and humbug ceased, and that we assert our rights and teach placemen and salaried patriots that they cannot fool us all the time.

Household Notes.

Discolored bronze should be thoroughly cleaned of dust, then apply a mixture of two parts warm water and one part of muriatic acid. Wipe dry with a chamois skin.
 The most convenient and cheapest of disinfectants to use in the cellar is quicklime. It may be placed in dishes, in bins or cupboards, or scattered loose in dark, damp corners.
 Carbonate of soda will remove the most obstinate mud stains. Rub with a cloth or flannel dipped in the soda, then press well on the wrong side of the material with a warm iron.
 Yelveten is successfully washed by making a lather of soap and warm water, then soaking the yelveten in it, squeezing it, but not rubbing. When this is finished, rinse in plenty of clear water and hang out to dry.
 Many housewives have bemoaned the fact that their tarts and pies do not have the delicious brown desired. Always keep in your cupboard a small pastry brush and brush your tarts and pies over with milk just before putting them into the oven.
 If the tablecloth is quite clean, excepting one or two spots, slip a folded towel between the tablecloth and the padding and on the towel place an empty bowl, having the stain directly over the bowl. Pour boiling water through the strain until it fades away. Lay another towel over the wet place and iron until dry.
 There are two enemies of linen—mildew and scorching. A slight scorching can be removed by squeezing the juice of an onion on the mark. Bad scorching needs the juice of a big onion mixed with hot mutton-fat, good, yellow soap, the same quantity of fuller's earth and a half pint of vinegar. Spread thickly, wait till dry, then wash out in soapsuds. Mildew marks are removed by rubbing the linen well with soap, then scrape some fine chalk and rub the linen in. Lay the linen on the grass and as it dries dampen it two or three times.

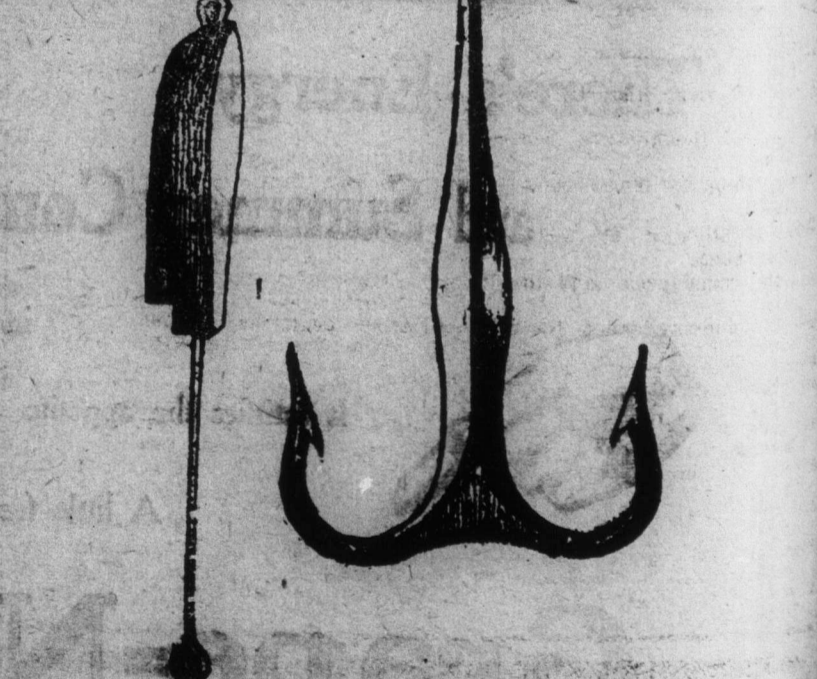

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 18.
The St. Petersburg correspondent
of the Times says that it is thought
that the Roumanian troops may
enter Sofia to-morrow.

BELGRADE, July 18.
A semi-official report describes a
battle near Bosilgrade on Thursday,
in which the Servians were victorious
and the Bulgarians lost heavily.

ROME, July 18.
Forty men were asphyxiated dur-
ing a fire in a sulphur mine at Cal-
tanisetta in Sicily yesterday. Res-
cuers made repeated descents into
the mine and saved 60 men. It is
feared that there are more victims
still in the mine.

PARIS, July 18.
At the request of Greece, the
French cabinet yesterday has as-
sumed protection of Greek interests
in the war region, has instructed the
Secretary of the French legation,
and officers of the French military to
proceed to the seat of war to investi-
gate the alleged Bulgarian atrocities.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 18.
The Government sent an important
delegation to Washington, yesterday,
to make an effort to remove the tax
on bananas under the new tariff bill.
It is feared that the proposed tax
will ruin Jamaica's principal indus-
try. The delegation consisted of
Bishop Collins, Sir John Pringle and
D. Gideon.

LONDON, July 18.
Sir Lionel Edward Garden, at pre-
sent British Minister to the Central
American States, was to-day appoint-
ed British Minister to Mexico, in
place of Francis Wm. Strange. Sir
Lionel has had considerable experi-
ence in Mexico, and was attached to
the late Sir J. St. John's special
mission to Mexico in 1883, and acted
as charge d'affaires in Mexico City
for several months in 1885.

PARIS, July 18.
The French aviator Bleriot an-
nounced successful trials of a sys-
tem which will enable aeroplanes to
alight like a bird on stretched cables
several yards above the ground, or
along a ship's side. The aeroplane
flies from below, in a parallel
direction from below, and by an up-
ward movement attaches itself by
means of a mechanical device. The
system is now undergoing careful
examination.

SOPIA, July 18.
The General commanding the Bul-
garian Army, operating against the
Greeks, charges the Greek troops
with deliberately raking with cannon
fire the hospital at Demihissar, in
spite of the fact that a red cross flag
was flying over the building. A few
hospital attendants died, says the
General, but the remainder of the
nurses and all the patients were
killed; a few of the sick and wound-
ed, who had attempted to crawl from
the ruins, being shot.

NEW YORK, July 18.
King Constantine, from his head-
quarters near Seres, sends the Asso-
ciated Press a detailed account of
atrocities by the Bulgarians in Mac-
edonia. He declares that only the
flight of the inhabitants of villages
and towns prevented still greater
slaughter. He says: "In reply to
your dispatch of the 16th inst., I
have the honor to communicate the
following information: Bulgarian
atrocities were committed at the out-
set of hostilities against Greek and
Muslim inhabitants of Macedonia.
The first city to be scourged was
Nigrita. A large number of people
who had remained in their homes,
were massacred by the retreating
enemy, who did not fail to light the
path of their flight by flames."

LONDON, July 18.
The Daily Express states that Sir
Rufus Isaacs's appointment as Lord
Chief Justice is officially announced
and will take effect before the
Michaelmas sittings in October next.
Lord Alverstone, owing to illness,
was compelled to obtain a long leave
of absence, which will expire at the
end of the present sittings of the law
courts, and it is certain he will then
place his resignation in the hands of
the Lord Chancellor. Recent reports
in some American papers of Mr.
Asquith taking the position never
had the slightest foundation. Sir
Rufus was slated for the post when
Lord Alverstone became ill, and even
when the Marconi campaign was
at its highest, the Premier never
hesitated in his intention of offering
the Chief Justiceship to the Attorney
General, although the expediency of
announcing his determination at such
a time was debated.

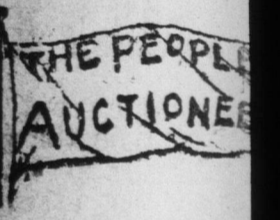
