



WAR SUMMARY.

LONDON, To-day. From Plava on the Isonzo to the Adriatic Sea the Italians and Austrians are fighting bitterly and the troops of General Cadorna are making steady progress, especially on the southern end of the 21 mile front. North and south of Jamiano, eight miles south of Gorizia, the Italians have driven the Austrians back and taken additional important positions. The gains here are a menace to the defence of Trieste. The fighting here is made harder because of the barren and hilly country. Despite the difficulties of the terrain and the stubbornness of the enemy resistance. however, Cadorna has taken two strongly defended hills north of Jamiano and reached the outskirts of Vexsio. The Austrians have attempted to check their advance in the northern Carso by a violent counter attack south and east of Gorizia in the Vodico sector. At all points of the attack the Austrians were driven back with heavy losses. East of Hill 652, on the Vodico, the Italians captured a position from which the Austrians emerged to attack. The number of prisoners captured by General Cadorna's command since Wednesday eluding more than 300 officers. Local infantry attacks by the British and Germans and intensive artillery and aerial activity on the Arras front may indicate a renewal shortly of the in-tensive fighting there. 





FAMINE AND PESTILENCE IN TURKEY.

NEW YORK, May 25. A News Agency despatch from Paris, published here to-day, says Tur key is swept with famine and pestilence, the people are panic-stricken, and her army's morale is utterly gone. According to information received today via Berne, 100,000 desertions from the army are reported. Realizing the loss of all Turkey's fighting power, 8,000 Austrian troops recently have been sent to Palestine to attempt the bolstering up of the army in front of the British expeditionary forces. Four thousand German troops are said to be guarding the Government buildings, factories and bridges in Constantinople. While hundreds in the city are dying each day typhus is sweeping over the whole country, reports declare, and deserters from the Turkish army, 100,000 strong, are said to have fled into the Anatolian mountains and be living through brigandary.






