

Mr. Brookes acted as chairman in a very capable manner and in his opening remarks showed a keen Jesire in the making of our "staple industry" a more valuable asset. The question of our methods of curing fish has been an ever growing problem and it had become much more serious during the last few months, as was indicated from the several complaints which have reached us from the other side. In 1911 the United States Agricultural In 1911 the United States Agricultural Department got out a pamphlet dealing with this reddening of fish in a scientific and practical manner. Mr. Brookes pleaded for a centralization of a curing station in order that there might not be a repetition of last see. a curing station in order that there might not be a repetition of last season. He realized and admitted that the formation of such an organization would not be a remedy but it would be of great assistance. 


