



The American First Army, under mmand of General Pershing, is in notion against the Germans on twenty mile front on the famous St. Mihiel salient in Lorraine, which has stood as a sharp wedge in the French line southeast of Verdun since the ommencement of the war: In the preliminary thrust ground was gained on both sides of the triangle and also at its apex at St. Mihiel, and at last accounts the Americans, with which some French troops are brigaded, were fast sweeping across the salient in an effort to close the mouth of the big pocket before the Germans can extricate themselves from the perilous position they are in, as a result of the suddenness of the blow and the element of surprise it carried with it. Tiaucourt, Bouil-Ionville. Pannes and several other towns in the south were captured in the initial dash, while on the west to the northern edge of the pocket the village of Combres was captured, and its environs, Dommartin and Le Montagne, were reached. To the south everywhere the Americans penetrated into the heights of the Meuse, and the French fought their way into the outskirts of St. Mibiel. Unofficial reports are that the town has been captured by the French. The fighting front at the commencement of the battle aggregated twenty miles, eight miles on the western side and twelve miles on the southern side. The fighting was preceded by an extremely heavy artillery bombardment, and the troops and tanks advanced under barrage, which was carried out with mathematical precision. From the war maps it would seem almost impossible for the Germans to evacuate the salient, as they apparently are trying to do, although they are offering resistance with machine guns and artillery, with huge losses in men and meterial. The first reports show that the Americans took seven hundred prisoners in the first stages of the battle, and had suffered remarkably small casualties. The strategy of Marshal Foch in the present manoeuvre cannot be foreseen, except that it has as the first objective the leveling of the St, Mihiel sector and the straightening of the Allied line from the region of Verdun eastward. The obliteration of the salient would be necessary before a direct thrust toward German territory from in gion would be possible. Whether Marshal Foch has in view a campaign up the Meuse Valley, or Metz and the Moselle Valley in mind, it remains to be seen. In the north, Field Marshal Haig is still hard after the Germans in the region of Cambrai, Here he again has advanced his front toward the much desired German base, penetrated into the old British defense line, cressed the Canal Du Nord north of Havrincourt, taken Havrincourt and another section of the Hindenburg line, and sent a thousand Germans into the British prisoner cages in the rear. The Germans fought hard at Havrincourt to stay the British, but all their counter attacks were beaten off. Further advances for the British also are reported in the region south of LaBassee Canal and northwest of Armentieres.

AMERICAN OFFENSIVE.

The first American offensive which began at daybreak to-day between the Meuse and Moselle Rivers was comdueted under General Pershing's personal supervision and was executed under orders of American officers and American soldiers. LONDON, Sept. 12, At St. Mihiel, where the French have reached the western outskirts, the Germans are making a strong resistance. The Germans still hold the Roman Fort which is now being attacked by the French. Northwest of Pont a Mousson American cavalry patrols are reported to be operating on the road to the Bois Communaux.

FURTHER BRITISH PROGRESS.

LONDON, Sept. 12. The British have made further progress towards Cambrai, having captured the towns of Havrincourt, Trescault and Moeuvres, penetrated onto the old British defense line at several places and crossed the Canal Du Nord north of Havrincourt, according to Field Marshal Haig's communication issued to-night. Approximately a thousand Germans were made prisoners in the operations. The text of the statement follows: Our operations in the Havrincourt sector were continued with great success this morning in spite of unfavorable weather. English troops attacked and captured Trescault and the old British trench lines to the east and north of it. On the right New Zealand troops made progress east of Gouzeaucourt Wood, overcoming the obstinate resistance of a German Jaegaer division. At Havrincourt the 62nd Yorkshire division, which carried the vilage on November 20th, 1917, attacked for a second time over the same ground and with like success. Other English troops attacked across the Canal Du Nord, north of Havrincourt. After sharp fighting our troops captured the village, together with the section of the Hindenburg line between the village and the Canal. North of the Bapaume-Cambrai road. Lancashire troops completed the capture of Moeuvres also, after sharp fighting. About one thousand prisoners have been taken by us in these operations.

STILL ADVANCING.

LONDON, Sept. 12. British troops have captured the towns of Vermand, Attilly and Vendelles, all on a front northwest of St. Quentin, Field Marshal 'Haig announced in his official statement today. In their advance toward St. Quentin the British have progressed as far as the western outskirts of Holmon Wood, southeast of Attilly. The Germans offered stiff opposition in the Havrincourt and Moeuvres sectors which the British overcame,

NEARING CAMBRAL

LONDON, Sept. 12. British forces have effected a crossing of the Canal Du Nord to the northwest of the town of Havrincourt, Field Marshal Haig announced in his official report to-day. The Canal line here forms the main defence of Cambrai n the southwest. A short distance to the north the British have pushed to the western bank of the Canal, east and north of Moeuvres and established themselves there,

WILL BE REJECTED.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 12. Emperor William said at Essen. that it took two to make peace, that one could not do it unless he could overcome the other. Germany, he declared, was confronted with her enemies who willed to destroy her, and she must place against this her determination to preserve her existence. After mentioning his offers of peace, the Emperor said the German leaders had made it plain to everyone who wished to understand, that we are at all times ready to offer the hand of peace.

AMERICAN ATTACK.

AMERICAN FORCES ON THE LORRAINE FRONT, Sept. 12.-American forces this morning launched an attack on German positions. At nine o'clock they had progressed generally along the line. Some prisoners were taken at different parts of the sector. The first wave of Americans met with little resistance,

SIR GEORGE REID DEAD.

LONDON, Sept. 12. Sir George Reid, former High Commissioner for Australia and Member of Parliament for St. George's, died in London to-day after a prolonged illness. Sir George Houston Reid was born in Scotland but lived for many years in Australia. He held the post of Premier of Australia and Prime Minister of New South Wales.


