## Modern Armies.

The armies of the present day far outnumber anything Take corded in the world's the wars of the Middle Ages, for example. At Towton there were nearly 120,000 men on both sides in the White and Red Rose struggle, and the figure was hardly ever reached again. We used to invade France with a force infinitely smaller than the Mons Invincibles. At Agincourt there were only 60,000 French. In the Stuart Civil War, the average army at highwater mark numbered about 20,000. n the American War of Independence was always less-about 10,000 was a really strong force. Napoleon originated the huge modern army, and since then everyone has followed his example. Yet in the Peninsular War Wellington seldom had more than 40,000 to 50,000 British troops, though local auxiliaries helped him. At Waterloo each army numbered about 70,000 to 80,000 men only. The Americans in the Civil War undoubtedly put big forces in the field, though at Gettysburg there were only about 75,-000 with Lee, and some 65,000 with Meade. In the Franco-German war of 1870 the troops engaged were not, as we reckon them, very numerous, while the losses were, as we hold them, trivial. Her casualties in the present battle to date are probably twice the entire losses suffered by Germany in killed and wounded in the whole war of 1870-1. This will give some idea of what modern warfare means.

### "Westminster" Bridge.

One of Our Greatest Organists Who is Retiring.

With the retirement of Sir Frederick Bridge from his post of organist of Westminster Abbey, one of the most gifted and engaging of London's personalities will disappear largely from public view.

For more than forty years Sir Frederick has been a notable figure in London's musical and social life, respected for his great and versatile gifts, and beloved for his amiable and genial qualities. For he is not only a great organist and composer, he is also a brilliant Lecturer and Professor and writer, a man of wide culture. a clever raconteur, and a "fellow of infinite jest."

He is, too, the "Peter Pan" of the world of music. Time seems powerless to touch the essential youth in him; and to-day he is as full of high spirits, almost impishness, as when be was the ringleader of mischief his fellow choir-boys nearly seventy

yea 3 ago. Born at Oldbury, near Birmingham, in 1844, Sir Ferderick was singing in Rochester Cathedral at the age of six; and at twenty-one was its assistant organist. A degree at Oxford was followed by more organ-playing at Windsor and Manchester Cathedral; and he had barely entered the thirties when he found himself at Westminster, where he has been ever since. to the delight of London's music-lov-

Since that day honors have showered on Sir Frederick-the pick of the Professional Chairs, University degrees, Knighthood and other Orders. For more than forty years he has poured out one brilliant composition after another; he has varied his music by antiquarian studies and the writing of clever books; and as conductor and organist he has given delight to millions.

And amid all these strenuous activities he has found time for much social enjoyment. Few men, indeed, are more in request by Society hostesses; for his geniality, wit and charm make him one of the most desirable guests in London. With his inexhaustible fund of anecdotes, his brilliant conversation and his infectious gaiety, he is indeed a "host" in himself.

No man knows more than Sir Frederick of London's history and of her great men during the last forty years. In fact, ever since he came to Londo there has scarcely been a man of note in England whom he has not known personally; and he has played a prominent part at the obsequies of many of them, including Darwin, Browning, Gladstone and Tennyson. And now this wonderful man is to have a well-earned rest. May he enjoy it well and long! But London will not be the same without her "Westminster" Bridge.-Pearson's Weekly.

### Some Quaint Customs in Officialdom.

Many of the new Ministers will have the right to curious perquisites.

Lord Birkenhead, for example, the Lord Chancellor, is also Keeper of the Great Seal that is attached to all important State documents. The seal, a silver one from which the actual wax ones on the documents are made, is carried by an official called the Purse Bearer before the Lord Chancellor as he enters and leaves the House of Lords or Court of Chancery.

The seal is enclosed in a magnificent sachet made of cloth of gold, embroidered with art needlework, and Lord Birkenhead will be entitled to this sachet, a new one being made for every change of Government.

When Lord Thurlow was Chancellor, he remained in office during so many Ministries that his wife made a number of gorgeous counterpanes and bed hangings from her husband's perquisites.

The Lord Chancellor, too, in office is entitled to the actual Great Seal of silver when the reigning King or Queen dies, or a new seal is made. These silver seals cost over £400 to make, as a rule.

When Mr. Lowther retires from the Speakership, which he is shortly going to do, his successor will be entitled to 2,000 ounces of silver plate for his sideboard, as well as a number of other curious perquisites.

A somewhat valuable "perq." at the present time is two hogsheads of claret, and another is the present of a number of yards of the best broadcloth, sent to the Speaker every Christmas by the Clothworkers' Com-

The Clothworkers' Company also give the Attorney-General and the solicitor-General a similar present of the finest cloth, so that neither need worry about the cost of clothing at



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
