

With thousands of persons, to think f St. Mark's Square by day is chiefly to think of pigeons. Many a visitor to Venice who cannot remember the details of a single painting there can show you a photograph of herself with pigeons on her shoulders and arms. Photographers and dealers in maize are here all day to effect these pretty conjunctions; but the kodak has seriously impaired their profits. The birds are smaller than our London monsters and not quite so brilliantly burnished How many there are, I have no idea; but since they are sacred, their numbers must be ever-increasing. Why they are sacred is something of a mystery. One story states that the great Enrico Dandolo had carrier-pigeons with him in the East which conveyed the grand tidings of victories to Venice; another says that the same heroic old man was put in possession of valuable strategic information by means of a carrier-pigeon, and on returning to Venice proclaimed it a bird to be reverenced. At night no doubt the pigeons roost

among St. Mark's statuary and on convenient ledges in the neighborhood: by day, when not on the pavement of the Piazza, the bulk of the flock are dotted about among the relics of the Atrio, facing St. Mark's.

They have no timidity, but by a kind of honorable understanding they all affect to be startled by the bells at certain hours, and by the midday gun, and ascend in a grey cloud for a few seconds.

They are never so engaging as when flying double, bird and shadow against the Campanile.

Their collective cooing fills the air and makes the Piazza's day music. Venetians crossing the Piazza walk straight on, through the birds, like Moses crossing the Red Sea; the foreigners pick their way.-From "Variety Lane," by E. V. Lucas.



It is not yet possible to caculate how many hundreds are dead, the list up to this evening showing close to four hundred already reported. There are many bodies under ruins LTD.—sep2,tf and there are wounded also under ruins who have not yet been reached by rescuers. There are believed to be many thousands of injured. Hospitals at Spezia have already received about five hundred and three hundred have been taken to other hospitals nearby. Improvised hospitals composed of tents are caring for many others. Inured and homeless are thankful as long as weather keeps fair, but at night it is very cold, especially on mountain slopes. All classes are combining in their efforts to render aid. Monarchists as well as republicans, socialists and clericals and even anarchists are flocking to the scene of the earthquake from the bigger cities of Spezia, Florence, Luca and Modena. Survivors describe spectacle as terrifying; the air was filled with choking blinding dust, so black that the sun was lost to view. It seem-ed like the end of the world, terrified peasants say. Great towers of medie al costles were shaken, partially de-stroyed or seem tottering to fall. 

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IN GALLON TINS. AT YOUR GROCERS.

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An Act to Provide for the Better Obtaining of Information Respecting the Codfishery.

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

1. The Master or owner of every ship, vessel, schooner, craft or boat which shall arrive at any port in Newfoundland from fishing in any of the places following, that is to say, on the Banks, on the Coast of Labrador, in the Straits of Belle Isle, or elsewhere out of Newfoundland, and on the coast of Newfoundland in the District of St. Barbe, shall within 48 hours after arrival at his destination report by telegraph at the expense of the Department from the nearest telegraph station to the Department of Marine and Fisheries at St. John's and the nearest Customs Officer, stating the quantity in quintals of fish on board such vessel.

2. As a part of said report the said Master or owner shall state whether the number of quintals reported is reckoned as of dry fish, Labrador fish, salt bulk or green fish, or otherwise as the case may be; and shall state whether it is the intention of such master or owner to cure such fish (if the same be not cured) as soft Labrador, dry Labrador, or dry Shore.

3. If any such Master or owner shall fail to report as afore said or shall wilfully report incorrectly, he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00, to be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate; or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding

4. In publishing information or statistics of the fisheries, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall not be bound to make public the name or catch of any specific ship, vessel, craft or

5. Every licensed exporter of codfish shall report to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries on the last day of every month, or within ours thereafter, stating the quantity and quality of all fish then held in store by such exporter. The said report shall be verified by affidavit, and the said Minister shall not publish or allow any person whatsoever (except in pursuance of lish or gliow any person whatsoever (except in particular legal process) to have access to any such report; but the sum total of the quantities and qualities so reported shall be intimated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to the President of the Newfoundland Board of Trade for the information and use of the Trade generally.

6. If any such exporter shall fail to report as hereinbefore provided, or shall knowingly make any false or incorrect report, he shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$1,000.00, which may be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate, or, indefault of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months.

7. If any person publishes, writes or disseminates any false information or statistics respecting the quantity of codfish caught or held in store, or otherwise in Newfoundland or exported, he shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars or imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month for each offence.

8. All penalties recovered under this Chapter shall be paid to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony. Any person aggrieved by any conviction under this Act may appeal to the next Session of the Supreme Court in St. John's or on Circuit upon giving notice within fourteen days of his intention so to appeal.

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

Dear Mr. Watson,—In closing my loyed their stay immensely, left for work here at Forteau, I wish to make a brief report to the Grenfell Association. My assistant, Miss Jackson, an at W. N. Parmiter's, accompanied experienced social worker and I, arrived at Forteau, October 18th, 1919. We closed the hospital to patients yesterday, June 30th, 1920. During the eight months and thirteen days that have been here I have treated 616 out-patients and 11 in-patients, making 1189 visits for out-patients and 159 days of hospital care for in-patients totaling 1348 visits on days of hospital treatment. From out-patients I have collected \$211.72, and from in-patients \$36.50, making a total of \$248.22 col-

Besides the usual medical service, my assistant and I have conducted a health and hygiene campaign in accordance with the program of the Social Morality Committee and Bureau of Social Education of the Young Women's Christain Association under which we are working. We have conducted recreation work for young peo-ple, developed play ground activities for children and installed play ground appartus at Forteau as the gift of the Young Women's Christian Association. In view of the shocking high mortality at child-birth and the resulting at-titude of both men and women toward a normal function, we have tried to

A Clear Warning.

The Allies will read with pleasure and some amusement the clever piece of sophistry which M. Tchitcherin has forwarded to Britain. Italy and Britain joinly protested against the inclusion in the peace terms of a clause which provided for the arming of the proletariat. Their note of objection was strongly worded, and it was intimated that the admission of such a proviso was a gross breach of faith and that it was difficult if not impossible to continue negotiations with a nation that treated its pledged word so lightly.

M. Tchitcherin reads the handwriting on the wall, and must have watched with some chagrin the healing of the difference that two weeks ago threatened to estrange England and France. He climbs down from his high horse, but he makes his descent with the knowledge that his every word and move is being watched. As he reaches the ground he makes an appeal to the Labor gallery saying that "in Soviet Russia the whole nation works for the whole nation's benefit, while elsewhere the immense majority toil for the privilleged few."

Tchitcherin, faced with the alternative of breaking off negotiations with Britain for the resumption of trade or of modifying his plans for the extension of the Soviet system in Europe, chooses the latter course. Yet he makes it perfectly plain that he is only withdrawing the clause for exhe makes it perfectly plain that he is colleagues is to spread Bolshevism in Great Britain, and in order that there be no mistake as to their object he sets it down in black and white: sets it down in black and white:

"If the British Government thinks the workers by nature are animated with the doctrine of Bolshevism, such a point of view will undoubtedly be welcomed by those who look forward welcomed by those who look forward to spreading Bolshevism in England." This is a clear warning that the whole world outside Russia cannot afford to ignore.-Montreal Daily Star.

ent. "I never abdicated."

He denied having been He denied having been in any way in the attempted assassination of the Greek Premier in this city on August 12, and hinted that should he regain his throne he would be willing to work in harmony with Venizelos.
