



Measuring Rain

A rain gauge consists of a small metal cylinder, the lid of which is in the form of a funnel with a specified diameter. Inside the cylinder is a glass vessel for collecting the rain. The rim of the funnel is usually made of brass, while the rest of the contrivance is of copper or japanned metal, which serves as a protection against

Various types of rain gauges are in use at the present time. Some have a diameter of eight inches and contain a metal bucket, from which the rain is actually measured; others are foundland. Vorhies, head of the department of biology at the University of Arizona, said in a recent lecture here.

The coral, the annulated snake and the rattlesnake are the only types of poisonous snakes in this region, Dr. Vorhies explained. The annulated snake is rarely found, he added, so that people are in little danger of being bitten by any variety except the


