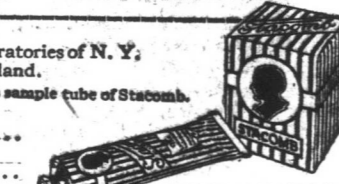

### Beggars Who Live in Luxury

WILES OF "DOWN AND OUT" LETTER-WRITERS.

Almost yearly the London Mendicity Society exposes the means of livelihood adopted by a cunning class of swindler, and yet the trusting and credulous and generous are the public that these parasites continue to flourish in opulence and luxury.

Mr. Robert Pierpoint of the Society mentioned, has just related how begging letters are on the increase. The London Mendicity Society investigated no fewer than 1,173 cases during the past year, with the result that some sensational discoveries were made.

One of the most incredible was of a jingle harp who solicited aid from the public by means of cleverly-written begging letters, which told how her brother, an omnibus conductor, was too ill to follow his employment. Inquiries showed that the brother, far from being ill, was actually the owner of an omnibus, which he ran at a good profit to himself. The woman herself had an income of at least ten pounds a week; and, as the result of batoning the public, had recently been enabled to purchase a nine-roomed house for \$2,000.

### Turks Expelling Christians

BEIRUT, July 18 (A.P.)—Parties of Christians are still expelled from Turkey. Since February 15th, 2,568 Christians have arrived in Syria from the district of Urfa, all of whom were destitute. These expulsions have been gradually growing since 1919, and to-day the total number is estimated to be about 110,000.

### Poison in Summer Foods

Every summer thousands of people suffer from "food poisoning," and in the opinion of many medical men this is due to harmful so-called chemical preservatives which are used freely in many forms of food.

Made-up foods do not keep sweet for long in hot weather, but if they are tampered with by the addition of chemicals, putrefaction can be put off for a considerable time. Boric acid is a favourite preservative, and borax is also used. These substances are both dangerous, and their use should not be permitted.

Salicylic acid and sodium salicylate are often to be found in sausages. In hot weather it is wise to avoid this kind of food; also brawn, which is another food which does not keep well.

Sauces are often adulterated to make them keep in hot weather. Benzoic acid and the benzoates are chemicals used for this purpose.

In the past various kinds of deleterious and poisonous chemicals were used as colouring matters, but this is not done so much nowadays. Sulphate of iron and green vitriol were used until recently, as well as several dangerous arsenical salts.

Copper salts are probably the most dangerous chemicals used at the present day. These are employed to give vegetables a bright green colour before they are sold or served.

Some even more remarkable cases have been investigated by the Society in the course of its many years of existence. It investigates cases for the King and for the Prince of Wales, the Prince, especially, countless begging letters are directed in the course of the year. Many of these are from genuine "down and outs."

One never finds the real begging-letter writer—the one who makes a speciality and a profession of inditing moving appeals to people's generosity—among those who write to Royalty. They know that in this way lies exposure.

Once however, one of the professional "screevers," as these parasites are called, made the mistake of applying to a member of the Royal Family with a story that read like a genuine one. She claimed to be the nurse of a member of the Royal Family and had fallen on bad times. All the facts were correct in the letter—only the nurse in question had died some years before and the fraud was discovered.

This woman was found to be unable to read or write herself. She employed a young girl, whom she was apparently training in the same despicable trade as herself, to pen the appeals for her. She received a stiff sentence of imprisonment at the Old Bailey a year ago.

Many of these impostors have been found to be illiterate people. That being so, there was a mystery as to how they could pen the letters which so often elicited monetary response.

Then it was found that there was a man living and working in the same grimy office in the City who was the real author of the letters. He, however, could not be prosecuted, since his defence was that he was only doing work at the request of others.

It was this man who, in disguised calligraphy, composed and wrote letters for others who were themselves unable to write. He charged a commission "on results."

### Caterpillars Endanger Trains

EDMONTON, Alta., July 18.—(A.P.)—Two steam pipes have been attached to every locomotive on the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway to clear the tracks of caterpillars, which had become so thick that the rails were made slippery and trains could often make no headway. The steam pipes, carried down to the front of the wheels, exert a pressure that blows the insects from the rails. At certain places incessant swarms of caterpillars continue to cross the tracks.

## Strenuous Efforts Made to Overcome Conference Deadlock

### MacLaren off Again After Delay Caused by Illness--Federal Election in Canada Expected.

#### TRYING TO FIND A WAY OUT.

LONDON, July 23. Efforts to break the apparently serious deadlock which has arisen in the Inter-Allied Conference over the financial guarantees to-day occupied the entire time of the delegates. While the attitude of the French indicates they are unwilling to agree to any plan which will alienate their liberty of action under the Versailles Treaty in the imposition of sanctions, optimistic observers here feel assured a way will be found to surmount this obstacle.

#### MACLAREN OFF AGAIN.

TOKIO, July 23. A. Stuart MacLaren, British aviator and his companions, who are on a world flight, hopped off from Tokotan Bay, Uruppu Island, Karakura, at 7.40 this morning for Mura-kami Bay, on Paramushiro, the most northerly of the Kuriles.

#### CAUSE OF DELAY.

TOKIO, July 23. Despatches telling of the British fliers take off to-day, brought the first news of the unexpected reason for their delay in starting from Uruppu—the illness of flying officer W. N. Flenderleith. Previously the delay had been attributed to alternate high winds and heavy fogs both common occurrences in the Kuriles, but today it developed these had only been contributory causes.

#### FIGHTING CONTINUES.

BUENOS AIRES, July 23. A despatch to La Nacion from Santos, Brazil, this morning, states fighting continues around Sao Paulo. An official communication from the Rio Government states the Federals are continuing to progress, occupying new advantageous positions. The activities of our aviators have been very useful. Necessary measures to counteract probable intentions of Rebels have been adopted.

#### CLOSING IN ON REBELS.

SANTOS, Brazil, July 23. Reliable information received to-day from Sao Paulo is to the effect the Government forces have recaptured several outlying sections of the city from the Rebels and are bringing up heavy artillery and placing it at strategic points commanding rebel strongholds. Monday night there was a brisk artillery duel between the Federals and the Rebels, which lasted for hours. The Rebels failed to dislodge the Government forces who are now surrounding the city on three sides, leaving the Rebels only the west for retreat. It is claimed that the effective marksmanship of the Government's gunners, who are landing shells on the barracks of the Rebels, is beginning to break the morale of the Rebels.

#### KILLED FATHER.

HUDSON, Wis., July 23. Because his father was always swearing around the house, 21 year old Willard Krueger, killed him with an iron bar, and buried the body in an abandoned hog pen, says a formal confession which the authorities said he made yesterday.

#### CRUISER BRISBANE ASHORE.

MELBOURNE, Australia, July 23. The cruiser Brisbane was run aground on a reef near Port Moresby, New Guinea. It is not expected there will be any difficulty in floating her at high tide.

#### THREE CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., July 23. Fire which reduced the tent home of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Sheldon, South Bend, Ind., to ashes in two minutes, wiped out the lives of three children on the shore of Lake Cava yesterday. It is believed the fire started by the tent coming in contact with a burning oil stove in the absence of the parents.

#### PASSENGER STEAMER GOES ASHORE.

ROCKLAND, Maine, July 23. The passenger steamer James T. Morse, of the Eastern Steamship Lines, Inc., which left here to-day for Bar Harbor, struck on Cote Island, near the entrance to Stonington Harbor, shortly after eight o'clock, in fog. Some of the passengers were landed in boats but none were in danger.

#### COURT CROWDED TO HEAR MURDER TRIAL.

CHICAGO, July 23. The court room of Chief Justice Cawley was the centre of interest to-day but long before the youthful

prisoners, Loeb and Leopold, came into the court, the big building which houses the community's trial courts was the Mecca for hundreds. There were newspaper men of every degree in plenty in the room, telegraph operators, camera operators, male and female, hurried to their reserved places. A wagon containing exhibits which the State will offer was wheeled into court. In it were a number of boards, the bloodstained flooring of the automobile in which Young Franks was killed and what remained of the boy's clothing, a bell and a few other bits of equally gruesome evidence were in a metal container. The prisoners when asked if they realize the seriousness of their pleading guilty, replied in clear firm voices, "I do your honor." The prosecution detailed the methods by which the prisoners tried to destroy all traces of their crime.

#### FOOD PRICES WILL SOAR.

SYDNEY, July 23. As a result of short crops in Western Canada, food prices will soar to higher levels than at any time since the war, according to J. B. Craig, past President of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange in an interview here to-day.

#### WINNIPEG WELCOMES GOVERNOR GENERAL.

WINNIPEG, July 23. An official welcome was tendered his Excellency Lord Byng of Vimy, Governor General of Canada, and her arrived here last evening enroute to Vancouver.

#### FEDERAL ELECTION EXPECTED IN CANADA.

VANCOUVER, July 23. Opposition opinion in Ottawa, is that there will be a General Federal Election in winter, probably in November, according to Senator Crowe, who has returned from Ottawa. Premier King's recent attack on the Senate is regarded by Conservatives as indicating the Government is preparing material for use in the impending election. The Senator holds the opinion the Government cannot legislate the Senate out of existence. The only body under the British North America act able to do that is the Senate itself.

#### NATIONALIST DEMONSTRATION IN BAVARIA.

BAYMOUTH, Bavaria, July 23. The opening performance of the Wagnerian Festival developed into a Nationalistic demonstration yesterday. During the finale of "Die Meistersinger," Hans Sach's words exhorting the citizens of Haremberg "if the holy German Empire should crumble to the dust, our sacred German art would still remain" aroused an outbreak of patriotism on the part of the entire audience which arose vociferously joining in three stanzas of Deutschland Uber Alles. While nobody is suspected to have inspired the unusual climax to the initial performance, it was observed the old monarchical colors were hoisted over the Festival Hall.

#### HERTZOG RELEASES REBEL.

CAPE TOWN, S.A., July 23. A storm of protest has swept through the Union of South Africa because of the release by the Hertzog Government of Manie Maritz, the former Boer general, who was convicted of high treason for having taken an active part in the rebellion of 1914 and was sentenced to prison for three years. Maritz had only served 12 weeks of his three years' term when he was set free. It is expected that the matter of the release of Maritz will be threshed out at the first meeting of the new parliament on Friday. The Cape Times comments on the Government action in releasing Maritz as follows: "It is not misguided partisanship which sees in this release of Maritz a grave slur on the judicial system of South Africa. Ugly comments are being made on the Premier's conception of fair opinion, and the revelation of his tendency to yield to pressure from irreconcilables. Thousands of South Africans, who are watching for signs of Premier Hertzog's fitness for the premiership see in the release of Maritz a portent which make them shudder with apprehension."

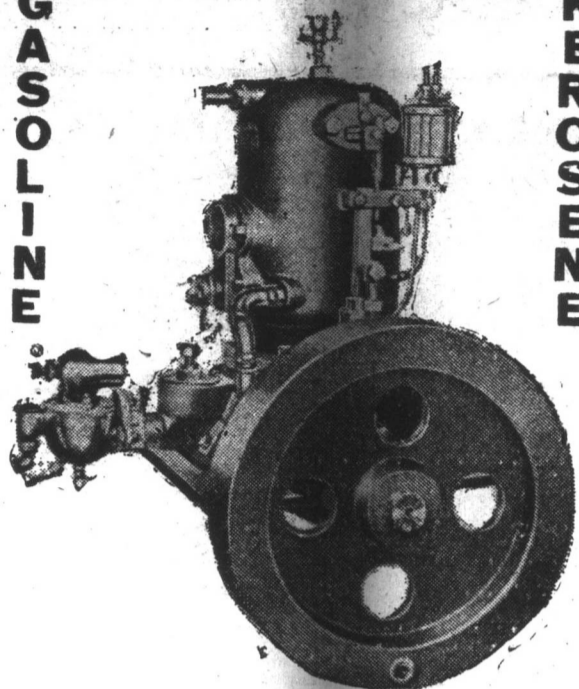

Our Paper Pounds
There is no chance of adopting the suggestion of Professor Gustav Cassel that the British Government and the banks should begin to issue sovereigns and half-sovereigns again and withdraw paper money. Professor Cassel's reasons are not on hygienic grounds, although over 140,000 bacteria have been discovered on a single Treasury note. His appeal to Britain to reintroduce gold coinage is based on nothing like that. He wants us to set an example to other nations, and emphasize the value of the gold standard. A Treasury authority informed the writer that there is not the slightest prospect of any immediate return to gold currency. "There is a new price level since the war. Far more money is in circulation," he said. "The sovereigns, half-sovereigns, and the bullion of the Bank of England and the banks could not meet the requirements in a reintroduced gold currency, taking into account the reserves which must be held at the Bank of England. "One cannot expect a return to gold currency at the earliest before 1929."

**The Labrador Klondike.**

Apparently the Labrador is not as barren of gold as we were led to believe by the men who with pick and shovel toiled vainly for months to make it disclose its precious secret. The open sesame to its treasure houses, however, must be sought, not in its rocky surface or in its icy rivers, but in the musty archives of busy cities, or in the law office where ponderous documents are formulated by the legal alchemists.

Unlike the placer miner, who toils strenuously, buoyed up with the hope of striking "pay dirt" even when the odds are all against him, the research worker and the lawyer are under no delusion as to the reward of their labours. Had the miner been successful in his search, he would have filled his pockets at the expense of no one else, but in the case of the others, the gold acquired leaves a yellow trail which leads directly from the already depleted pocket of the taxpayer of this community.

During Tuesday's session of the House, the Minister of Finance and Customs gave the results obtained in the last three years by the prospectors in that inexhaustible gold field known as the Labrador Boundary Dispute. The history of these operations began at a much earlier date, but the gold mined recently shows that a rich "pocket" has been struck. We are under the impression, however, that with a change in the facilities for working it, the output will be considerably reduced. We hope so.

In the statement made on the floor of the Assembly, the Hon. P. T. McGrath is shown to have received since 1921 \$19,855.29, W. R. Warren, \$16,501.70, The Right Hon. Lord Morris, \$5,000, Sir Richard Squires, \$5,000, and the legal firm of Burn and Berridge, \$26,281.25. With the smaller sums paid to less important officials engaged on this long drawn out case, the total expenditure is placed at \$76,875.58.

Some day the Privy Council will decide the ownership of that costly strip of the Labrador. Would it not be possible, we wonder, to arouse a little sympathy in our behalf in that august judicial body by laying before them a statement showing the price in full that we have paid in the defence of our claim? Or would they treat the appeal with a smile of compassion, and consider our sacrifice as just another proof of the extravagance and incompetency so ruthlessly exposed by Commissioner Walker?

Canada, it was at one time suggested, was willing to purchase our rights for an amount equal to our debt. Obviously such an offer, if it ever was seriously put forward, was made prior to events which have come to light in recent years.

**Fatal Express Derailment**  
FEW FURTHER PARTICULARS RECEIVED.

But few further particulars of the derailment of the East bound Express near Cape Ray yesterday which resulted in the death of fireman R. Penny and mail clerk Wm. Perchard, than appeared in our issue yesterday have as yet been received. The express made up of two sleepers, one day coach, one dining car, two second class passenger cars and two baggage and mail cars left Port aux Basques at 8.45 yesterday morning with 60 first and 30 second class passengers. When about one mile west of Cape Ray the engine tender and baggage car left the rails and tumbled over the embankment. The two second class cars also left the rails but remained upright. Fireman Penny and Mail Clerk Perchard who was riding on the engine were killed outright. Engineer Lawlor was somewhat badly scalded by escaping steam. Brakesman Osmond was also caught in the wreckage but his injuries are not serious.

The Post Office explains that there are two Mail Clerks on each cross country express, and it is customary for one to get out and get a can of good spring water during the short stop of the train at a watering place, a mile west of Cape Ray Station, and as the mail car step is very high, they sometimes step on the engine, and travel with it to Cape Ray Station, about a mile and a half further on, when they have time to get back into the mail car again. They are under the impression that was how the late Mail Clerk Perchard came to be on the engine, as the accident happened between the watering place and Cape Ray Station.

The derailment made it impossible for the Westbound express, which left here on Tuesday, to continue on to Port aux Basques, and the railway management ordered the S. S. Kyle to St. George's all the passengers for North Sydney were transferred to the ship at midnight. Afterwards the train continued on to the scene of the wreck, to pick up the passengers from the derailed train and bring them on to St. John's.

**OFFICIAL STATEMENT**  
Last night General Manager Russell issued the following statement regarding the accident:  
No. 2 express which left Port aux Basques at 9 a.m. in charge of Conductor Nebucet got engine, two baggage and two second class cars derailed about one mile west of Cape Ray. Engine and tender on side, other cars remained upright. Fireman R. Penny and Mail Clerk Perchard got caught on engine and were killed. Mail Clerk Perchard, it appears, was riding on engine at the time. Engineer Lawlor and Brakesman Osmond received slight injuries, but no other trainmen or passengers were injured. Dr. Barlow of Channel was quickly on the scene and did everything possible.

Tuesday's Westbound express was held at St. George's and passengers transferred to S. S. Kyle at that place about midnight, the train then continues on to take passengers from derailed train and come through to St. John's, arriving Friday afternoon.

**BOTH VICTIMS MARRIED.**  
Mail Clerk William Perchard only son of Mr. R. Perchard, Turnkey at the West End Fire Station leaves a wife and two children, Robert aged 7, and Guy aged 5 years. The deceased was in his 31st year and has been for the past 12 years employed as Mail Clerk on the Coastal Boats and Cross-Country trains.

Fireman Penny belongs to Bay of Islands and is married. To Rev. Fr. McGettigan fell the duty of breaking the news to Mrs. Perchard who was almost prostrated at the suddenness of the tragedy. The sympathy of the community, in which the Telegram joins, goes out to the families of both the victims.

**Further News of the Train Disaster**

Roadmaster Keefe and a number of section men, with the necessary wrecking appliances arrived at Cape Ray, the scene of yesterday morning's derailment, last midnight. Since early morning the men have been at work placing the cars on the rails, and otherwise repairing the roadbed, which has been torn up, a distance of 300 feet. The travelling engineer and train master of the Western Division left Humbermouth as soon as they received word of the derailment and are now making a thorough investigation into the cause of the accident. The road bed in the Cape Ray section is fairly level, with a slight curve of about six degrees where the run-off occurred. The embankment here is about three to five feet in height, and is composed of sand. The derailed engine is No. 110, and is embedded in the sand about 10 feet clear of the track, with the baggage car turned over alongside. The remains of the unfortunate victims, Penny, the fireman, and Perchard, the mail man have been prepared for burial and a train left here at 1.30 yesterday to convey the bodies to their destination. Penny was in the locomotive service of the Company for six years and during the last three years he was employed as fireman on the express running between Bishop's Falls and Port aux Basques. His hometown is Humbermouth, and the remains are being forwarded there to-day for burial. The remains of the body of the late Wm. Perchard is now on the incoming express which is due in the city to-morrow afternoon. Brakesman Osmond who was riding in the baggage car at the time of the accident suffered a nasty scalp wound. He was attended by Dr. Barlow and he was later conveyed to Port aux Basques with Engineer Lawlor where they are both receiving every attention. The line is expected to be opened for traffic to-night.

**PEPYS BEHIND THE SCENES.**

July 23rd.—Sad news this day of a train accident near Cape Ray, being 2 men killed by the engine crushing them when it left the track. This the first fatal accident on the railway these few years past, albeit the line is not now in the best condition and needs careful attention in divers places. At the office all the morning, how much worried, by my wife, she wanted me to bring her money for the Garden Party, and by yesterday I did give the wretched bar allowance. In the afternoon, to the Garden Party, my wife having dressed herself in a pretty dress, all white, and looks better than I have ever seen her. So much so, indeed, that for the first time I have eyes for no other woman. A great pity that there were no entrants for the sports, and shows a regrettable lack of enthusiasm among our athletes. News of Tokio tells of S. MacLaren, the British airman, he having continued his flight and was delayed by the illness of his companion. I have the greatest hope that he will beat the Americans, albeit they have now but to cross the Atlantic.

**TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.**

**GIRLS DANCE TO AVERT A PANIC.**  
NEWPORT, R.I., July 23. The steamer Boston was lying beached here to-day showing a gaping wound where the bow of the tanker Swift Arrow smashed into her port side, crushing three passengers to death and fatally injuring another off Point Judith, ten miles South of here, just before midnight Monday. Of seven hundred passengers brought to New York and Fall River a score are suffering from minor injuries. All, however, continued their journeys. Soon after the steamer crashed three girls started dancing, and others joined them, the temporary distraction occupying the attention of many until the lights went out and the more serious work of rescue was undertaken.

**12 KILLED WHEN TRAIN AND TRUCK COLLIDE.**  
TOLEDO, Ohio, July 23. Twelve persons were reported killed in a collision between a New York Central passenger train and a truck load of picketticks on a grade crossing at Oak Harbour, Ohio, 20 miles east of here, early to-night. The truck is said to have been returning with a load of young people from an outing in the woods.

**CAPTAIN FOUND IN DEFAULT.**  
MONTREAL, July 23. In a judgment handed down to-day in the Dominion Wreck Commission's Court, Capt. J. E. Riverin, master of the Canadian Steamship Line's steamer Saguenay, was found in default for the grounding of that vessel on June 29 at the entrance of the Saguenay River. The Court ordered the suspension of his certificate for the balance of the navigation season.

**20 CHILDREN KILLED IN A THEATRE STAMPEDE.**  
VERA CRUZ, Mexico, July 23. Twenty children were trampled to death and 17 persons were injured in the Eulava Theatre to-night when the film of a moving picture house caught fire and threw the spectators into panic.

**FRENCH CONSIDER THE BANKERS INTERLOPERS.**  
LONDON, July 23. With the French maintaining the sanctity of the Versailles Treaty and the International Bankers firm in the demands for definite guarantees to satisfy investors who will be asked to support a German loan, which may be necessary to launch the Exporters' plan, the Inter-Allied Conference has decided to bring a motion before the committee of the late United States delegates. The question of Germany's presence at the conference table was discussed and was practically the only advance made during the second plenary session held in the Foreign Office during this afternoon. The committee appointed a week ago have withheld their reports, because it is impossible to make any real progress until the existing differences between the bankers and the French are outed. Both are unyielding, but the British, Belgian and United States delegates are striving to reach a compromise. The good offices of the United States Secretary of the Treasury, Andrew Mellon, even having been invoked at the Downing Street breakfast this morning when he was the guest of Premier MacDonald. Later Mr. Mellon conferred at Number 10 with Mr. MacDonald, Thomas, Lamont, Sir Montague Norman, and Sir Robert Kindersley. It is stated tonight that Mr. Mellon in an official way had contributed a suggestion which was likely to be of great assistance in finding a way out of the present deadlock. The French delegates take the view that the bankers are interlopers in the London Conference, which should be of a wholly political nature, but the bankers maintain that they are merely interpreting their investing markets so that the needed loan will be readily subscribed when the German Government asks for it.

**4 KILLED BY FALLING SMOKE-STACK.**  
DETROIT, July 23. Four persons were killed, three instantly and one seriously injured late to-day, when a smokestack said to have been weakened by the action of the wind and weather, fell from the roof of the Charlevoix building.

**MOST VALUABLE METAL STRUCK IN ALBERTA.**  
EDMONTON, Alta., July 24. One of the most valuable minerals in the world to-day, Iridium, has been discovered in the upper waters of Peace River by the Canyon Gold Mining Co. A representative of the Edmonton syndicate arrived from the north to-day after having filed claims for ten miles along the river, and he is of the opinion that a real old time stampede will result from the discovery. Precious metal was discovered when the drillers of the Canyon Gold Mining Company drilling for gold discovered quantities of metal on bed rocks.

**CORRESPONDENCE RELATIVE TO APPOINTMENT OF IRISH REPRESENTATIVE.**

WASHINGTON, July 24. Under agreement with the British Embassy, the State Department made public last night the correspondence exchanged between Secretary of State Hughes and the British Ambassador Howard last month providing for the appointment in Washington of a Minister to represent Irish Free State in diplomatic intercourse with United States. In his communication of June 24th containing a request that the Washington Government accept this representation of the Irish Free State, Ambassador Howard told Secretary Hughes that "His Majesty's Government has come to the conclusion that it is desirable that the handling of matters at Washington exclusively relating to the Irish Free State should be confined to the Minister plenipotentiary accredited to the United States Government."

**SUIT FOR \$200,000 FILED.**

NEW YORK, July 24. A suit was filed in the Federal Court yesterday by Francis Caffey as receiver of the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, operators of the Ward Line, against the Atlantic Gulf and West Indies Steamship Lines and others seeking restoration of approximately \$200,000,000 which the receiver of the Atlantic Gulf and West Indies directors obtained unlawfully from the Ward Line. The complaint charged that the Atlantic Gulf and West Indies Lines and their directors controlled votes of the directors of New York and Cuba, and through this control wrecked the latter by taking large sums of money from stock holders, bond holders, and creditors, which they not diverted, would have enabled it to continue as prosperous steamship line.

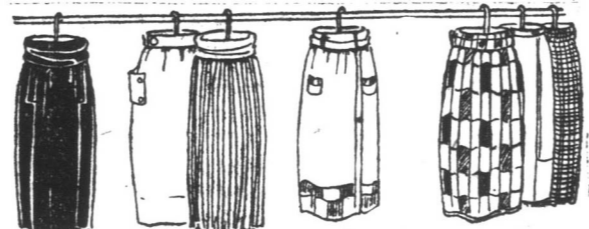

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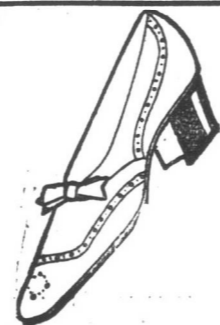

### Words With Histories

When a housewife asks whether the goods she is buying are cotton or woolen, she little thinks that originally they were one and the same, for it was to a woollen fabric made in Bristol that the name "Bristol cotton" was first applied.

Bristol used to be the seaport of the then seat of the woollen trade, the West of England, and "Bristol cotton," a striped cloth with a long nap which could be re-shorn when the garment got shabby, was woven at Bridgewater and Taunton.

When the white vegetable wool began to come from the Southern States of America its common name was derived from this fabric.

The word "blanket" has a peculiar origin. In early times family names often arose from the bearer's occupation, and for generations a family named Blanket had been in the woollen trade and had manufactured white cloth. It is probable that this trade gave them their name from "Blanket" (white), but it was this family which invented the comfortable bed-covering, and their new products were referred to as blankets.

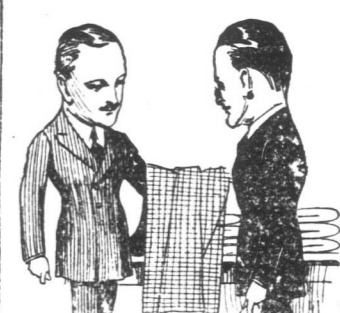

### Channel Tunnel

"UNQUESTIONABLY AN ELEMENT OF DANGER."

That the Committee of Imperial Defence had rejected the proposal for a Channel Tunnel was announced recently. The reasons for this decision were given to the House of Commons by the Prime Minister—Mr. MacDonald stated that the Committee was unanimous in recommending that at present the Channel Tunnel should not be constructed. The Government, therefore, had no alternative but to accept the advice of the Committee. The Committee, which included the last four Prime Ministers, had before them not only the views of their predecessors, but memoranda prepared in the light of new experience and post-war conditions. He had approached the question with a predisposition in favour of the Channel Tunnel, but the evidence before the Committee was such that he was forced to an opposite conclusion. From the point of view of security the Committee of Imperial Defence did not wish to over-state the case, but were advised that an element of danger was involved. They had no room for doubt that the existence of the tunnel would be bound to add to the anxieties of those to whom the national defence was committed, and that when completed the result would be the disappearance of cross-Channel steamship services. As regards relief to unemployment, the maximum number of persons employed on the construction of the tunnel would not exceed 12,000 at either end. The Committee considered the advantages were not commensurate with the disadvantages from the national defence point of view, and further, all that had happened in the last five years, including naval, military and air development, tended without exception to make the Channel Tunnel a dangerous experiment.

### 4,000 Pet Rats

SUPPORTED BY THRIFTY WOMEN'S NEEDLE.

GRAZ, Australia, July 18 (A.P.)—Rats in the garret, rats in the cellar and everywhere else in the house was when they searched the home of Frau Aurelia Mayer, who had been supporting some 4,000 rodents and considering them as her pets. Investigation of the Mayer house was begun because of complaints of the neighbors.

Fraulein Mayer, who took in sewing to make a living for herself and rats, told the authorities she often had scarcely enough to eat for herself, but that her rats were always amply provided with food. She gave them bread and cheese, sausage and other morsels regularly, she said, because otherwise the rats might go astray in search of things to eat and inconvenience the neighbors. The town's rat catcher was engaged for the best part of a week in clearing the Mayer house of its rodent inhabitants, the owner meanwhile staying at an hotel. There were white rats and grey rats and dapple rats when the rat catcher began his task. All were killed, and then the house was fumigated.

### The Boy and His Job

One day, a number of years ago, a poor boy left his native town of Lismouth for Edinburgh, and endeavored to obtain employment in the bakery of Messrs. McVitie and Price, the boy whose name was Alexander Grant, that there was no vacancy. Grant called again, and every day for a week he left a note in which he stated he could make better cakes than anyone else in the firm. In the end his persistence was rewarded with a job. To-day he is chairman of McVitie and Price; he recently gave away £100,000 to charity, and his wonderful career has now been crowned by the bestowal of a baronetcy. Sir Alexander's greatest friend is Mr. Ramsay MacDonald; they were poor boys together in Lismouth.

### Bite of Tiny Coral Snake

**MORE DEADLY THAN RATTLE.**  
 TUCSON, Ariz., July 17 (A.P.)—The coral snake, so small it is not considered dangerous, has the deadliest poison of any snake found in this part of the Southwest. Dr. Charles T. Vorhies, head of the department of biology at the University of Arizona, said in a recent lecture here.

The coral, the annulated snake and the rattlesnake are the only types of poisonous snakes in this region, Dr. Vorhies explained. The annulated snake is rarely found, he added, so that people are in little danger of being bitten by any variety except the rattlesnake.

In his opinion, the gila monster has poison less dangerous than that of the rattlesnake. Despite popular opinion to the contrary, the camponotus, an insect, the vinegar and the child of the Desert are harmless creatures, the scientist stated.

### CENTRAL LEATHER.

Improvement in Business Apparent During Last Three or Four Weeks—Current Period Usually Quiet.

(Boston News Bureau, July 15th.)  
 Boston—The Central Leather Co. has experienced a distinct improvement in sales of leather during the past three weeks, and sentiment throughout the leather trade has turned for the better. June produced a fairly good business, particularly the latter part, and the first two weeks of July have been unusually good for this season. Ordinarily the last two weeks of June and the first half of July con-

stitute a quiet period. Central Leather officials usually do not anticipate much improvement in business until after the middle of July. The second half of 1924 is expected to produce a much better volume of business than did the first half. Considering the fact that there is a shoe style exposition in progress in Boston this week, developments in the leather trade are the more surprising because this event usually slows up buying to some extent.

There is virtually no change in sole leather prices; in fact they are a trifle lower than they were around the first of the year, but in recent weeks they have held very steady. Union steer backs are quoted at 40 cents, whereas early in the year the market was 42-43 cents. Union cow backs are now 36 to 38 cents for various grades, against this year's best price of about 39. Oak leather is 43 to 45, whereas early in the year the market was firm at 45.

Fundamentally the leather situation is growing stronger as a result of the curtailment policy of tanners, which has been in effect for about eight months. Stocks of sole leather continue to show reduction. On May 31 total stocks of sole leather (cattle) were 8,563,233 sides, against 8,723,995 sides April 30 and 9,280,849 on May 31, 1923. Since a year ago, therefore, there has been a reduction of 717,616 sides, or 7.7%. Production of sole leather in May was but 1,147,404 sides, comparing with 1,173,448 sides in April and 1,574,024 sides in May, 1923. Prediction of tanners that reductions in stocks would become progressively greater is being borne out.

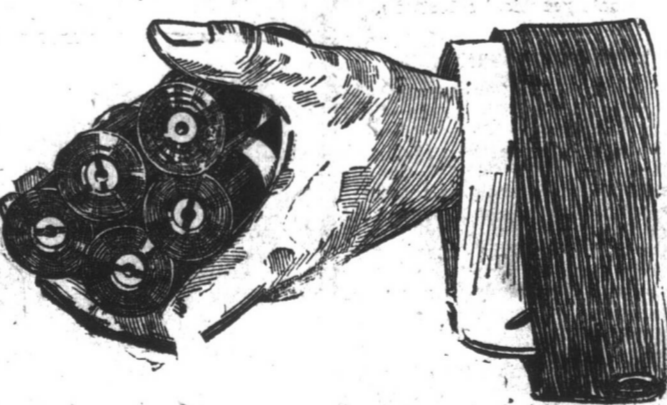
tric Company of Canada have reason to view the annual statement presented this week with considerable satisfaction. The company has been forced to face depreciation in the electrical business which probably reached a high point last year, as compared with the two previous years, and present conditions for standard equipment are reported as slow, a condition common to most industries. In spite of this fact the company was able to show a fair net operating profit, running just under 2 per cent. on its preferred stock. This indicates the wisdom of the directors in deciding on a passing of the dividend after September, 1923. Quite frankly the report states that a resumption of the dividend will depend on a return to normal business conditions.

Two Promising Developments. Two outstanding elements are indicated, however, by the report, both of them of a promising character. One of these is that the company has practically wiped out its current liabilities and has nearly \$500,000 of net working capital ready to carry it along when business does improve. Another constructive factor indicated in the statement of the president is that the company has developed during the past year two new lines of manufacture, one, power generators, and the other, electric locomotives. They were unable to complete their extensions the last year in time to share in the electrical development of 1923, in Canada, but they are now in a position to do so and this promises to be one of the most satisfactory lines for the future, particularly considering the first class English connections the company holds. They are already producing electric locomotives for two corporations in Canada, and these were secured in active competition with the two largest houses in the United States in these lines, which itself speaks well for the company's moderate cost of operations.

After Preferred at Low Price. We learn that efforts have been made to secure small lots of preferred stock at fairly low bids, and we would urge holders of this stock to refuse to accept on the ground that the position of the stock should improve as the business of the company gets on a better footing. Resumption of the dividends should not prove a difficult problem for the company as soon as normal business returns and although the date of this must remain indefinite, the prospects, however, are hopeful, and the market price of the stock should see a gradual improvement in the next year or two.

As we have urged in connection with one or two other securities recently, the present prospects of this company do not warrant the sacrifices of the stock at prices that might be offered at the present time. So far as we can learn those who in close touch with the company have no intention of letting their securities go at any bargain prices.

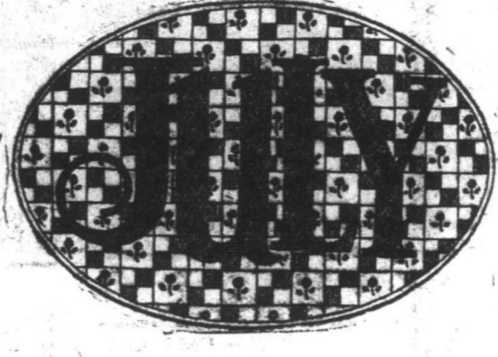

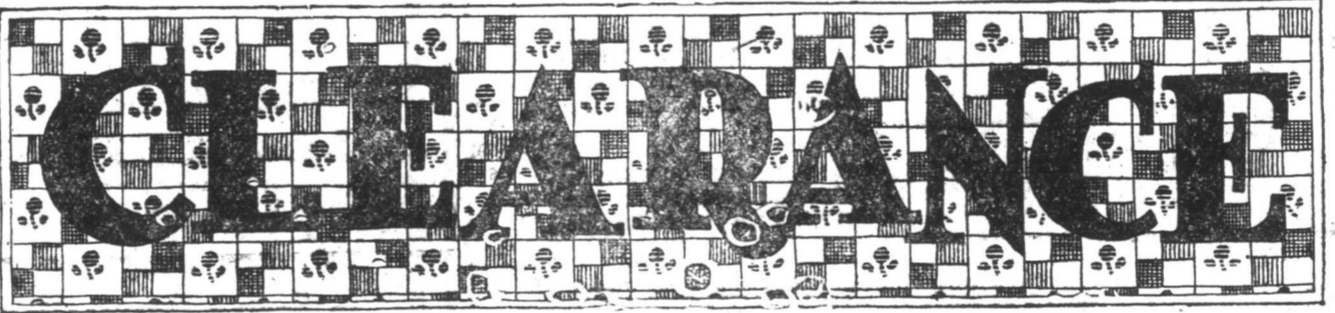
