RECENT BATTLE IN CUBA.—News direct from Cespedes confirms fully the reported defeat of the Spanish forces in attempting to open the railroad from Nucoltas to Puerto Principe. The loss of Spaniards was about 1,000 dead and wounded. The Cuban forces are stated to have been 3,500 men under Quesada. The fighting was by far the severest which has taken place during the war.

Calvin has managed to run alongside the Grecian, and that transhipment of the battery of guns on board, with the carriages and a greater part of the baggage, was effected. An effort to escue the remaining freight was also to see made. As to the vessel itself, representatives from all the insurance commanies interested have to decide upon the ourse it may be best to adopt for the protection of their several interests.

KNOTTY—The corporation of the village of St. Mary's have had some trouble with a Mr. Towt, an employee, of the Grand Trunk Railway one-tenth of whose house stands in the village and the remainder in Blanshard. The St. Mary's assessor valued the property on the town side at \$200, and the township assessor valued his end of the premises at \$80. Mr. Towt laid an appeal to the village Court of Revision, and claimed exemption on the grounds that his doors opened into Blanshard. The point of receiving the advantage of the free schools in St. Mary's was brought before the appellant, and he subsided, considering that it was better to pay \$9 income tax than \$16 for school fees.

Rousing Him Up.

Rousing Him Up.

Senator Summer has trodden on the tail of the British Lion, and the old fellow is beginning to snarl. He thinks he has borne the pecking of the Eagle long enough, and if it be repeated there is no manner of doubt that there "will be wigo on the green." The following from the Pall Mall Gazette may be taken as a specimen of the spirit in which matters between Columbia and Britain are viewed by leading spirits:—If our estimate of the situation is correct, it is certainly serious. Irritation of this sort is always an element of danger. It may smoulder on for a time, and at last die out, but it may also be fanned to a sudden flame by some incident which can be neither forseen nor controlled. The pelicy of the English government for the last four years has been alternately to ignore American hostility, and to attempt to conciliate it. It cannot be said that either effort has been successful, and we are strongly of opinion that the time for both has passed. Such charges as those brought by Mr. Sumner against us ought not to be passed over. We are accused of having broken the law of nations in a most important particular, of having deliberately inflicted a terrible injury upon a friendly State, and of having repeatedly and knowingly lied in order to evade a confession of guilt. These accusations are not made in the heat of passion or under the smart of recent loss; they are gathered up and repeated in a set speech delivered years afterwards, and by a politician who is no doubt perfectly familiar with the story. The offence, therefore, lacks no aggravation that can be given it by purpose and determination. If in private life a man sits quiet under such treatment as this, we know what to think of him, and if any other great power than England determination. If the French government took notice of such a declaration, its silence would be universally set down to fear; nor would France have any right to complain of the inference.
