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Dominion Parliament.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. In the House of Commons on Friday, Sir Geo. E. Cartier gave notice that on Tuesday next he would move seconded by Hon. Mr. McDougall, that the House go into committee of the whole to consider a resolution respecting the acquisition of the territorial and other rights of the Hudson's Bay Company in Rupert's Land, and any other part of British North America not comprised in Rupert's Land, or British Columbia; and respecting the admission of the North West Territory. The other business transacted was not of great importance.

Royal Canadian Bank.

A Toronto correspondent, writing on Saturday to the London Free Press, says: "The Directors of the Royal Canadian Bank met to-day, and discussed a variety of matters connected with the position of its affairs. The meeting is understood to have been nearly unanimous in the opinion that the Bank should re-open within the sixty days allowed by charter, and the opinion gains ground outside that the course will be adopted. A full and explicit statement of affairs will be made out by competent auditors, for submission to the general meeting of shareholders to be called shortly, and it is believed that the Directors will recommend this course at that time. The general feeling outside is that if the present Board can be got rid of confidence will be restored, and, indeed, their presence is the most material drawback that exists. The capital of the Bank is still almost untouched, but if it is allowed to go into liquidation this will suffer serious drains, while a sincere and rigorous management would restore what is more wanting than money—public confidence. The present Directors express themselves willing to retire, but serious difficulty will be experienced to get reliable men. Most of the shareholders are small capitalists, the material portion of whose wealth is invested in bank stock, or men who took stock to facilitate discounts. It is clear that these men are not the men to bring confidence to the concern, but if new men of large means are brought in, the Royal Canadian will yet become a safe institution. It is understood that an effort in this direction will be made at the same time that the Bank will attempt to resume. All classes are anxious to prevent the disgrace of another bank failure in the Province, and in the attempt to resume, the Royal Canadian will have generous assistance. The Local Government's account has been temporarily transferred to the Bank of Montreal. Bank bills selling this afternoon at 90 cents, principally to parties having notes to meet." Mr. Donald McDonald has issued another circular, in reply to the "Private and Confidential" communications of the Directors of the Royal Canadian Bank, and Mr. A. M. Smith, the late President. It furnishes pretty conclusive evidence of the lamentable infirmities of the Board as a whole, for the position they have been called upon to fill; and a state of affairs in connection with the Bank, most unfortunate, to use the mildest term we can select.

THE BANKS AND BONDS.—The English begin to discover an awkward joke in supplying gold for American bonds, in order to avert the consequence of inflation and extravagance, and especially so in view of the delicate relations now existing between the two countries. Therefore it was that the bank rate was recently raised, and the Times says that all that can be positively known is that if 4 1/2 per cent. will not suffice the movement will go on to the requisite point, whether that point be 5 per cent. or 10 per cent. So long as Europe absorbs American bonds with unquestioning confidence all will govern well enough, but if the policy indicated by the recent action of the Bank of England is pursued something like a collapse, sooner or later, must present itself. A nation cannot go on manufacturing accommodation paper—for such bonds really are—indefinitely.

MR. MOTLEY'S INSTRUCTIONS.—A despatch from Washington says:—"The most that can be reliably ascertained of instructions to Minister Motley, is that they are more of a general than specific character, and do not contemplate any speedy action on his part with regard to the Alabama and other claims in view of the present sentiment in England upon the subject. If for no other reason Mr. Motley will inform her Majesty's Government of our own desire to adjust all pending questions on a basis that will strengthen the friendly relations between the two countries."

EMIGRATION TO CANADA.—Mr. Thomas White, the Ontario Emigration Commissioner, writing from London, says:—"While in Mr. Dixon's office about half an hour in the morning, no less than seventeen came in to ascertain whether they could be assisted to go to Canada. These were all active-looking young men, the kind of material that makes good settlers in Canada. They were bricklayers, masons, and agricultural laborers mainly; and their story, without a variation, was that trade is so dull that they can only get one week's work out of three, and that at low wages. All these people professed willingness and ability to pay a part of their own passage money; they are not paupers in any sense of the term, but if relief come not in one shape or another, they stand a fair chance of being in so time. A fair assistance to enable them to reach a new country, with their sense of self-respect untouched, is the most certain way of preventing English pauperism."

ARE VELOCIPEDS LIABLE TO TOLLS?—This question recently arose before the Ramsey magistrates in England. A turnpike collector was summoned for illegally demanding and receiving the sum of two shillings and sixpence as toll for a velocipede. The defendant contended that he was empowered to make the charge under the act; but the bench told him that neither in the Local act nor in the General Highway act was there any clause under which the toll could be demanded. He was fined sixpence and costs, the magistrates at the same time ordering the restitution to plaintiff of the two shillings and sixpence illegally received.

A GOOD PRICE.—For a sow, and nine pigs one week old, Mr. Allan Stinson, of Guelph, received from Mr. P. B. Bryant, of Lexington, Ky., the nice little sum of \$60 in gold. The grunter were taken away by the Express on Monday and Mr. Simpson's name will have honorable mention in the States.

The people all made a resolve to keep straight yesterday, and as a consequence there was nobody but His Worship and the clerk in the Police Court to-day.

RUN OVER.—On Monday, when every person was gay, a little boy got in the way of some person who was driving fast, and was knocked down and run over. Fortunately it was a light rig, and the boy, though much frightened, was not seriously injured. Under Dr. McGuire's care he is improving.

PROMISCUOUS FIRING.—We have heard complaints from parties who were boasting on the river on Monday, about unauthorized firing at the target. For some reason the balls did not hit the target, but went whizzing away down over the heads of the rowers, a thing which it will be readily understood was not very agreeable. To the gentlemen who perpetrated the folly we would say, don't do it any more, or the Association will be down on you.

SOME FUN.—Certain individuals thought that they were enjoying themselves immensely on Sunday night or Monday morning, when they were going round town removing decent people's grates and door steps. If fun consists in heavy lifting, then they had a fair share of the commodity, for in doing what they did, their muscle must have been taxed rather severely. There may be amusement in turning over half a ton of iron or stone, although people that have not much energy to spare can scarcely see the point.

KICKED BY A HORSE.—Yesterday evening, George, son of Mr. Wm. Pringle, a boy about seven years old, was kicked on the side of the forehead by a horse on the common near the Great Western Railway. Drs. McInnis and Keating were sent for, and as soon as the boy rallied sufficiently they operated upon the skull, removing two portions of considerable size, and elevating another portion which was depressed. The fracture is a serious one, the membranes of the brain being wounded. The boy now is in a dangerous state, but Dr. McGuire informs us he is, taking all things into consideration, as well as could be expected.

They have lately written to Prince & Co., to induce them to disengage some superior workmen whom we have got from their factory, intending to publish the reply if satisfactory, but their letter was treated with the contempt it deserved. After challenging us to make an instrument equal to theirs, they bought a new Mason & Hamilton organ to copy after. We presume the public will soon hear of their new fan tremolo or vox humana. We have been compelled to make these statements in order to defend ourselves from their venomous attacks. Had their advertisements not reached places where they themselves are not known, we would not have stooped to notice them. We hope we may not be again compelled to contradict their falsehoods. We will now conclude by referring the public to our standing advertisements.

FALSE ALARM.

To the Editor of the Guelph Mercury. The Old and New School Presbyterian General Assemblies met in the city of New York last week, and the most important question before them was that of reunion after a separation of upwards of a third of a century. The chief question that divided the body was slavery, although other points, some of them doctrinal, were the alleged cause of division; and now that slavery is gone, and the generation that quarrelled has nearly passed away, there are good hopes that a spirit of unity may prevail. The Old School, which excluded the New, was the first to make overtures for reunion some years ago, and the question has since been discussed at great length in the numerous religious papers and all the Presbyteries of both churches. If the reunion is not accomplished now, it will probably be postponed indefinitely, hence the great interest that attaches to the present meeting of these Assemblies.
