Editorial Items.

THE LAST SHIFT.—The only point at all worth noticing in the Herald's silly rejoinder to our remarks on the County Printing contract question is a trumped up charge that we last year advertised the Debenture By-law in the Daily instead of the Weekly edition. So we did, but why? Simedition. So we did, but why? Simply because the County authorities gave a new rendering of the law by instructing us to meet it three calender months instead of the thirteen consecutive weeks, as we had previously done in advertising all previous By-laws of the same nature, and that when so instructed there was not sufficient time to advertise it for that period in the Weekly, and to make it legal it had consequently to be inserted in the Daily. The Finance Committee had all the facts before them, and sanctioned the alteration by passing the account. We were prepared to carry out our agreement to the letter, as we had done on all previous occasions, but we acted under instructions from the County Solicitor, who we presume is a much better authority in these matters than the conceited prigs who run the Herald. The Herald's miserable shifts to uphold its position are truly contemptible, for this is the only very small mole-hill which they have manufactured out of the huge mountain at first conjured up. ply because the County authorities first conjured up.

The Mormons are feeling their way into Arizona; 200 Saints have been ordered on to open the way for colonies from Utah which will range themselves along the route of the thirty-fifth parallel this; as of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. Wood and Mr. NoKellar approved of the principle on which the bill was framed, but hoped that after the second reading Mr. Clarke would withdraw it, Mr. McKellar stating that at no distant day the Government would bring forward a measure perhaps not the same in detail, but involving the same principle.

Mr. H. S. Muclouald moved the six no capits hoist which was lost, 50 voting for the second reading, and it against. Mr. Clarke said that after this expression of the House he was quite content to leave the matter to the Government. He did not intend to carry the Bill through, but as a matter of form he moved that it be referred to a Committee of the Whole.

A telegram published this morning announces that some of the arrivers have threatened with assassination the proprietors who purposed employing Chinese laborers. It is possible that these menaces originated with individual strikers. The several discipline, loe e.g., which the society exercises over its men, renders it extremely improbable that no such threats would have been employed except at the instigation of the societies.
