

The Law of Libel.

Considerable attention has lately been given to the law of libel in da, from the frequency with which cases of this nature have been before the Courts. The celebrated Montreal case-in which the propristors of the Witness were defendants -a.id on which sat a jury so stupid as not to know for whom to return a verdict-has given rise to a demand. for an amendment of the law now in force in Quebec. In the case above mentioned the old and tyrannical law in force in Britain at the begin. ning of this century was the one un-der which it was tried, and even it was strained to its utmost limits in order to secure a verdict against the Messrs. Dougall, who showed that in publishing the state-ments charged as libellous, there was no malice. We are glad to see that the matter has engaged the attention of Parliament, and that a bill framed and introduced by Mr Brooks, for assimilating the law of libel to that which now prevails in England and also in Ontario, will receive the sanction of the House The first clause provides that the jury, on the general plea of not uilty, shall not be required by the udge "to find the defendant guilty merely on the proof of publication by such defendant of the paper charged to be a libel, and of the sense ascribed to the same in such indictment or information," with the two provisos of leaving the judge the usual discretion in the nature of his charge, and the jury the right to find a special verdict, and the defendant the right to move in arrest of judgment.
