

TTAWA, June 6-The second session of Canada's twelfth parliament, in many ways the most remarkable since confederation, came to a dramatic conclusion today. Prorogation day is usually quiet, the chief interest attaching to the military display which marks the closing ceremonies. Today the deelopments and discussions within the walls of parliament were so nteresting that the fuss and feathers were practically forgotten by those closely associated with the proceedings, although the populace turned out in considerable numbers to see Deputy-Governor Fitzpatrick arrive with the usual escort. They were scattered shortly

The most interesting development occurred at the morning sitting when there was a sharp final debate on the naval question and a pronouncement by Premier Borden as to the future action f the government in view of the fact that the naval bill has been illed by the senate. The contractors for the giant works

The contractors for the giant works of the Canada Cement Co., which will maufacture over 4,000 barrels daily of that much required building material, at once placed orders for several carloads of lumber for the bearding camp loads of lumber for the boarding camp at the plant site, which will take care of some 300 men at the outset, and where eventually from 500 to 700 men will be given employment in the construction of the extensive buildings of the company. The railway siding at South Medicine Hat was also ordered, but railways move slowly, unless Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, Dan Mann, or Jim Hill, er someone equally high up, gives the order direct. So, it was only yesterday that this sine qua non of a sidetrack was laid, and the several cars of lumber were spotted.

From these homes as centres, about the past year 65 girls have been taken into our homes, almost all of them remaining a few months, and they have here received protection and help. Of these, several were token from most degrading conditions—physical, mental, and spiritual wrecks—very often having come originally from homes of luxury and refinement. Others were, through the kindness of the authorities, sent into our cheery surroundings in preference to sending them to jail. Through visiting the jail weekly, 140 girls have been reached. During jail. Through visiting the jail weekly, many, on having served their sentence, have come to us until we could secure suitable positions for them. Different departments of the Children's Aid throughout the province have sent to us girls who were in serious danger, to be kept as long as seemed desirable or wise. A large number have been brought into our homes from the hospitals on being discharged, when they were without means of support, or had become mothers.
