MONDAY was rather an important day in the political history of the United States.

The future of the democratic party is difficult to predict. It has probably fought its last contest as a united body, and the presidential campaign of next year may see an entirely new political organization in the field.

Agricultural.

Too cold water is a very poor drink for cows in winter. Don't wait until you build the hard barn before altering the cows. Build the shed for them, and they will help you build the barn.

We used to hear of calves being knocked in the head with the churn dasher, and we fear the practice has not gone out of fashion altogether.

We sometimes think that the agricultural writer works to small purpose, but when we contrast the care given cows now and that which they received twenty years ago we see that the improvement is very marked.
