CANADA'S FUEL SUPPLY

Subject of Debate in House of Commons-Let Canada be Independent on This.

The problem of securing a fue supply for Canada, to guard against any possibilities of shortage in the central section of the Dominion thru a stoppage in the supply of anthracite from the United States, occupied the time of the House of Commons Friday night. The debate arose on a vote, under Trade and Commerce Department, of \$10,000 to the Engineering Society of Canada. Another vote in the estimates of \$120,000 was for Scientific Research Council. H. H. Stevens, Conservative member for Vancouver Centre, and former Minster of Trade and Commerce, urged that the Scientific Research Council should be asked to devote its efforts oward seeking a solution of the fuel problem this year.
