COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The Course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, French, Drawing, Vocal Music, Fencing, Drill, and Gymnastics.

The Piano-forte is taught as an extra. Fee, for tuition and use of instrument, \$8 per term.

The following Rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on March 9th, 1867 :—

“ Each pupil shall, at the beginning of every term, pay the Fees for that term in advance, and any balance which may be due for books or otherwise

"from the preceding term, and shall obtain from the
"Bursar a Card of Admission to the School, which
"shall be presented to the Head Master within the first
"two weeks of the term.

"And should any boy fail to present such Card within
"the specified time, it shall be the duty of the Head
"Master to request his parents to remove him from the
"School until such payment shall be made."

BOARDING.

Boarders are received into the School-House, a large and commodious building, with accommodation for sixty boys. The School-House is under the immediate supervision of the Head Master, assisted by three resident Masters. The household arrangements are directed by a Lady Matron of acknowledged ability and experience. The grounds, covering eight acres, afford ample room for cricketing, &c., and an open-air Gymnasium has been erected, which with a Fives-court to be built as soon as circumstances allow, will ensure the muscular development of the boys.

TERMS.

The School year is divided into three terms of about thirteen weeks each:—

• Michaelmas Term, 1868, from September 12, to December 17.

Lent Term, 1869, from January 9, to April 8.

Trinity Term, 1869, from April 24, to July 22.

Pupils may enter at the commencement of any term or half term.

VACATIONS.

Two weeks at Easter; seven weeks at Midsummer; three-and-a-half weeks at Christmas.

By the kindness of the Grand Trunk Railway authorities return tickets for one fare are issued for the holidays. A similar privilege will, it is hoped, be granted by the Directors of the Port Hope and Lindsay Rail Road.

EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations are held at the end of the Christmas and Summer half-years, the Midsummer Examination being conducted by the Professors of Trinity College. Removes are made only after these Examinations. General Proficiency prizes are given at Christmas and Midsummer to the head boy of each form.
