AN OUTRAGEOUS DECISION.
A business that seems to be superior to the courts and public opinion is the express monopoly. True it is, the business is in the hands of two competing companies, but they act as a unit in dealing with the public.

STATISTICS WILL PROVE THE CASE.
The Winnipeg City Council proposes to submit a bylaw to raise \$375,000 for establishing a municipal lighting system. The Free Press complains that the council has furnished no particulars as to the cost of operating a municipal plant in cities which have adopted that system.

ONE-SIDED JUSTICE.
Every effort is being made by the officials of the City Hall, from the Mayor down, to prevent the execution of the judgment obtained by William Kelly against the police constables. The court decided that these officers had wantonly exceeded their duties in arresting a citizen for driving himself and family to church on Sunday.

THE EVIDENCE OF A GOOD POLICY.
At a meeting of the Brantford Board of Trade held last week it was shown that the foreign exports of that port increased from \$20,949 in 1890 to \$52,143 in 1896. Ninety per cent of these exports were manufactures, which were shipped to Australia, Great Britain, China, United States, Germany, Holland, British Africa, Argentine Republic, France, Chili, Mexico, Norway, a dozen other countries.
