

500 Ottawa Families Now Homeless As Result of Fierce Six Hours' Fire

City Wrestles With Conflagration Hopelessly—Montreal Sends Help and Militia Are Called to Aid Sufferers—Loss Exceeds Half Million.

SCOPE OF THE BLAZE. Estimated Loss \$500,000. Buildings Destroyed 300. Feet of Lumber Burned 10,000,000. Acres Swept 100. Duration of Fire Hours 6. Families Rendered Homeless 500.

Ottawa, May 10.—(From World Staff Men)—As a result of a fierce blaze in Ottawa this afternoon five hundred families have been rendered homeless. The flames swept an area in the city estimated at from twenty-five to one hundred acres. The loss is estimated to be something over half a million dollars, almost wholly insured. The property destroyed consists of residences and ten million feet of lumber. Nearly three hundred buildings were consumed. The flames had control of the city for six hours, owing to the water main bursting. Montreal was appealed to. The militia forces were out. The fire broke at 3.30 and was extinguished at 9.30.

This city to-day had an experience rivaling that of the great fire of April, 1900. The whole area of the west end of the city known as Mount Sherwood and Rochesterville, was swept by the flames. The blaze started at 3.30 and was extinguished at 9.30. Hundreds of wagons carrying the household goods of the inhabitants streamed eastward all afternoon and late into the night. The Forty-third Rifles and Governor-General's Foot Guards were called out to aid in keeping order.

There are rumors of incendiarism, and John White is in the police cells in connection with the fire. He was sent to the penitentiary by Chancellor Boyd in January, 1885, for incendiarism, and released on ticket of leave in October, 1901. He is said to have a craze on the subject of fire, and is suspected of the habit of ringing false alarms.

First Sign of Danger. The first pronouncement of danger was a fire in a hay-pressing factory near Union Station about noon. This caused a good deal of alarm in Ottawa, but was quickly extinguished. The fire was again under control after burning a factory and several thousand dollars' worth of lumber. A second alarm was sounded about 3.30, and the flames burst out in the heart of the lumber district. The fire began in J. K. Booth's lumber piles near Oliver's furniture factory and spread in a lightning rapidity. Immediately after the fire broke out the pumping main burst and left the firemen helpless for two hours. The district lies in a hollow below a road, and the water was forced to be pumped to the houses on the height. But a high wind was blowing from the west, and the flames were carried to the houses on the height and were afraid that the fire would mount up and sweep the whole city to the ground.

The church and monastery of St. Jean Baptiste stand on the bluff, and the Dominican Fathers' residence and other property. Even the house on Concession-street where the body of Judge McNeil was supposed to be hidden, and other articles were removed from it. The possibility of having to remove the bodies of the dead was a very low level. Here it had its own way, and by the time the water was obtained the houses were being consumed in blocks and streets.

Firemen Fought Hard. The firemen fought hard to keep the flames from crossing Division street, which lies at the foot of the cliff, and were successful. The fire, however, swept along from south to north following the opposite direction from the fire of several years ago. The widest conflagration and panic prevailed. Furniture was flung out of houses. Everything on wheels was called for requisition, and the stream of traffic filled all the streets eastward for hours. Men and women carried bundles in their arms. Household furniture was piled upon vacant lots in places that were supposed to be out of danger, and sometimes the furniture was seen scattered on the chairs and sofas. One man finding that his trench had been dug near his house, threw his furniture into it and fled with earth. Another was driving a load of furniture when shouts from the street warned him that the street was on fire.

Four men who managed to get a wagon but to horses took hold of the danger. The boundaries of the fire may be described generally as follows: Canada Atlantic tracks on the south; Richmond-road on the north; First-avenue on the west and the west side of Division-street on the east. It is about the quarters of a mile long and a quarter of a mile broad.

Substantial Buildings. It came about 3.30 in the afternoon that a fire broke out in the west end of the city. The fire was confined chiefly to the dwellings of the working class, and the houses were largely occupied by people who had bought them on the installment plan. These would be insured by the amount of the mortgage, but in many cases the purchaser would lose all his savings. There is an ordinance forbidding the erection of wooden houses in this district, yet it is constantly evaded by the erection of shanty houses. There is a great deal of angry discussion of the fact that people are compelled to go to the expense of building substantial houses, while their protection is wholly destroyed by liability to fires from lumber.

Some Remarkable Escapes. Some remarkable escapes are recorded in Wellington-street. Three houses rising in the midst of the fire- swept region escaped without a particle of damage, except one broken window. They were

“REFORMER” IN CELL FOR “BEATING” A HOTEL

Lodowick H. Jones of Buffalo Jailed in New York for Alleged Crookedness.

New York, May 10.—While dining with the wife of a few months in the Hotel Concord in West Forty-seventh-street, Saturday night, Lodowick H. Jones, reformer and lawyer of Buffalo, where he is known as the “Young Parliament,” and who has had a special board of officers work out a plan for this end which he hopes will succeed, as an immediate step to excite interest he wishes to have a team of expert American riflemen assembled through competitive contests and sent abroad to try at Bisley in England for the Palma trophy, now held by Great Britain.

He was arrested on the charge of violating the law, and he was imprisoned in the city jail for several days.

From Mr. Roberts' description it would appear that in these great sources of wealth there is a rich store of minerals having nothing to envy in that of Quebec.

The Amittiv River, for instance, which at a distance of a hundred miles from its junction with the Moose, averages about a hundred feet in width, contains numbers of magnificent water powers, awaiting development, varying from 15,000 to 150,000 horse-power.
