THREE RIVERS—An incorporated city of Quebec, capital of St. Maurice County, at the junction of the St. Lawrence and St. Maurice Rivers, and on the C. P. R. 96 miles east of Montreal and 77 west of Quebec. The Grand Trunk also has a station here, and the St. Maurice Valley Ry. also runs to Shawenegan Falls. It is one of the oldest citis of the province, having been founded in 1634 by Laviolette, under orders from Champlain. Carrying Out of Drainage and Filtration Operations Will Put City in Enviable Position.

letter to The World, deals further with the question of the city's water supply. Toronto is a healthy city, he wries. It is favored in location, climate, topography facilitating drainage, and an inexhaustible supply of water, which Mr. Mansergh, one of the highest British authorities, declares will, if filtered, be "a high-class water of unimpeach-

be "a high-class water of unimpeachable character."

This good city has been badly misrepresented in some of the discussion that has takeb place concerning its drainage and water supply services. This misrepresentation finds its origin in a faulty method of estimating the city's population for statistical purposes. The ratio of increase of the province's inhabitants during a term of ten years is taken as a basis for calculating the subsequent growth of Toronto. The most recent accurate figures of Toronto's population are those of the police census of 1905, being 262,749. The figures upon which our government officials reckoned our death rate, etc., for the same year, were 219,851. It will be readily seen that this method makes a given number of deaths appear to have a larger ratio to any unit of population than is really the case.

than is really the case.

It is this blunder that has caused the exaggerated statements made of a specially high typhoid fever death-rate in cially high typhoid fever death-rate in Teronto. That rate is not 24 per 100,000 of the population. Dr. Sheard states that the total number of deaths from typhoid for the past eight years was 301, which he estimates to be about 15 per 100,000 per annum. It must also be borne in mind that Toronto is a hospital city, to which a great many persons who are not citizens come for medical treatment, thus largely adding to our normal city death-rate.

Bright Prospects.

It is nevertheless exceedingly desirable to take such action as will place us in a still better position. The carrying out of the drainage and filtration operations now proposed will put our city in an enviable sanitary condition. The trunk sewer will abolish a state of affairs which is now worse than it was twelve years ago, when Mr. Mansergh wrote of it as follows:

CAN NATURAL CONDITIONS BE WITHSTOOD?

World Office. Monday Evening, June 22.

Traders and brokers were generally disgusted with to-day's Toronto Stock Market. Practically nothing doing and speculative shares hard of sale was the concentrated opinion of brokers after leaving the exchange. The inactivity and weakness at New York served only to emphasize the feeling of depression which pervaded local financial circles.

Despite the fact that money rates are low at all the leading financial centres, Toronto bankers are not yet anxious enough for business to offer inducements and call loans are still difficult to obtain here. The inside interests in the speculative specialties are fighting the decline, particularly so in regard to the South American stocks, but can they withstand the pressure of natural conditions? The decrease in last week's Toronto Railway earnings is a matter that will need explanation to conform to a rising market.




