PUBLIC WORSHIP at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

SABBATH SCHOOL, 3 p.m.

BIBLE CLASS FOR YOUNG MEN at 3.15 p.m.

THE WEEKLY PRAYER MEETING is held on Wednesday evening at half-past 7 in the Lecture Room.

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM is administered on the first Sabbath of every month. Parents are expected to give previous intimation of their intention to present their children for baptism.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is observed on the last Sabbath in January, April, July and October.

THE SESSION meets in the vestry every six weeks or at shorter intervals at the call of the Moderator.

THE TEACHERS OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL meet, for the study of the lesson, every Wednesday at half-past 8 p.m., for prayer every Sabbath at the close of the School, and for business on the call of the Superintendent.

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT meets in the Manager's room on the third Wednesday of each month at half-past 8.

THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION meets in its room on Monday evening at half-past 8, and for devotional exercises on Sabbath morning at a quarter-past 10. Young men are cordially invited to attend.

THE HOPEFUL GLEANERS' MISSION BAND meets in the Church Parlour on alternate Saturdays at 3 o'clock.

MISSIONARY COLLECTORS visit their districts after the first Sabbath of each month, leave a copy of the Presbyterian Record with every family of the congregation, and are expected to pay the sums received to the Treasurer on the Wednesday evening following.

THE PRESIDENT AND TREASURER OF THE LADIES' CHURCH-FURNISHING ASSOCIATION meet the Collectors in the Parlour on the last Thursday of each month between 3 and 4 o'clock.

APPLICATIONS for sittings are made to the Managers, one or more of whom are present every Wednesday evening before and after prayer meeting to attend to this matter. *There are no seat rents. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute towards the support of ordinances according to their ability and by weekly offerings; envelopes for which are given at the beginning of each quarter.*

ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the Lecture Room, St. James Square, on the evening of January 16th, 1879.

After devotional exercises, conducted by the Pastor, Mr. J. S. Ewart was called to the Chair, and Mr. Robert Mills was appointed Secretary.

The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting were read, and also those of a Special Congregational Meeting held on May 22nd, 1878, and were confirmed.

The Managers' Report and the Treasurer's Statement having been submitted, in printed form, it was moved by Mr. Kirkland, seconded by Mr. McDonald, and carried—That the foregoing be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation be and are hereby tendered to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have performed their duties during the year.

The names of the retiring Managers were announced, being the following: Messrs. Archibald McDonald, Wm. Gordon, R. C. Steele, J. S. Ewart, J. O. Anderson, and H. W. Darling. After a number of nominations had been made, the following were elected in the usual way: Messrs. McDonald, Ewart, Steele, Darling, McEwan and S. Nairn.

It was moved by Mr. T. W. Taylor, seconded by Mr. H. W. Darling, and carried unanimously—That the name of the church be the St. James Square Presbyterian Church.

After the thanks of the meeting had been given to Mr. Ewart for the efficient manner in which he had discharged the duties of Chairman, the meeting was closed with prayer and the Benediction by the Pastor.

ADDRESS FROM THE SESSION.

DEAR BRETHREN,—At the date of the last Address, we were looking forward to the time when the edifice, then in process of erection, should be completed, and the congregation should find itself in possession of larger and more commodious rooms for the purposes of public worship, and of Sabbath School and Bible Class instruction. In the good providence of God, this prospect has now been realized. The attachment of the congregation to the building in which it had observed the worship of God for over twenty-one years, found sincere and affecting expression in the exercises of the closing meeting, in which several of the Elders took part. After worshipping in the large and cheerful school-room during the summer months, you were permitted to enter on the occupation of the church itself on the 17th of November; when services, which will be long remembered, were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal.

The whole enterprise is one which reflects credit on all connected with its execution, and for the successful completion of which we desire to unite with you in thanksgiving to God. It is satisfactory to notice, that the attendance, both on the morning and evening service, has considerably increased since the opening of the new and larger church; and though it would be unreasonable to expect a rapid growth in the attendance and membership, in view of the numerous churches of our own and other bodies recently erected in the locality, it is hoped that by the blessing of God, a steady increase may for some time be maintained.

As a result, not only of the larger accommodation, but also of the closing of the schools in Sherbourne Street and Caer-Howel Street, the attendance at the congregational Sabbath School has very considerably increased. We invite the co-operation of the members of the church to make this increase still larger. In the school-room and in the classrooms there is ample accommodation for from 400 to 500 young people. This branch of our work is thus an increasingly important one, and to enable the Superintendent to devote more time to its oversight, he has been relieved of some other duties which he has for many years faithfully discharged.

The Session, believing that there are still many young people in our city not under religious instruction and influence, is desirous to do something for this class, and is at present engaged in making enquiries after a suitable locality wherein to undertake work of this needful and eminently Christian kind.

Six members of the church, in full communion, were removed by death during the year: Mrs. Mathers, Robert Mills, Mrs. Duthie, Mrs. Redmond, Myra Mackay, and Joseph Rodgers. The two first had been connected with the congregation almost from its commencement, and had throughout taken an active and liberal interest in its welfare. The number on the Communion Roll on the 1st of January was 462; a net increase of 12 during the year; 73 names having been added, while 61 were removed.

We have been gratified to see the congregation's contributions for the Missionary Schemes of the Church so well maintained, notwithstanding the severity of the financial depression. We earnestly invite all who are earning money, whether on the Communion Roll or not, to contribute, either through the Missionary Collectors or through the Sabbath School, for these schemes, however small the amount which they can spare.

Few circumstances connected with the erection of the new church have been more gratifying to us than the success which has attended the efforts of the Ladies' Furnishing Association. The large amount raised during the nine months of the year, speaks not only to great energy and diligence on the part of the office-bearers and collectors of the Association, but to very general and well-sustained giving on the part of the members of the church for this object.

In conclusion, we remind you, as we would ourselves be reminded, that the greatly improved outward circumstances in which we are placed, lay us all under increased responsibility to exercise diligence and fidelity in the work entrusted to us. And if the word, which the occasion seems to speak in our hearing, is "Be ye also enlarged," it must be regarded as inculcating growth in faith and consecration, even more than in numbers; spiritual enlargement, even more than numerical increase.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

THE Managers have much pleasure in submitting their Twenty-fifth Annual Financial Statement and Report.

The receipts from all sources amounted to \$4,652.33, made up as follows:—

Weekly Offerings	\$2,271 15
Weekly Collections	1,925 93
Quarterly Contributions	455 25

The expenditure during the year was \$4,598.53, and the balance on hand at the end of the year, \$547.47.

To make a fair comparison of this year's receipts and expenditure with those of the previous year, it is necessary to deduct the sum of \$543, being the amount of a special collection at the opening of the school-house in March, and which was paid to the Treasurer of the Building Fund. It will, then, be seen that the normal receipts amounted to \$4,109.33, and the expenditure to \$4,055.53, being an increase in the receipts over those of the previous year of \$240.60, while the expenditure was about the same as that of the former year.

The Managers think it gratifying that, notwithstanding the changing of our place of worship, and our engaging in the building of a more commodious church, the contributions should have been so well maintained. They hope, however, that should God spare us to the end of another year, a very large increase in the contributions may be reported.

The Managers have had under consideration a suggestion from the Building Committee, that the ordinary revenue of the congregation should be charged for the current year with a certain amount of the interest accruing on the debt on the new church. This has seemed to the Managers only reasonable ; and for this purpose, as well as to meet the additional expenses attendant upon the occupation of the new church, we should steadfastly set ourselves to the providing an additional sum of from \$800 to \$1,000 to the ordinary revenue of the current year. This, the Managers are confident, will not be felt an onerous matter by the congregation.

It is only fair to assume, that what was considered a proper amount to be given in the way of a weekly offering, for the accommodation provided in the former church, will be cheerfully increased in view of the greatly improved accommodation provided in the new church ; and if each member and adherent will only make a small addition to the weekly offering or collection, and keep it up with regularity, the sum required will be easily provided.

Every effort has been made during the year to dispose of the Sherbourne Street property, but so far without success. These efforts will be continued ; and it is hoped the opening of the season will produce such a demand for property of this kind as will result in a sale. It is anticipated that this property will produce somewhere in the neighbourhood of from \$1,500 to \$2,000, in aid of the Building Fund.

The membership remains about the same as previously reported.

Asking God's blessing on our endeavours, and cherishing the spirit that has been exhibited by the congregation in other years in the face of difficulties, we should go forward with great hopefulness to the work of 1879.

STATEMENT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

It is known to the congregation that the matter of improved accommodation for Sabbath School and Prayer Meeting purposes was brought under its notice in the spring of 1876, and continued to engage anxious consideration for some time thereafter. It was at a meeting held on May 23rd, 1877, and on the report of a committee which had bestowed much attention on the subject, that the decision was taken to seek this improved accommodation in connection with the erection of a new church on a lot in the same locality, which it was found could be obtained. A committee to attend to the building of the church, and to the raising of funds for the same, was appointed in August, 1877. On a comparison of plans submitted, that of Messrs. Smith & Gemmel was adopted by the Committee. Tenders were invited on the basis of the plan adopted. It was found that the lowest tenders which the Committee thought it safe to accept for a building of the kind to be executed in stone, exceeded considerably the cost spoken of at the congregational meeting. The large majority of the Committee, however, entertained the opinion that it would be unwise to erect a church of the design adopted in any inferior material, and that the members of the congregation would sustain the Committee in this action, by increasing their subscriptions so as to cover the increased cost. Several members of the Committee at once increased their personal subscriptions by amounts varying from twenty-five to one hundred per cent.

The work was almost immediately commenced, and as the winter was an open one, it progressed very rapidly.

The school house ready for occupation this month the corner stone of the new building, the laying of which was done by the Rev. Mr. D. Taylor, and the first one by the Rev. D. Taylor.

On the 2nd April 1877 the corner stone was laid by the Rev. Mr. D. Taylor, a number of the members of the congregation, and members of the Board of Christian Missions. After devotion was led by the Rev. Mr. T. W. Taylor, the corner stone of the congregation was laid in the corner stone of the new building. The audience was large, and the service, Green and W. H. Howland.

The beginning of the new building was completed without, so far as the congregation was concerned, any engaged in the work. The building was formally set apart for the services of an institution. The services have been conducted by the Rev. Dr. Jencks. The opening of the school was attended together to \$1,375. The church and adjoining building. They certainly reflected credit on the congregation connected with the building. The highest expectation was planned. The building was accompanied by a large number of the congregation below that of similar buildings.

The school house and class rooms connected with it were ready for occupation in March, 1878, and on the 17th of this month the congregation met for the first time in the new building, the morning service having been conducted by the Rev. Mr. Donald, of Port Hope, and the evening one by the Rev. Dr. Burns, of Halifax.

On the 2nd April, the corner stone of the new church was laid by the Rev. Mr. King, in the presence of a large number of the members of the congregation, and of ministers and members of other churches. Mr. William Kerr, Chairman of the Building Committee, presided on the occasion. After devotional exercises, in which the audience was led by the Rev. Dr. Caven, Principal of Knox College, Mr. T. W. Taylor read a paper containing a brief history of the congregation. This scroll was afterwards deposited in the corner stone. After the corner stone had been laid, the audience was addressed by the Rev. Drs. Topp, Wardrope, Green and Potts, the Rev. Mr. Dickson and Mr. W. H. Howland.

The beginning of November saw the whole work completed without, so far as is known, any accident or injury to any engaged in it, and on the 17th November the church was formally set apart for the worship of God; opening services of an instructive and impressive character having been conducted by the Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal. The collections at the opening of the school house and of the church amounted together to \$1,371.62. It is pleasant to learn that the church and adjoining apartments are universally admired. They certainly reflect great credit on the architects and on all connected with their erection; and they are found to answer the highest expectations which were formed when the enterprise was planned. The total cost, as will be seen from the accompanying statement of the Treasurer, while very much below that of similar buildings erected when prices were

higher, is nevertheless large, and will call for the exercise of great and well-sustained liberality on the part of the members of the congregation. It is the agreeable duty of the Committee to report that many friends connected with other congregations in the city have evinced much interest in the enterprise, and that one of these, Mr. Frederick Wyld, presented the congregation with the handsome baptismal basin now in use.

LADIES' CHURCH-FURNISHING

The hearty response made by everyone to the call for subscriptions, has been most gratifying to the Committee; and they trust, that no one has found herself burdened by what she has given to this fund; but that possessing, as the congregation now does, not only a comfortable but a beautiful church, each contributor enjoys a feeling of real satisfaction at having helped on the good work, and is animated by a determination to continue her subscription till the debt is wiped out.

The amount subscribed in ten months was \$735.70; to which is added \$306.20, the net sum realized by the Social given at the opening of our new church.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL.

IN presenting our usual Annual Report, it is right to say that we do so under circumstances in many respects more auspicious, than on former occasions. In the prospect of entering on the large and commodious school house which we now occupy, it was agreed to discontinue the work of Sabbath School instruction which had been

prosecuted for some time in Sherbourne Street and Caer Howel Street, the wants of these districts being in large measure otherwise provided for. Children to the number of 35 from these schools joined with those from the Gould Street Sabbath School, to form the number with which the work was commenced in St. James Square, bringing the roll up to 237, at which it stood on the 24th March, when the School met for the first time in the form which it now assumes. Thirty additional pupils have since joined it, making on the roll at present 267. The school room, with connected class rooms and galleries, is capable of accommodating a much larger attendance; and though the district is one largely supplied with Sabbath Schools, it is confidently anticipated, that as the result of diligent and faithful effort a still larger number may be brought under religious instruction and influence in our midst.

The Infant Class is still taught by Miss Caven, and has an attendance of 77, of whom 37 are boys and 40 girls. At least two classes have been formed from it during the course of the year, one of which was placed under Mr. George Thompson, and the other under Miss Gordon.

There are at present in addition to this class, 31 classes, taught by 17 female and 14 male teachers. There have been many changes in the staff throughout the year. Among our losses it will not be thought invidious to mention the Misses Clark, who have with their family removed to the United States, but whose interest in the work here is still maintained. The list prefixed will shew what additions to the teaching staff the School has received.

Several members of the congregation are engaged elsewhere in the same work. Among these, Messrs. Bruce and Kilgour are attending, with members of other churches in the city, to the religious instruction of the children in the Boys' Home.

In the merciful providence of God, there has been no death among either the teachers or the scholars during the past year, a circumstance which we cannot expect to recur often where the number is so large. The children enjoyed a pleasant social gathering on the evening of the 19th March, and an equally pleasant pic-nic at Mimico Grove on the 15th June. It was gratifying to see many of the parents and relatives of the children present on the latter occasion.

The Librarians report 847 volumes in the library. The present system of distributing the books seems to be a great improvement on that formerly in use. Its satisfactory working is no doubt largely due to the attention given to it by the Librarians.

The School has received \$100 from the Treasurer of the congregation towards its expenses; and it will be seen that Mr. Smith reports a balance on hand of \$17.77.

REPORT FOR 1878.

IN submitting the usual Annual Report of the Missionary Association, your Committee feels thankful that the receipts for the past year have been on the whole so well sustained, considering the financial condition of the country and the large demands made upon the liberality of the congregation in connection with the erection of a new church.

The missionary collectors received during the past year the sum of \$1,208.10; there were paid directly to the Treasurer, \$100.50. The collection at the annual missionary meeting of last year was \$12, and on Sabbath last (after deducting the ordinary collection), \$107, making in all \$1,427.60. From this there has to be deducted for "Records" supplied to the congregation, \$47.50, and for sundry expenses, \$5, leaving the sum of \$1,375.10 to be allocated by the congregation at this meeting.

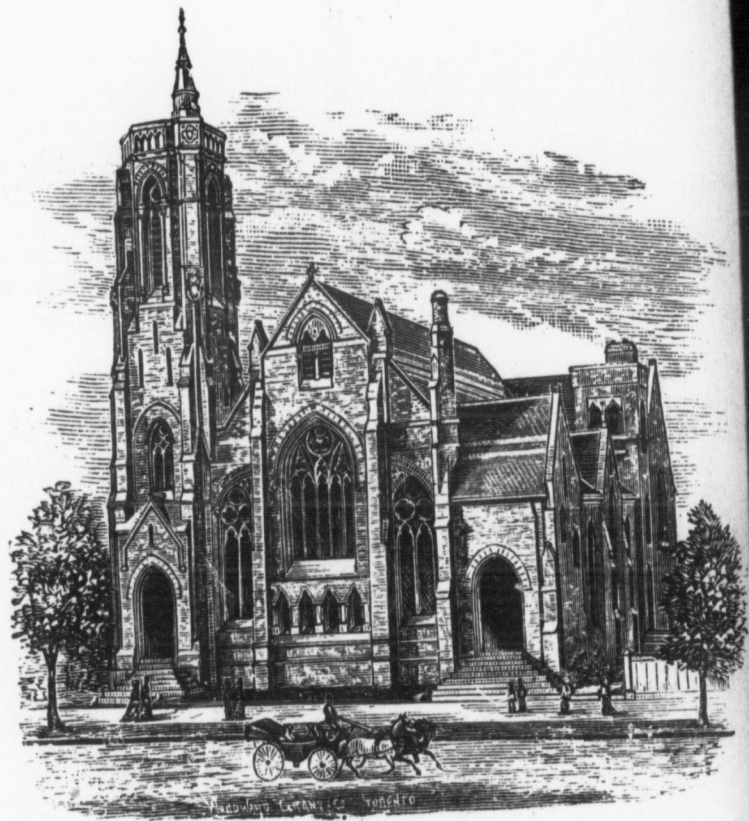
