RUSHING RESCUE WORK

In Debris at One Place Mother and New Born Babe Are Found Alive-Cold Weather Adds to

Sufferings of the Homeless

zano said:

"I never dreamed of such a horrible situation. The whole town is ruined, as every house is down and only three stables remain intact. Churches, palaces, and dwellings have crumbled to the ground. What once were streets, are now full of debris, to the height of six or seven feet.

"Within a short time the work of rescue will be useless as all those buried under the ruins will be dead. The population is extinguished, the people either being dead or wounded in hospitals.

"The dead in the ruins compose the greater percentage of the inhabitants. More than 10,000 were killed at Avezzano alone, while the remainder of the population, about 1,000 persons, are practically all injured. Very few escaped without wounds, because every house collapsed at once and nobody had any chance to run out. Thus the hectacomb is worse than that of Messina, as it occurred within thirty seconds."

Colonel Dunn said that Avezzano was now provided with all kinds of supplies and that attention of relief parties must be turned to the smaller and less accessible villages.



pensions and the enforcement of the fair wage clause.

James Simpson, Toronto, urged that the dominion government should co-operate with the provinces in providing work for the unemployed, who, he said, numbered 250,000 in Canada today. This co-operation could be effected in such work as roadmaking and land clearing.

Fred Bancroft, Toronto, said that since the country's credit was behind the banks, the country itself might as well establish a banking system of its own on lines simflar to those adopted in Australia. At present, he added, the banks hamper various interests in the country and are responsible for many difficulties in general finance. He also asked that the old-age pension system recommended by a special committee of parliament, should be enforced.

J. T. Foster, Montreal, wanted the fair wage clause extended beyond work on government building contracts. Very low wages were being paid on militia contracts. In the manufacture of shells some shops paid only half the rate of wages paid in other shops.

J. C. Watters, president of the congress, urged much stricter immigration regulations and harder penalties for misrepresentation as to labor conditions in Canada.

Cook two table-spoons butter with two slices onion five minutes, removing onion, adding two tablespoons flour, three-fourths teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon curry powder, one-fourth teaspoon pepper, few grains celery salt, and pour on gradually one cup scalded milk.

These are made with very little trouble when molding bread. Take 1 pound of light bread dough, add ½ cup butter, roll out ¼ inch thick, spread with butter, sugar, cinnamon and currents. Fold as for jelly roll, cut into half-inch slices, set these rings side up in a pan, let rise to double their bulk and bake. Ice when cold.
