NORTH TRURO, Mass., Oct. 6.—The three-masted schooner Nova Queen, bound with a deckload of laths from Nova Scotian ports to New York City, was run down in the early morning darkness off Nantucket Shoals by an unidentified steamer, the coastguard station Monamy Light reported today.

The bow and head gear of the schooner was smashed. All the damage occurred above the water line, but the schooner was forced to anchor near Stone Horse Lightship, in a heavy sea, cutter to take her in tow. Captain G. R. Merriam, of Parrsboro, N. STEAMERS PROCEED

Word has been sent to New York to watch for the arrival of two steamers, presumably enroute from Boston. One steamer was trying to pass the other in the narrow channel, at that point, according to Captain Merriam. He said that he was at the edge of the channel and that one of the steamers crowded over and struck his vessel, a wooden ship of 476 tons displacement. Both steamers continued without making known their identity or offering assist-

Coastguardsmen went out to the aid of the schooner and boarding her, helped clear away the wreckage, so that she could be towed. Late today they reported that it might not be possible to take her in tow, with the heavy seas that were running. It was feared that unless the wind abated, she might drag her anchor, and go aground on Handkerchief Shoal.

NO NEUTRALITY London News Says Coming Conference Will Clarify Empire

> Situation By HERBERT BAILEY

LONDON, Oct. 6.—When the Sovereign is at war, all his Dominions are at war, and it is impossible for the Dominions legally to contract out of such a war, although they may not contribute one soldier or one sailor to the defence of the Empire. This is the attitude taken by the British government here toward Premier Hertzog's intention to raise the question at the forth-coming Imperial Conference. Every Dominion can, of course, decide for itself whether it wishes or not cide for itself whether it wishes or not to participate in any war in which the Mother Country is involved. It has per-fect freedom in this respect and enjoys the fullest sovereign rights, but so long as its people are subject to the King they are liable to be regarded as being in a state of war by the King's ene-

Canadian Press RRANDON, Man., Oct. 6.-Hon. Robert Forke, Minister of Immigration, and federal member-elect for Brandon, was a guest of honor last night at a banquet following his return

from Ottawa. Mr. Forke said that while he would do his utmost for Western Canada to secure immigrants, that at the same time he would have in mind the interests of the whole Dominion. He referred particularly to the Maritime Provinces, which he said could ab-

sorb many immigrants. Hon. T. C. Norris, provincial Liberal leader, who preceded Mr. Forke, said that Manitoba and the rest of the Dominion, were to be congratulated on the selection of Mr. Forke for the

FORKE OPTIMISTIC.

Mr. Forke in replying, stated that he was most optimistic in regard to immigration, and had no doubt that great influx of immigrants could be expected as a result of "a more aggressive immigration policy." He stated, however, that he had no revo-

"Remember this is a hard country to govern," stated Mr. Forke. "What will win applause in Winnipeg, will be it will be yet. There is some difficulty in obtaining agricultural immigrants from Great Britain because they are not to be had."

MARITIMES' POSITION. Mr. Forke continued by stating that there were plenty of unemployed in Great Britain but they did not come from the farms. He had no doubt, however, that a large number of people could be induced to come to Canada and he would endeavor to bring them in at least much larger numbers than had been the case in the last few years. He had been informed, he said, there were large number of younger sons of people of means who were desirous of coming to Canada. That opened a wide field which would have careful investigation. He did not think it was wise to make a declaration of policy, but it was unquestioned that Canada was capable of accumulating and really required double the

Neighbors are Responsible for Most of Woman's Extravagance, for Many an Unsuitable Marriage and Many a Misfit Job - Yet Why Try to Please Neighbors When They Criticize Anyway?

PERHAPS the woman that women envy more than any other woman who ever lived is Eve, because Eve had no neighbors.



There was nobody across the street or next door to keep an eye on her comings in and goings out. Nobody to count how many fig leaves she had hung up on the line of a Monday morning and note whether they were genuine or imitation. Nobody to keep tab on how many times the Serpent dropped in for a little chat about pippins when Adam wasn't around. Nobody she had to keep up with. Nobody she had to wear herself out making a splurge before. There was nobody across the street

LUCKY Eve, with nobody to please but herself, with no dread of "what will they say?" hanging over her head! What a pity she spilled the beans and introduced neighbors and trouble into the world! For it is the fear of their neighbors that is the beginning of trouble with women and makes them do a thousand foolish things that they

It was the neighbors that kept women for years and years eating the bitter bread of dependence instead of feasting on cake of their own making.

THEY were strong and healthy, and full of energy. They their heads and skill in their fingers. They simply longed to get out in their heads and skill in their ingers. There are girls who are born cooks, who have a genius for cooking that would make them rich and farhous if they would follow their natural bent. There are other girls who adore a kitchen and who hate an office but they turn their backs upon their predestined careers beoffice, but they turn their backs upon their predestined careers because of what their neighbors might think.

TT IS the neighbors who drive multitudes of girls into unsuitable marriages. Marriage doesn't appeal to every woman. There are many women who would really prefer to be old maids, and to whom their own women who would really prefer to be old maids, and to whom their own independence and their own little ways are dearer than any husband will ever be. Sometimes Mr. Right does not come along, and a girl finds no man among those she knows who either comes up to her ideal or fires her

Left to herself, she would stay single, but she is afraid the neighbors would say that she was unattractive, that she never had a chance to marry, and so she takes the first Tom, Dick or Harry who asks her and is miserable ever after. Whenever you see a woman about 30 marry a widower with many children, or some old suitor who has been hanging on for years, or some good-fornothing loafer, yet may be sure that the neighbors made the match.

TT IS the neighbors who are responsible for nine-tenths of women's extravagances. It is not because Mrs. Jones is clothes-mad that she runs her husband in debt for new frocks. It is because she can't stand having neighbors remark that she is wearing her last year's hat.

Heaven knows Mrs. Smith gets no pleasure out of the awful strain of camouflaging poverty into a semblance of riches and attempting to make a beer income cover a champagne style of living. She would like to be just honestly poor and comfortable, but she dares not do it. She has to keep up with the neighbors, if it ruins her husband, and brings pervous prostration on herself. it ruins her husband, and brings nervous prostration on herself.

Curious that we should make martyrs of ourselves trying to please our neighbors when we know that, do as we may, we shall not escape



LLOYD'S TONNAGE FIGURES RECORD

Merchant Vessels at End of June, Under This Register 29,172,698 Tons

Merchant vessels affoat at the end of June, 1926, holding the classification of Lloyd's Register, represented 29,172,698 tons, the highest tonnage ever recorded. With the completion and launching of 297 ships, of 1,391,033 tons, the aggregate of shipping which holds, or is intended to hold, the classification of Lloyd's Register amounts to 9,854 vessels, of over 30½ million tons

This and other shipping intelligence is contained in a report of the Society of Lloyd's Register of Shipping for 1925-1926. Attention is drawn to the blow

dealt to shipbuilding and engineering, at a time when there were indications of improvement in trade, by the closing down of blast furnaces, steel works and forging establishments in the United Kingdom through the coal

During the year, the committee passed plans for 861 new vessels of 1,089,360 tons gross. No less than 68.3 per cent. of the total is to be built in Great Britain and Ireland, and, although there is a felling off in the though there is a laiming of in the total as compared with last year, the percentage to be built in those countries shows an increase of 18.3 per cent.

During the year the committee assigned classes to 419 new vessels of 1,330,507 tons gross, a slight increase over last year. Of these, 269 were built in Great Britain and Ireland, 27 in Germany, 22 in Holland, 20 in Italy, and less than 20 in other countries. Great Britain took 222 of the constructed vessels, the British Dominions 50, and other nations under 20 each.
