A Boston Doctor. Another feature of the afternoon ses-sion was a very interesting and instruc-address by Dr. Andrew R. MacCausland, of Boston, on "Deformity as a factor in Disability." He gave a full description of the different deformities which ren-dered the patient disabled, such as flat-foot, deformed angles, knees, hips, spine and shoulders. He gave many illustra-tions of the manner in which these should be treated and proper methods of bandaging and binding such. Dr. Ran-kin, of Woodstock, Dr. Crocket and Dr. White spoke in appreciation of the ad-dress. Dr. White mentioned the fact that Dr. MacCausland was a specialist in Ortheopedic surgery, and had pointed out the positions in which the joints had best be placed to insure a complete recovery.

had best be placed to insure a complete recovery. Dr. Addy read an address on goitre from a surgical standpoint. This was very ably discussed by Dr. Rowley who spoke of the treatment for a patient with the disease. He summatized his state-ments by saying: "If the patient will not follow the rest cure prescribed, he then must submit to the surgical treat-ment." Dr. A. E. 





It is under-stood that the Deutsche Bank officials are not acting for themselves alone, but we the spokesmen for the German gov-ergment and the proposed German bank-ing "kartel," which it has been suggest-ed be formed by the seven big private German banks and the Reichsbank to we-finance Germany.

German banks and the Reichsbank to re-finance Germany. The proposal of the German banks is that bank credits, either in the form of acceptance or otherwise, be opened here. Such a credit would be guaranteed joint-banking kartel. Nothing has been said definitely about the size of the credit de-sired, but bankers have been given to understand that the amount is consider-able, with \$80,000,000 to \$50,000,000 for a beginning.
