

London, Feb. 3—The labor conference at Leicester has decided by a large majority to abandon its pledge to contribute to the support of its members of parliament which a majority of the judges who gave the famous Osbourne judgment declared to be illegal and contrary to public policy.

The extremists in the conference, including James Kier Hardie put up a fierce opposition, declaring that the abandonment of the pledge was a surrender to the House of Lords and submission to the dictation of the government, but the representatives of 1,054,000 workmen swamped the opposition representing 306,000 workmen.
